The Brotherhood of Rail Road Engineers at Cleveland, on the 27th, elected P. M. Astor Grand Chief of the Brotherhood.

The Austin Journal says the Civilian had better take back the assertion that Davis was the first man fined under the late gambling bill, or, it threatens, prepare for a libel suit.

The nomination of Simmons, to be Collector of Customs at Boston, was confirmed by the Senate on the 27th, over the opposition of both the Massachusetts Senators.

The Louisiana Legislature lately made the following comparative appropriations, including those for schools. For 1874, \$1,600,000; for 1873, \$750,000; for 1871, \$5,750,000.

The news paragraph published in this paper the other day, relating to the killing of John Bennett, of Tehuacana, should have read Tehuacana Hills, Limestone county. It was condensed from a News special.

A picture of the immortal "Day Crockett" has been hung up in the hall of the House of Representatives at Austin. While a fine work of art, it is a lid to be but an indifferent likeness of the famous old frontiersman.

The temperance war in New York is growing to be the leading local sensation. Every means is being used to arouse the people, and in this fight there are to be no neutrals. Men and women are forced to take position, either in favor of the movement, or against it. The Catholics and Protestants are making common cause in the movement.

The Statesman thinks there is a "large bug under the chip," in the heavy opposition of the News against the measure providing for a public weigher. Unquestionably, or the News would ignore the whole question, particularly as the measure is immensely popular with all classes of people in the State. Saving alone the cotton factors and brokers of Galveston.

The News of the 28th gives an account of a large transaction in strict ordinary cotton. The sale consisted of nineteen hundred bales. This is indeed a large single transaction and one that will be of common occurrence when the agricultural resources of Texas are once developed.

The House of Representatives are at work on a plan for relieving the indebtedness of the State. In fact, they have passed a bill by a large majority looking to the sale of bonds to raise revenue. This conflicts slightly with the plan proposed by Governor Coke. But the objects of the two plans are substantially the same, viz.: The payment, at the earliest practical moment, the entire indebtedness of the State, interest and principal. It will be seen that the plans differ only in a degree as to time.

The Galveston Civilian has struck the right note on the cotton weigher question, and that is: "Let the country people have their own way about it."

They are the parties interested, they constitute the power that elected and sent the present State Government to Austin to serve them, and their best interests, and they demand the bill. Let the Galveston men abide their dictum, or we can sell cotton in St. Louis, Houston or Shreveport, just as well, and will do it. If this should occur, the dwellers of that beautiful island by the Gulf, would gather wisdom as fast in the future, as they have dollars in the past, at the expense of the cotton planters.

The News and other blatant Texan statesmen, or would be statesmen, are loud in their greans for economy. They apply it in all cases whether indicated by the disease or not. Now there is a class of diseases often afflicting the body politic, which are admirably met, and speedily conquered by this remedy. But, there is also another class of diseases which are only met successfully by the most prompt and liberal outlay of both money and men. We can only have a good constitution by the outlay of the money necessary

to procure it. We can only have adequate protection for our frontier, by a liberal expenditure of both men and money.

Will our constitution and frontier doctors at Austin overhaul their text books a little, and unearth a few of their common principles, and use a few of them in their everyday practice. We think the political and material health of the Commonwealth would suffer no great detriment if the experiment were tried.

THE PUBLIC WEIGHER.

The position taken by the Galveston News, in an editorial of the 25th ult., in regard to Mr. Simpson's bill in relation to Public Weigher, is simply absurd, and savors more of local interest, local patronage and home subsidy than it does of the public good, which it pretends to uphold, more than it does for the interests of the people at large, and who are, to a very large extent, its patrons, for whom it proclaims itself the champion.

The News asserts that Mr. Simpson owes it to this principle to introduce bills without delay for a public yard sticker to preside over the measuring of cloth, a public counter jumper to see that the quality of goods conforms to the price, a public journalist and poster up of transactions of business, &c., &c. Now, all this is intended by the subsidized News to mislead Hon. Representatives and Senators, and draw them off from the true gist of this measure, but it is "too thin;" it is only a gauze veil attempted to be thrown over their eyes to prevent them from seeing the true merits of the bill in question. In the private transactions to which the News alludes, and says that legislation is equally imperative, the purchaser and the owner are face to face, and can each protect their own interest. Not so with the absent cotton owner. He must rely upon and take such weights as the buyers own weigher certifies to. The parallel attempted to be drawn is a "zig zag" line, and does not run in the same direction. Try again, Mr. News.

The News makes a sort of wholesale onslaught upon the members of the House, for, in its indecent "fling" at Mr. Simpson, it seems to forget that forty-nine other members of the House are in the same attitude, as they voted for the engrossment of the bill.

The News should, once for all, understand that it is the producer and shipper who demand this law, and the representatives of the people at large, knowing and appreciating this fact, this necessity, seem disposed to act accordingly.
