

Fire.—About one o'clock yesterday morning a fire broke out in a cabin situated close to the Raymond & Ely hoisting works, occupied by a miner named Wm. Mahoney. A few minutes after the alarm was given the house of the Raymond & Ely works were brought into play, and throwing a stream of water on the burning building soon extinguished the flames. Mr. Mahoney, the occupant of the cabin, was sleeping in it at the time the fire broke out and was nearly badly burned about the head and face before he could make his escape. The value of the property destroyed is but trifling. The fire occurred so close to the Raymond & Ely works that it was at first thought they were on fire; in fact, for a few minutes the works were in some danger.

WASHINGTON & CAROLINA.—The present appearance and prospects of the Washington & Creole mine are very flattering. Yesterday we saw in Wells, Fargo & Co.'s express office seven bars of a total value of about \$8,000, which was the product of about 70 tons of ore. Bullion enough to make three more bars worth \$3,000 is expected to be discovered in the active and vigilant Superintendent, informs us that during the present month, at least \$15,000 will be shipped from this mine, with every prospect of a continuance of the same. This is good news, though not surprising to us, for we have never for a moment faltered in our belief, that the mines of Pioche will be as profitable as ever they were, and perhaps more so.

FROM HIKO.—Our valued friend C. G. Heath, arrived yesterday from Hiko. He brought some bullion with him, from work at the Crescent mill. There were two large and one small bar, the whole amounting in value to about \$2,000. Mr. Heath looks as well and as fully as ever. He reports the folks at Hiko to be joggling along very quietly. He says they had quite a fire there the other day on Judge Wilson's premises, the particulars of which we have already published. Mr. Heath will stay in Pioche until after the meeting of the Democratic County Convention, to which body he is a delegate from Hiko.

Mr. McKee has for some time been engaged as a special officer of this town, and also as Deputy Sheriff. EXHAUSTIVE.—All the roads leading into Pioche are in a most abominable condition. In wet weather they are a mass of mud, and in dry they are full of ruts, and chuck holes, such an extent that there is no such thing as riding or walking pleasantly. At present the burdens of our tax-payers are too heavy to think of adding anything to the load; but when brighter times come, as we believe they shortly will, our citizens should form a road district and have the approaches to the town put into a decent condition.

COMMENDABLE.—During both the Republican and Democratic primaries the conduct of the peace officers was worthy of much praise. The times were exciting, and well calculated to create personal difficulties. In spite of this, all trouble of this character was stopped at their vigilance. The meeting of the peace officers was much to be commended, and for so well performing their duty, are entitled to the thanks of the community.

CELEBRATING.—On Labor street night before last, a number of our Mexican residents celebrated the anniversary of the Spanish colonies renouncing their allegiance to the mother country. The houses were illuminated with Chinese lanterns, and the streets were lighted and rejoicing general, which was continued all night.

BUZZING.—Yesterday morning and afternoon the streets were full of men who were canvassing one with another in little knots scattered around in every direction. Towards evening there seemed a general cessation of hostilities, and but few persons were to be seen on the streets.

TO-DAY the Republican County Convention will meet at the Court-house. Some folks say there will be a stormy time among the supporters of the several candidates, but for our part we believe it will go off smoothly and in good humor; at any rate we hope so.

VOICES CAST.—The total number of votes cast at the Democratic primaries was 933. At the Republican primary 865 persons voted. This gives Pioche a voting population of 1,801, which is more than we thought it had.

FORTUNATE.—It appears a little strange, but not the less true, that at the late primaries all those persons who had their tickets printed at the Record office were successful.
