The Latest.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 28.—A train
on the Pittsburg, Cincinnati and St.
Louis Railroad left the Union Depot
this evening, at 6:30 o'clock, in charge
of Harvey Vance, an engineer not a
member of the Union. Before the
train reached the outskirts of the
city, a shot was fired, which took ef
fect in Vance's arm, inflicting a slight
flesh wound. The shot was fired by
a striking engineer, whose name
could not be learned. Several po
lice were on board the engine at
the time, and the man was arrested.
No trains have gone East on the
above line to-day, and none have ar
rived up to six o'clock. There has
been one train each way on the Lou
isville road to-day, from Logansport,
for assistance to quell the distur
bance there, and two companies,
numbering 150 men, were sent out
by the Indianapolis, Peru and Chi
cago Railroad, under command of
Gen. Dan McCalley. They will
reach Logansport to-night. A train
from Chicago for Richmond went over
the road to-day, but did not stop at
Logansport.

CLEVELAND, Dec. 28.—The follow
ing communication was furnished the
agents of the Associated Press to-night:
The strike now in operation on the
leased line of the Pennsylvania Com
pany Railroads, is in direct violation
of the rules of the Brotherhood. Lo
comotive engineers, my advice to
every member of the brotherhood
that has quit work on account of the
strike, is to go to work at once and
to use every influence in their power
to induce all persons engaged in the
strike to resume work, and desist
from any interference with the com
pany's property or men. In my
opinion, no dishonor will be attached
to any man who accepts a situation
from the Pennsylvania Railroad
Company during their present diffi
culty. Signed,

John Ferienback, President of
the Machinists and Locksmiths Inter
national Union, issued orders in
structing members of that order to
refrain from interfering with the lo
comotive engineers in their strike.

CINCINNATI Dec. 28.—A Pacific ex
press train of the Pennsylvania
Central Railroad left New York on
Christmas, and was delayed on the
road at Deunson, O., where the sher
iff boarded the train with a posse for
protection. At Columbus, at mid
night, the train ran into an open
switch, and struck some cars on the
side track, smashing the engine and
injuring the engineer. The passen
gers reached this city safely.

The best engineers express regret's
at the strike, but do not ask to be
taken back. Firemen are returning
to work. The officers hope to run
the road to its full capacity by
Wednesday. The watchman at Li
gansport adjusted a misplaced switch
rarely in time to save a passenger
train full of people, which passed it
at the rate of twenty-five miles an hour.
The officers say they will not com
promise.

The New York night express train
from Pittsburg to Cincinnati and St.
Louis Railway, due here at 6:30 a. m. yester
day, arrived at eleven o'clock last
night. At Cadiz, Ohio, between five
and six o'clock Saturday evening, the
train ran into a misplaced switch,
but escaped without any serious dam
age. Soap had been placed in the
tank at Columbus, from which the lo
comotive took water, rendering the
water unfit for making steam.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 29.—The train
which left here for Logansport with
troops was detached. The soldiers
marched to Logansport, where all is
now quiet. The passenger and mail
train pass as usual.

The Judiciary Committee at Wash
ington, have examined three witness
es regarding Williams—Messrs. Hill
and Falls, of the Attorney General's
office, and Representative Nesmith.
The impression is growing that the
nomination will die in the committee,
unless the Senate orders them to re
port. The situation is awkward.

The President has approved the
bill removing the political disabilities
of E. J. Hervey, Thos. S. Babcock and
Daniel Trigg, of Virginia, and John
H. Reagan, of Texas.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 29.—The
Windom Committee have gone
down the river to the proposed site of
the Ft. St. Phillip Canal, and they
will return here to-morrow.

The appointment of Cushing, as
Minister from the United States to
Spain, is favorably received at Havana.
The Spaniards are loud in their ex
pressions of satisfaction at the resig
nation of Sickles, who they charge with
instigating many of the latest in
terruptions in the Peninsula.
