THE RAYMOND & ELY VS. THE KENTUCKY MINING COMPANY.

Judge Beatty's Decision—Judgment for Plaintiff.

As soon as the stage came in from Hamilton, there was a gathering of highly interested parties at the law office of Pitzer & Corson, where the decision of Judge Beatty, in the great case of the Raymond & Ely against the Kentucky Mining Company, it was agreed, should be opened by the County Clerk. That officer first went to Wells, Fargo & Co.'s express office, but failing to find the anxiously-sought document there, he went to the postoffice, but it was before all this matter had been distributed, and this fact was reported at Pitzer & Corson's office, which by this time had had a large accession to the number who awaited the news of the important event. While discussing the probabilities of some mistake about the matter, two telegrams were read from Judge Beatty, dated yesterday, saying in effect, "you will get my decision to-day."

SMOXY CHIMNEYS.

The evil of smoky chimneys is often curable, sometimes not. If found to arise from too small a flue, roughly finished, and affording obstruction to the free passage of smoke or of the machine that should clean the chimney, there is but little encouragement to try a cure; but if the flue is of the proper size, it is worth while to observe, what opposing circumstances exist to impede its proper working. In country places, oftentimes a tree too near to a chimney-top will stop the current of air, and cause a downward draft. The remedy is not necessarily the removal of the tree, which may be valuable, but such a change in the form of the terminal as will take advantage of all winds that blow except from that quarter cut off by the tree; and as the down draft is nearly always cut off by an eddy thrown back from the resisting bulk of the tree, by closing the top of the chimney at the side nearest the tree, and leaving it open upon the others, an effectual cure will generally be wrought. Another and common cause of smoky chimneys is the thickness of the internal walls of the flues. The air cannot ascend if of low temperature, so the current will not have a proper flow until the inside of the flue has become warmed, making the obnoxious persistence in smoking when the match is first applied, and the necessity for burning shavings or paper in order to heat the flue, to the danger of igniting the soot. A coating of cement is sometimes applied to remedy this. A still more useful defect is to be found in the improper construction of the mouth of the chimney, which is often not roomy enough to permit the products of slow combustion to rise unimpeded by the downward current descending from above. In all cases there must be space enough for the mingling of these opposing forces, and for the conversion of the down current into upward by the warmth imparted to it by the smoke and flame. A register grate will, to a certain extent, effect this by diminishing the aperture for escape of heated vapors, and so leaving space above the flap for the circulation of the air contained within the flue; a cup-shaped chimney will also effect this. Smokey chimneys are well styled interior nuisances, tending to try the patience and temper of the inmates of a house, but the cause of the trouble depends upon too many circumstances to permit more re-buke. Briefly, the mischief is to be attributed always to bad construction, workmanship, faulty materials, and can only be mitigated or removed by special study of each existing case. One for all, a chimney to draw well ought to be constructed narrow at the throat, just above the fire-place.
