EASTERN DISPATCHES.

New York, Nov. 1.—The Times' Washington special says: General Sheridan arrived here last night and to-day had a long interview with the President, in company with the Secretary of War and General Sherman.

New York, Nov. 1.—In regard to the conference yesterday of the railway magnates Vice President King declined to say anything more than that the Managers had been in session all day without accomplishing any definite results.

Chicago, Nov. 1.—The official report of the battle between Sitting Bull, Pretty Bear, Doll Eagle, John Sons, Aces, Standing Bear, Gaul and White Bear on Cedar Creek gives the same general results that were given in the Bismarck dispatch last evening.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 1.—Suit is on trial in the Twelfth District Court the trial involved being an attempt to dissolve the San Francisco Stock and Exchange Board or, rather, to obtain an order declaring that it was dissolved on the 6th of August, 1873.

The following dispatch was received to-day by the Secretary of the California Mining Company from Jas. G. Fair, Superintendent: "Virginia, Nov. 1.—Last evening a rush of water came into the ore-breasts directly under the sills of the 1300-foot level. It fell through to the bottom of the mine. The quantity has now decreased over one-half and will probably run out by night. Little or no damage was done."

PACIFIC COAST.

EMPIRE CITY, Ogb., Oct. 31.—The brig Perpetua, hence Oct. 23, foundered at sea Oct. 24th, nearly 92 miles southwest of Cape Gregory. The captain, first mate and three of the crew, were picked up on a raft 55 hours afterward by the schooner Rebecca. Three men are still missing; the cook was drowned.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 1.—Last night the Hayes Invincibles reconsidered their determination not to hold another parade before election and resolved to turn out in a torchlight procession on Monday night, voluntary contributions being made to defray the expenses. The Democrats will have their final street display on Saturday night.

The Chronicle this morning prints an interview with one of the attorneys for the Trustees of the Lick estate, relative to the recent application of John H. Lick for letters of administration of his late father's estate. The attorney said that the proceeding was perfectly right and proper; that Mr. Lick was the only person entitled to letters on his father's estate; that the granting of letters might be contested, but he thought it hardly probable. He said that the only fight the plaintiffs could make would be to attempt to prove that his father was insane when he made the deed, and added that it was hardly within the limits of probability that this could be proved, as for thirty years it had been Mr. Lick's avowed purpose to dispose of his property as he finally did. The Trustees will combat to the bitter end any attempt to dispossess the beneficiaries by the deed of trust of their dues, and unless Mr. Lick proposes to some compromise, which the Trustees can honorably adopt, a great deal of litigation will ensue. Mr. Krebs, a nephew of James Lick, speaking for John H. Lick, said the petition

for letters meant fight. There might be some of Mr. Lick's estate, which is not covered by a deed of trust, in which case Mr. Lick will, of course, obtain it.

FOREIGN NEWS.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—A Reuter dispatch from Rome says Cardinal Antonelli is dangerously ill. Members of the diplomatic body went to the Vatican yesterday to inquire as to his condition. A dispatch from Rome to the Daily News says Cardinal Antonelli is dying. His Holiness, the Pope, on Sunday ordered a consultation of physicians, who declared the Cardinal's case hopeless. His relatives were summoned to his bedside and found him unconscious.

PARIS, Nov. 1.—Constantinople advices of to-day's date state that the armistice is as yet unsigned. The Russian ultimatum was only delivered to the Porte yesterday. The Montenegro's are bombarding Podoriza and their army has penetrated into Albania, by way of Medium, cutting communication between Podoriza and Scutrie.

The Pall Mall Gazette to-day prints the following very prominently: We believe the statement that the armistice was signed yesterday to be incorrect. The Russian ultimatum seems to have interrupted arrangements, which were on the point of being completed when it arrived. In all probability the signature is only delayed.
