It Can't Be Did.

Prohibition will not prohibit at least that sort of prohibition contemplated by our local-option policy. State prohibition comes nearer it. National prohibition would not accomplish it entirely, but it would place many very serious difficulties in the way of whisky dealers and consumers. There is but one way to accomplish the overthrow of John Barnevors, and that is to forbid under the direct penalties the manufacture of liquor. Even then little hand-stills would be run in every home where the desire for alcohol existed. Let local-option prevail here, it will not and cannot prevent the bringing of whisky into the city. So long as there is a drop here men will get it. It cannot be kept from us and informers which it will inaugurate will soon become very hateful, even to the leaders in the local-option cause. The character of a spy is always an unpopular one. No correctly balanced man would willingly assume the position. Suppose there is a dealer in whisky who is selling it "on the sly," what kind of a man would he have to be, who would risk his wares under pledge of secrecy, and then go out and "give him away" to the law? The law is injurious in this that it fosters and encourages just such means, just such falsehood. If we have local option here there will be just as much whisky drunk as ever. Men will have it in their homes, places of business and private club rooms, and it will be served out from the drug stores. The only difference local option will make, it will transfer the business from the legitimate hands of the saloon keepers, and place it as we have said above, Doctors will sign prescriptions by the hundred and the "patients" will find no difficulty in finding a druggist who will dish out to him the enticing cordial in the most elaborately labeled bottles got up as all sorts of cure-alls. It is with whisky guzzling as it is with other things, say the social evil. It is almost impossible to fasten unchasteness upon a woman in any legal way, or to satisfy any legal sort of requirement as to evidence. It would be a poor scoundrel who would induce another to violate the law in ministering to his base appetites and then go off and bear testimony against him. There are not many men vile enough to do this, and that would be the only way the officers of law could "come up with" competent and reliable testimony.

These have been the results wherever prohibition has been tried heretofore. Our officers and the people do not differ so widely from others elsewhere that we can hope to attain different results. Human nature is the same in all ages, all lands and under all circumstances. This wild craze will have its run here and pass away as it has in other lands. Here we too will drop back from a couple of years experience with prohibition upon the natural and deeply implanted appetites and passions of humanity, and then men will wonder why they have been so foolish as to destroy so much public revenue and pay the deficit themselves, for a result as meagre as this. Why they will destroy the legitimate business of others, simply that a doubtful experiment may be made with an impossible principle we cannot see.

Indeed it is time to call a halt in this way. Indeed it is necessary that reason, and not blind passion and fanaticism, be called upon to assume the governing functions. We cannot afford this experiment in Texas, we certainly cannot afford it in Waco. Let men compare one side with the other and in what does the superior excellence of the prohibitionists consist? Law, order, morals, charity and patriotism are found among the opponents of local option as well as on the other side.

The report of the EXAMINER on Friday morning of Senator Coke's great speech on the subject of prohibition delivered Thursday night, was necessarily imperfect as well as incomplete. Few people understand the amount of work there is in taking a speech like that in short-hand, getting through at 11 p. m., writing it out long-hand and then setting it up in type, correcting proof and making it up in the forms, and finally printing it. After a while Waco will support a paper capable of maintaining a force sufficient to accomplish such a task in good shape and on time, but just now she won't. She shall have it just as soon as she is ready for it, and willing to pay.

There is a great principle at stake in this prohibition matter. We acknowledge that drunkenness is a great evil, but there are other evils just as bad and some far worse. It is infinitely more dangerous to give the government so much power over the citizens that it may prescribe his diet, his drink and his apparel. It is time to call a halt in these matters. We

are going too far and too fast in this thing.—WACO EXAMINER. With but few exceptions the leading papers of the state declaring against local option as the question is being argued in the different localities.—Fort Worth Gazette. The Gazette is, as yet, happily exempt from such a fight as the one now waging at this point, and may well philosophize on the situation.

THERE are several newspaper men in Texas who don't like Barnevors. The industry exercised by them in keeping out of his way at all times arouses in us the greatest admiration for the "wepans" build of our brothers.—Dallas Times. That must surely be a mistake Bill, isn't it? Never had a carpenter critic a slauderer or an ungenerous foe in Texas. We are very sure we love all the brethren, and with St. Paul, that went a good way. If we know we are right we care very little whether the brethren love us or not, although we enjoy their loving caresses at all times.

It is a pretty hard thing to shut down on a man who is pursuing a legitimate business, who has his means invested and all of his policies planted on it, in a day. Any business man can see that it is simply ruin. Does the cause of prohibition demand the ruin of the men licensed by law? who pay their taxes and obey the law. We don't think it ought to prevail, if it does.

THE EXAMINER needs no disrespect to Dr. Carroll in dealing with what he says on prohibition. A preacher on the political rostrum must take just what other men get. It is an inevitable law. BARNEY GIBBS don't plump at prohibition with anything like the measure of energy demanded by the day, the times and the fierceness of its assaults upon the liberty of the people. MARRIED TO FIFTEEN WOMEN.

The Erratic Career of a Young Russian Gentleman Who Died in Prison. From the Cincinnati Enquirer. A noted convict died in the state prison here yesterday. His name or rather the name under which he was sentenced, was Charles Neville. He was sent from Toledo last December for seven years for bigamy. His father was an Englishman and his mother a Russian who had entered the Russian army on attaining manhood, but that was too dull for him and he secured a commission in the English army through his father. Dissatisfied again he ran away and came to America. He was a young man then, and he had not been long in this country before he had married fifteen different women. The first one was a daughter of Charles Whitney, a wealthy resident of Detroit, and then manager of the Standard Theatre, Chicago. With this young lady he cooped to Toledo. His usual plan was to persuade a minister to marry him in some illegal manner, and in this last case he urged that as a defense, but the court would not allow it. He won the affection of Miss Whitney while employed as her father's coachman. He had been sick for about two weeks with intermittent fever, and a few days before the wedding he had his real name, Charles Edward Neville Censivieski, his Russian title being count. He always claimed he had but one wife and that he was always in her company. She lives at Petersburg, Ontario, and the wardens has telegraphed to her the news of his death.


