Pacific Coast.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 1. Mary Brohany and Mary Ann Riley have been committed to the Insane Asylum. No tidings yet received of Professor Lay, the balloonist.

George Scott, the young man accused of forging omnibus railroad tickets, was released on his own recognizance to-day, and immediately sailed for Australia. The Municipal Court permitted this action at the request of the President of the company.

Margaret Fagan is under arrest, charged with forging an endorsement on drafts in favor of Mrs. Charlotte Thompson to the amount of \$1,750.

The storage of petroleum and its various products in this city in larger quantities than 250 gallons is prohibited by an order of the Board of Supervisors, passed last night.

The coinage at the Mint in this city for March was \$1,140,000, all in double eagles.

The March receipts from the Crown Point mine to the 31st, aggregate \$724,911. The last weekly receipts of the Hale & Norcross mine shows 1,200 tons of ore extracted.

The American Flag Mill and Mining Co., yesterday remitted \$13,000. This will about clear up the indebtedness of the company.

The Savage mine turned out 240 tons of ore last week, averaging \$25 55. The report to-day of ore discovered in 1,600 foot level of this mine is variously estimated at 4 to 12 feet wide.

There was a better feeling in mining stocks this morning.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 1, P. M. Professor Coe feels considerable concern for the safety of Professor Lay. When last seen the balloon was at an enormous height and going easterly with great rapidity.

Judge Hoffman has decided, and, on review, of Judge Sawyer, of the United States Circuit Court, confirmed the decision that creditors of a bankrupt corporation who are stockholders, are not entitled to preference over creditors who are not stockholders.

A dispatch from Queenstown, April 1st, says the German bark Engelbert, which sailed hence November 20th, sunk in that port yesterday, after a collision. The case of L. Ornat vs. Laura D. Fair, in a suit to recover for legal services, was continued in the Fourth District Court.

Modesto, April 1.

News has just reached here that Professor Lay, who ascended in a balloon at San Francisco, last Sunday, landed on the Coast Range of mountains, about ten miles southwest of Grayson's, at 7 p. m. Sunday. He left his balloon to go in search of provisions and accommodations. On his return, he took several shrewd hinders along to assist in securing his balloon, but up to noon to-day he had not succeeded in discovering the place of his aerial descent.

SALT LAKE, April 1.

Rich copper strikes are reported at Bear Lake, Idaho. Several assays have been made in this city, with most promising results.

The hotels here are crowded to repletion. Much enthusiasm is expressed over Miss Augusta Dargon, now under engagement at the theater here. A complimentary benefit will be given her on Friday night.

Small-pox is gradually decreasing. The quarantine was raised to-day in the Mill Creek District.

The first section of settlers for the new Arizona colony, about 30 persons, left Riverside yesterday.

A strong force of men are at work in this county excavating canals and drains to prevent an inundation of the low lands by melting snows.

The Gas Works are rapidly approaching completion.

Eastern Dispatches.

New York, March 31. The Tribune's Washington special says Representative Brooks is so low today that his friends are very anxious about his recovery. He has not been able to leave his room for three weeks.

In the Supreme Court to-day the right to tax lands granted by a road where that corporation has not obtained a full title, which arose in the case to which the Kansas Pacific Railroad was a party, it was decided that a charter of the road requiring the cost of surveying and conveying the lands in question to be paid to the United States by the railroad company or by the party in interest before the final patent shall be issued. It further directs that all lands not sold by the R. R. Co., within three years to be open for sale to bona fide settlers at the minimum price, \$1 25 an acre, the money to be paid to the United States by the R. R. Co. The Supreme Court

holds that the State can't tax such land for two reasons: first, if it could tax them and sell them for delinquency the United States Government's right to receive the cost of the surveys and conveyances before losing its title to them would be interfered with; second, because it would interfere with the right of settlers to purchase lands at the minimum price.

CLEVELAND, March 31.

The Bar Association this afternoon considered the following resolutions: "Resolved that the testimony given by Judge Sherman before the Committee in the Senate investigation in Congress, and letters admitted by him to be genuine, evinces a want of integrity and such moral turpitude as to destroy all confidence in his judicial administration and to require that he should at once resign and relieve the Federal Court from the embarrassment consequent upon his continued occupancy of the judgeship. Action upon resolution postponed to give Sherman an opportunity to communicate with association.

CINCINNATI, March 31.

A New York dispatch says the treasury programme has had a serious effect on financial circles. Gold advanced three per cent.; money rose to three-fourths per cent. per diem.

WASHINGTON, March 31.

The Postmaster General has prepared a letter to the railroad Presidents, expressing a readiness to appear before the Senate, and the Special Committee at the same time shall be present, to state their arguments on the postal question.

HARTFORD, CON., March 31.

The funeral of ex-Senator James Dixon was largely attended to-day.

Foreign News.

LONDON, March 31.

The Times, in a recent city article, stated that speculation in sterling exchange was going on in New York on a gigantic scale. It is estimated that loans to the amount of \$12,000,000 existed. Subsequently, the Reuters telegram from New York, showed that the Times' estimate were exaggerated, stating that the bankers there were of the opinion that loans were considerably in excess of \$5,000,000. The Times to-day alludes to the contradiction and explains that the statement in its article was based only on quotations in the New York papers and on circulars of American bankers.

ROME, March 31.

A party of Catholic youths, one a native of England, while leaving church yesterday, were attacked by some men who were lying in wait for them and severely beaten. Gen's de arms interfered and the assailants fled, two or three boys were wounded.

The Eurekaites are busily arranging for the working of their new county organization. New county buildings will be erected, if suitable ones cannot be purchased already built.

It is said that Janin, the mining expert, goes to Japan under a salary of \$1,000 per month.
