LOCAL MINING REVIEW.

For the week ending Oct. 11, 1873. Another week has gone. The crowd that has long been lingering around the workers in the precious metal, has been a little decreased. A few more improvements have been made, or commenced, and a very few more men have been employed.

One fact, which is to be deplored, is that more attention is not paid to the low-grade ores of Highland and Bristol districts. It is an undoubted fact that some of the mines in those districts are worthy of being developed. The prosperity of either of those camps will be the prosperity of Pioche, on a business point of view.

Incline No. 3 has been sunk 105 feet below the ninth station, making its entire length from the surface 980 feet. There has been no change in the rock at the bottom, it being still hard. The east drift at the 530-foot level is in 200 feet, the face being quartzite. The east drift from the 630-foot station is in 638 feet. The east drift from the 750-foot station is in 390 feet, the face showing a strong vein of quartzite, carrying metal. A vein which is being sunk from the west drift at the 750-foot level is now down 18 feet, and shows some very good ore.

Everything in the old shaft is going on as usual. Thus far, during the present month, 92 tons of ore have been shipped to the Amador Mill. Assays from four battery samples from the mill average \$116.63 to the ton. The first return of bullion from the ore shipment mentioned is expected this evening. In the new shaft, a contract was finished day before yesterday, making the hole 314 feet deep. Work was commenced on a new contract yesterday morning, and the work will go on swiftly and steadily.

The incline is 325 feet long. The ledge at the bottom is five feet in width, and contains some ore of an excellent quality. By a cross-cut in the west drift a body of the chloride ore has been developed. The west drift also shows a large body of ore, mostly second grade, but some of it very good.

Work is going smoothly on. Instead of 50 men having been discharged, as some one said the other day, men are being put on as fast as room is made for them. There are now 210 names on the payroll of the CAROLINE.

Nothing is being done in the Caroline, with the exception of the sinking of the shaft, which is now about 400 feet in depth. The sinking is done at the rate of 6 feet in 24 hours.

By Rail to Bullionville.

AN erroneous opinion prevails in some quarters in regard to the Nevada Central Railroad, connecting the mines of Pioche with Bullionville; and we regard it as a duty, as well as a pleasure, to set the railroad right before the public. In order to report understandingly about the road, an enterprise in which our people have a very great interest, we rode down and back in the cars yesterday, and found a very marked improvement in the road since we previously inspected it. The train left the depot here at 10 o'clock in the morning. In the train were nine ore cars and one passenger car, the latter capable of accommodating 30 passengers very comfortably, although there were only about 20 persons in the passenger car, exclusive of the officers of the road.

The cars now used were constructed under the direction of Mr. Nesbitt, Superintendent of the road. The engine is of ample capacity, and though the grade up the steep grade of 192 feet to the mile without difficulty. At present there are but 400 feet of trestle-work on the whole route, and it is Mr. Nesbitt's intention to dispense with even that amount, and to straighten the line very materially. The trip from Bullionville to Pioche was made in an hour and a half, the distance from the Raymond & Ely mine, where the cars are loaded, to the mills at Bullionville is just 21 miles. Two trips down and back are made daily, making 84 miles in all. The public may rest assured that the road is in good working order, and perfectly safe. Mr. Nesbitt, the Superintendent; H. C. Chapin, bookkeeper, and C. R. Taylor, conductor, accompanied the train yesterday, and each manifested a lively interest in the success of the enterprise and a determination to exert all their energies to make it a complete success.

The several quartz mills at this place, together with the machine shop of the railroad company, makes it a very busy and lively little place. The mills and foundry have so often been described in our columns that we need not repeat anything in regard to the admirable working of both mills and foundry. Mr. Vickers, formerly of the foundry, gave us all the needed information in regard to it. From him we learned that the company purpose building a new foundry a quarter of a mile from the present one, and that a track leading to the new foundry will be constructed at all trestle-work will be dispensed with.

Want of time prevented us from examining the mills, which, however, are all doing good work, and which, though often visited by us, are never without interest. THE CANYON. No one can ride by the cars from here to Bullionville without being profoundly impressed with the beauty of the scenery in the canyon, for a distance of about four miles. The rugged mountains on each side, green brooks of clear running water, and flowers of every hue, render the canyon sublimely and impressively beautiful.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. O. R. Ford, an engineer connected with the company, arrived from Toano, from which point he was before leaving for the shipment to Pioche of a first-class 20-ton locomotive for the Nevada Central Railroad.

FROM A PIONEER NOW IN SAN BERNARDINO.—T. J. Barnes, formerly of Pioche, writes to Mr. Holland under date of San Bernardino, Cal., October 1, 1873: "After I wrote to you for the Pioche Record to commence from the 14th of June last, I went to the Postoffice several times, but got no papers until the latter part of August, and then they ranged from the 24th of August down, with several numbers of that month missing.
