## Texas State Fair.

HOUSTON, May 10, 1874.

Ed. Examiner:  
I visited the grounds of the Association for the first time late last evening, found everything and everybody thereon busily employed fixing up and for stock, as you may term it. I have never seen in Texas a sight that gave me more pleasure, than what I have this evening seen on the grounds; comfort and convenience combined with beauty, eloquence and refined taste, all so happily and harmoniously blended, that one can scarcely keep from regretting that time passes so swiftly amid such enchantments.

In my time I have seen many attempts to ornament desolate places, by the planting of trees, shrubby roses and flowers, and more total failures, than partial successes, but here on the grounds of the Texas State Fair for once I view a success, and my pen would come far short of particularizing my feelings, thoughts, reveries were I to undertake the task. The grounds are situated about one mile west of the city proper, out on the prairie, and is severed by a street car passing either way every ten minutes, at a cost to the rider thereon of ten cents per trip. The whole ground is enclosed by an upright and tight board fence nine feet high. The soil is of the very blackest, waxy nature, and the grounds are about as nearly level as nature ever leaves the earth. Now, to provide against muck and mud, there has been upwards of three miles of ditching and shelling. The walks and lawns are beautifully laid off, and with an architectural exactness which is almost inconceivable to others than those who are judges of such matters. Here, too, has the horticulturalist, the florist, as well as the landscape gardener brought to bear all of which they were masters, and what a happy effect the result.

Do you ask why they have succeeded so universally when so many others under more auspicious circumstances have failed? The answer is by wisdom knowledge advice, no one person done it all, it was accomplished by a joint effort, by no theory, by us, how we done it in—but by intelligently applying their efforts as the nature and requirements of not only the soil, but the climate demanded the growing of the vine and the fig, the semi-tropical shrub, along side of, and with the beautiful weeping willow, the aspen tree, the maple the spruce and the juniper will stand on these grounds as a monument to the wisdom of the projectors and perfectors of that which makes your surroundings so lovely when you stand as I stood, this evening in the centre of the Texas State Fair grounds at Houston. He who makes two blades grow where but one formerly grew, is esteemed as a benefactor to his race, what can we think or say of him or they who has done even more, to make the sterile plum blossom as the rose by the plastic hand of industry coupled with knowledge. Letter From Kaufman.  
KAUFMAN, May 11, 1874.  
Ed. Examiner:

While we should ever strive to add dignity to labor, by a system of careful and steady improvement of everything around us, we should not forget our obligations as citizens, but we should try to become wiser and better; and right here, let me ask if any one ever knew an intelligent, thrifty farmer who kept posted on the current events of the day, and who looked upon his avocation as entirely legitimate in every particular; who was (not) a good citizen, and who was highly esteemed by all who knew him?

And this, Patrons, is what is expected of you, and while our Order does not admit politics within its sacred limits, you should not so construe this as to prevent you from exercising your rights as citizens. While we do not intend to organize a political party, or to place candidates for office in the field, or to espouse the cause of either of the great political parties, still it is true that every member of our Order belongs to one or the other of these parties, (and we should so study the acts of men in office, the effect of laws in force, and the necessities of our country in general, that it will enable us to more intelligently cast our votes and direct our influence in the actions of the political parties to which we do belong; always divesting ourselves, and consequently our political parties of all petty prejudices, sectional hatred or narrow mindedness, aiming at a higher and purer statesmanship that will frown down every species of favoritism corruption or oppression. It is true that the spirit of corruption seems to permeate every branch of politics to-day, and that our officials frequently neglect the good of the country for the consideration of selfish or oppressive schemes, and it is equally true that from our hitherto unorganized condition, every corporation, ring or monopoly have exercised their speculative or oppressive proclivities upon the agricultural interests; yet, it is in our power to correct these abuses. The first, not by working hard all day and grumbling half the night at those in power or who direct our politics, but by an active participation in the doings of the parties to which we belong. Let us study what we need, and by the free and independent exercise of our rights as citizens, obtain from those who have a right to command in the discharge of their duties. The second can be obtained by a thorough organization and a determined fight for the interests of the agriculturist in all branches of trade and commerce. Crying as are the demands for reform at this time let us remember that the good we expect to accomplish is not intended to be temporary, but to extend to our successors, consequently we should begin now to educate the children of our order, so to speak, in the way they, and I would earnestly entreat every true patriot to often read the Overseers address which commences near the bottom of Page 39 of our ritual, and not only read but practice it, for in this one short address, is contained the prosperity and greatness of our country during the reign of the generation that is to follow us; as the tree is bent so the tree is inclined, and unless we educate our children to practise industry, honesty economy and when they are young, we cannot expect them to practice it when they are grown, and as they are to be the future officers and directors of affairs in our land we should so instruct them now that in future years their standard will availability, integrity, and capacity.

A Committee of the County Council of the Patrons of Industry County, Ill., have recommended a plan of insurance which will probably be adopted by the council at a future meeting. It divides the members into four classes according to age, the limits being twenty-one and sixty. Upon the death of a member, to be certified by the master and secretary of the grange, each member of each and every class is assessed in sums varying from 90 cents to \$1.50, according to the class to which he belongs, and an entering fee of \$2 is also required.
