**Syrian Christians Seeking Homes in Texas.**

**Interview with Avant Couziers of a Colony.**

(Galveston News, 6th Dec.)

The News office was visited yesterday by two learned representatives of Syrian Christians, Greek church, who visit Texas for the purpose of selecting a site for locating a colony of their brethren, who are desirous of escaping the persecutions to which they are subject in Syria. So far they express themselves very pleased with what they have seen of Texas, the coast country particularly reminding them of Egypt and Syria. A movement such as is contemplated—the emigration of a persecuted sect from the oldest country of the world to the newest marks an event the significance of which can scarcely be overestimated. The delegates sent to spy out the country on behalf of the Syrian Christians, are Prof. Joseph A. Arbeeel and his son, Dr. Abraham J. A. Arbeeel, natives of Damascus, but for many years residents of Beyrout, where the son was educated at an American presbyterian missionary college. These gentlemen arrived in New York from Beyrout about three months ago and proceeded to Tennessee, whence they came to Texas. They are accompanied by Dr. L. J. Ferrary, a German from Marysville, Tennessee, and all are under the immediate care of Mr. N. W. Hunter, of the emigration department of the International and Great Northern railroad, who will show them the State and assist them in choosing a suitable spot for their proposed colony. Dr. Arbeeel speaks fluently Greek, Latin, French and English. It is safe to say that these are the first Syrians who have visited the United States with a view to colonial settlement. They are quartered at the Commercial hotel, where they will remain a few days before resuming examination of the State.

**Size of Hamilton County.**

As it is all the go for spread-eagle Texas orators to draw striking comparisons to give impression of the magnitude of Texas, we submit the following, touching the largeness of Hamilton county. Few persons outside of our county limits have any adequate conception of the size of it. It is large enough for twenty-seven cattle ranches, forty-two sheep ranches, nineteen cotton farms, 1800 hog-lots, two thousand duck-ponds, five thousand two hundred average sized gardens and eleven hundred ordinary sweetpotato patches. It would take seventeen thousand yoke of oxen plowing 134 acres per day, 39 1-2 days to break all the tillable land, leaving the rocky ridges to be scratched over with a steel-toothed horse-rake. It would take a lame mule traveling 114 miles per hour, about 177 hours to circumnavigate it. The soil of the river bottoms is forty times as deep as it is upon the crest of Pike's Peak, and money is eleven times as scarce as it would be if the times were easy and all the people had their debts paid and had a surplus to invest in U. S. bonds. From these facts the intelligent reader will see at once that Hamilton is a great county.—Hamilton Herald.
