IS EUREKA.—We see by the Eureka Sentinel that Dr. A. C. ACCIDENT.—Yesterday about noon a man named Thomas Owen met with a severe accident in the Magnet Company's mine, west of the Raymond & Ely ground. A mass of dirt and rock unexpectedly fell on him, bruising him severely and causing a dislocation of the hip. The injured man was brought to the surface and conveyed to his cabin as speedily as possible, where Dr. Deal very skillfully and quickly reduced the dislocation.

SILVER PEAK.—Yesterday the Floral mill delivered a fine lot of bullion, the returns of a crushing of Silver Peak ore. That mine is now producing daily several tons of fine ore, which works fully \$75 per ton. The "ruined mines" of Pioche, to use the charged name, will not astonish the dwellers in the cottages by the sea that dot the sand hills of Yerba Buena.

GOOD YIELD.—Nine tons of ore from Highland District were crushed last week at the Floral mill, and yielded something over \$1,000. This mill, under the careful and experienced management of Mr. McMaister, is doing excellent work. In this lot of ore there was fully 30 per cent of base metal, yet it was worked up to 80 per cent of the pulp assay, which is more than ordinary good work.
