Eastern Dispatches.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Vice President Wilson continues to regain strength rapidly.

The U. S. Supreme Court did not deliver any opinion in the U. P. R. case to-day. One of the justices is authority for stating that all current reports relative to the determination of the case by the Supreme Court are without foundation.

The President has signed the commission of Thos. C. Woodward of Iowa to be examiner in chief in the Patent Office, vice M. S. Hopkins, resigned, and appointed B. Cappel, Consul of the U. S. at Bogota.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Rev. Dr. Bunting said to-day to a Brooklyn reporter that he thought Mrs. Moulton justified in calling for congregational counsel to settle the difficulties between herself and Plymouth Church, and believed such counsel will be called of course.

At the session of the Board of Missions the following appropriations were made: Denmark, \$8,892; Germany and Switzerland, \$23,000; Norway, 12,000; Sweden, \$25,000; California Chinese Mission, \$10,284, and missions in Asia, \$63,016.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 15.—Extensive preparations are being made for the Texas Pacific Railroad convention which opens here on the 19th. The most of the Southern States and several Western ones have appointed delegates and the indications are that the convention will be attended from all sections interested in the road.

BROWNVILLE, TEXAS, Nov. 15.—The Federal Grand Jury in their report say that from Brownsville to Pecoyee, a distance of six hundred miles in length, and a hundred and fifty to Nueces, the American ranchers have been ordered to leave their homes by Mexican raiders in pain of death, and that one hundred thousand head of stolen cattle are driven to Mexico annually.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 15.—The case of Gen. J. McDonald, ex-Supervisor of Internal Revenue of this District, was called in the United States District Court to-day.

Pacific Coast.

JACKSON, Cal. Nov. 14.—Rain continues heavily without signs of abating. Heavy rains in Calaveras and Tuolumne counties.

SANTA BARBARA, Nov. 14.—Rain commenced early this morning, continued until daylight, afterward raining at intervals until about 3 p. m., when it ceased.

SAN DIEGO, Nov. 14.—Rained considerable last night; showers during the day; raining hard this evening.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 15.—A light rain fell Saturday night and yesterday. The crop is growing finely and farming prospects good.

SAN BERNARDINO, Nov. 15.—Rain commenced Saturday; still raining. No prospects of clearing up.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 15.—Raining all forenoon; no prospects of letting up.

VIROINA, Nov. 16.—The Julia works did not burn down.

SALT LAKE, Nov. 16.—The Hussey Bank building, with the adjoining one, was destroyed by fire this morning.

Foreign News.

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 15.—A serious railway collision occurred on the road between Linköping and Lenanberg. Six persons were killed and 12 more or less injured.

SANTANDER, Nov. 15.—2,000 troops embarked here for Cuba to-day.

PARIS, Nov. 15.—The ship Lennie arrived at Rochefort. All sailors found on board were arrested.

The Progress de Nord states that the clergy of Roubaix refused to chant a prayer beginning with the words "Domine fac saluum rem publicam" on the seventh as requested in the circular of Minister of public worship.

MONTEBELL, Nov. 15.—To-day Mr. Doutré went to the proprietors of evening papers and obtained a promise from them not to publish anything to-day relating to preparations for Guibord's funeral which takes place to-morrow at noon.

SAN DIEGO, Nov. 15.—A severe shock of earthquake was felt here at 2:32 p. m., shaking up things lively and lasting from ten to forty seconds. Vibrations west to east.

ANAHIM, Nov. 15.—A slight shock of earthquake here this afternoon at 1:25; undulating motion but no noise. No loss.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 15.—At 2:36 p. m. a smart shock of earthquake, lasting five or six seconds here, and simultaneously in all places in the interior with which we have communicated by telegraph. The shock did no damage.

SAN BERNARDINO, Nov. 15.—The most distant earthquake of the season visited us to-day at 2:20 p. m. The vibrations were from north to south with an undulating motion accompanied with a rumbling sound. Little damage reported.

PLEASANTON, Cal., Nov. 15.—A lively shake up last evening at 7:55; vibrations went to east; violent enough to rock houses and cause people to rush into the streets. A lighter shock was felt at two o'clock this morning.

SAN DIEGO, Nov. 15.—On the 10th instant Mr. Dryden, agent of the Temecula Indians, went to their rancheria with five hundred dollars worth of blankets, calico, etc., for the Indians, that had been placed at his disposal.

YUMA, A. T., Nov.—The severest shock of earthquake ever experienced here occurred here this afternoon at 2:39 o'clock, lasting forty seconds, shattering chimneys and cracking adobe walls. Several small waves succeeded at intervals of fifteen or twenty minutes. A severe sand storm has prevailed in the desert since yesterday morning.

MARICOPA WELLS, A. T., Nov. 15.—A slight shock of earthquake of five seconds duration was experienced here at 2:41 p. m.

CARSON, Nov. 15.—Scott, who, it will be remembered, tried to commit high-way robbery a short time since, has been convicted and sentenced to five years in the State Prison, where he is now safely housed.

Two young men were arrested Saturday night who are supposed to be the incendiary rascals who have so often attempted to burn the town.

Great preparations are being made for the opening ball of the Carson Guards, to be given in Moore & Parker's new hall to-morrow night. It promises to be an immense success.

SALT LAKE, Nov. 15.—A writ of habeas corpus has been served on the U. S. Marshal to bring Brigham Young before Chief Justice White on the 17th inst.

Eighteen indictments for polygamy have been found by the grand jury in Idaho against Mormon residents of Franklin, Idaho.

Had a snow storm last Saturday night, about eighteen inches of snow falling in the vicinity of Evanston and Wyoming; but little in this valley.

PORT TOWNSEND, Nov. 15.—The revenue cutter Wolcott has returned from her second cruise. She went along the south shore of the Straits of Fuca, finding nothing on the Vancouver shore. She picked up a body, which was identified as that of D. C. McIntyre, lately from Fraser river and previously from Marysville. The body was taken to Port Townsend. But little hope of any further discoveries. The remains of the wreck were found scattered all over the straits.

PORTLAND, Nov. 15.—Four boys, the youngest under ten and the eldest fifteen, were sent to the Penitentiary last week for larceny. This evening a citizens' meeting is called to devise ways and means for the establishment of a reform school.

It commenced snowing early this morning, and at 2 o'clock p. m. is still snowing.

FRESNO, Nov. 15.—To-day some Mexicans started in pursuit of a man who robbed a store at Mariposa, and overtook him at Watson's ferry, when he showed fight, shooting one man through the lungs. The prisoner and wounded man were brought here this evening, and after locking the prisoner up in a cell, the Deputy Sheriff went to the office, and immediately after four prisoners, who were in the corridor, forced the lock from the iron door, and all walked out. A force of men started in pursuit immediately.
