BAYARD'S TALK.

The Secretary's Reception by St. Louis, where he Talks to the Point.

A Great Race—"Phalax" and "Maxey Cobb" at Cleveland for \$10,000 July 4th.

Ferdinand Ward Indicted for Grand Larceny—A Heroic Man's Brave Act.

The Great Iron Strike Extended—Other Items of General News from all Directions.

SECRETARY BAYARD.

St. Louis, June 3.—Hon. Thos. F. Bayard, secretary of state, accompanied by his private secretary, Mr. Henry L. Bryan, arrived this morning from Washington en route to Columbia, Mo., to deliver the annual address before the students of the state university. The distinguished visitor was met at the relay depot in East St. Louis by Senator Vest and a committee of citizens composed of Col. Jan. G. Frasier, Judge J. J. Lindley, Hon. E. C. Keir and Messrs. Charles W. Francis and Edward Wilkerson, and was escorted in a carriage over the bridge and to the Southern hotel where he was received by Mayor Francis and a committee of prominent citizens with a brief address of welcome. Mr. Bayard shortly afterwards breakfasted with Mayor Francis, Senator Vest and Hon. Geo. W. Allen.

After breakfast at the Southern hotel, Secretary Bayard escorted by the reception committee, drove to the Southern hotel where he was met by members of the public. The public was admitted to the main hall which was packed almost to suffocation. The galleries and parts of the floor were occupied by ladies.

Secretary Bayard was next escorted to the platform in the main hall, by President Haarsdick, of the exchange, who introduced him to the vast throng, who were seated in the hall of the exchange. After tumultuous cheers Secretary Bayard came forward and spoke in substance as follows:

"I would like all to feel the unqualified satisfaction it affords me to me at for the first time such a large body of men who have done so much to advance the interests of the great inland sea of this country. In my mind the Mississippi valley occupies an important position as the Atlantic and Pacific coasts. I have always tried to do as much for this section of the country as for any other, and appeal to every congressman, every senator, every man with whom I have been associated in public life to prove that no body has done more to advance the interests of this great valley. I have seconded the interests of your great Captain Eads to open not only Memphis and New Orleans but also St. Louis to the commerce of the world through this great river. This is not my desire alone. As one of the members of President Cleveland's cabinet I am justified in saying that the administration will make every endeavor to alk every remnant of sectional feeling in every particular. The administration is for the whole country and not for any part of it. Go on without fear, embark in your enterprises, be at your ease, and every thing you may measure, will be done to protect and advance the interest of every citizen of the United States."

At the close of his brief address Mr. Bayard was applauded heartily. Addresses were then made by Senator Vest and others, after which Secretary Bayard was shown over the floor and introduced to the members of the exchange. He was then driven to the St. Louis Club house where he lunched with the reception committee and invited guests. Later he was driven about the city and shown all the points of interest. Mr. Bayard leaves at 8:30 p. m. for Columbia, Mo., where he delivers the annual address at the state university to-morrow.

A GREAT RACE.
