Harvey A. Brown has returned his Lorrillard Medal to the donor not caring to constantly compete for its retention.
It is now believed that C. B. West, who was reported drowned two weeks ago, at Hastings, was murdered.

A survey of Red River is being made between Moorhead and Pembina with a view to improvement of navigation.
The Warsaw disaster is to be investigated. One hundred and fifty passenger were aboard and only fifty authorized.

Hon. Augustus Armstrong, brother of delegate Armstrong and until recently U. S. Marshall of Minnesota, is dead.
A red hot contest is being had over lands at the crossing of Red Lake River by the Pembina branch of the St. Paul and Pacific Railroad.

Capt. A. H. Dugard wants to show Minnesotians, at the State Fair, how he shoots fifty pigeons in eight minutes loading his own gun.
A severe storm in Pennsylvania last week injured the Baltimore and Potomac Railroad to such an extent that travel is still impeded.

Dr. Lescaux has contributed a series of valuable letters to the Public Ledger in which he says many good things of the N. P. R. R. country.
Gov. Austin and Mayor Brackett have gone to Ottawa in behalf of the Garry prisoners. The prospects are brightening somewhat for them.

One hundred custom house employees in New York have been ordered dismissed by the Secretary of the Treasury for fraud and corruption. Good.
The Yellowstone news received via Sioux City sources is not entirely reliable. There has been no news from the expedition since July 31st.

An Ottawa dispatch to the St. Paul Pioneer says it is believed positive instructions have been sent to Manitoba to accept bail for the American prisoners.

There are about one thousand officers in the U. S. Army, and in the Monthly Stoppage Circular, of July, 1873, issued by the paymaster general, stoppages are entered against 118.
Count De Chambord, accepts the throne of France. Proclamation of the Monarchy will be made in about six weeks. He accepts the constitution prepared by the Right of the Assembly.

Capt. Seth Bonney, Editor Fargo Express, fell from a carriage last week and was considerably injured. The Captain has abandoned his proposed connection with the Q. M. Department at Bismarck.
The Iowa Anti-Monopolists had a convention at Des Moines, last Wednesday, and nominated Andrew Hoar for Governor; T. O'Donnell, Lieut. Governor, and B. F. Hall for Judge of the Supreme Court.

Terrible Accident in Illinois.
A Train-Load of Passengers Rode to Death.

Railroad Murder.

Chicago, Aug. 20.—A terrible accident occurred on the Chicago & Alton railroad, near Lamont, on Saturday night. The engineer of a coal train disobeyed his orders in regard to running time, and collided with the passenger train running in from the South Bend road. The slaughter was terrible. Eighteen persons were killed outright, and many others fatally wounded. Many of the wounded were burned badly, while others were scalded by the bursting of the boiler. Lamont is only twenty miles from Chicago, but the officials of the road, from some cause, suppressed the news until Monday.

Some of the Victims.
Among the victims of the slaughter were John A. Smith, Warden of the State Penitentiary, John Fisher, purchasing agent for the same institution, and several other well known citizens of the State.

The Cause of the Accident.
The terrible accident is chargeable directly to the criminal recklessness of the conductor and engineer of the coal train, as it was their duty to await the arrival of the passenger train. Both have been arrested on a warrant for manslaughter, and will be brought to a speedy trial.

Murders and Murderers.

SALT LAKE, Aug. 20.—Benjamin Maynard, a rough known familiarly as Big Ben, mortally wounded D. W. Grant, a saloon keeper of this city last night. Maynard is under arrest, and as the citizens talk ugly, threatening lynch law, more trouble is feared.

Worcester, Pa., Aug. 20.—Wm. Ed. Herzog, arrested for the murder of W. D. S. Gross, was arraigned yesterday pleaded not guilty, and his trial was postponed until October next.

Henderson, Ky., Aug. 20.—The most outrageous and cold-blooded assassination which has occurred here for many years was perpetrated Saturday. Edward Callahan, twenty years of age, while sitting on the steps of the Presbyterian church in this city was suddenly shot dead. The ball passed through his heart. There is no trace of the murderer or cause known for the act.

YELLOWSTONE EXPEDITION.

Gen. Stanley Places His Cavalry Commander Under Arrest.

The Dashing Custer Rides one Whole Day as Rear Guard.

And It Was All About a Little Buckskin that Got Spilled.

Here is the Story.

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—A letter just received from the Yellowstone expedition says a sensation was recently caused by the arrest of Gen. Custer by order of Gen. Stanley. Custer marched in the rear of the command one entire day before he was released. Affairs looked quite exciting for a time. Custer's men denounced the arrest as an act of petty tyranny while Stanley's men sustained him. Commander Stanley had caused the destruction of the whiskey in camp. The cavalry sutler saw seven barrels of his corn juice disappear in the earth, while the infantry sutler witnessed a like disposal of seven barrels belonging to his ranch. No further particulars are given but all is supposed to be quiet.

Fort Abraham Lincoln News.
The Post Trader at Fort Lincoln has sold \$55,000 worth of goods since last October.

Work on the barracks progresses rapidly; twenty buildings are already up, some of them two hundred feet long. The rooms formerly occupied by Col. Wilson for his family will next week be converted into a billiard hall and bar. The Col has two tables already on the ground.

Col Wilson's new house is nearly completed. It is a block house, costing \$2,500 and designed for the entertainment of such officers from the cavalry barracks as wish board toin private families.

A school house is being built at Lincoln, in order to give school facilities to the children of officers, soldiers and citizens. There are about twenty or thirty of the little fellows to look after. A teacher has been engaged from St. Paul.

Gen. Custer will have command of the Cavalry Barracks near Fort Lincoln. Six companies of the Seventh Cavalry will be stationed there, four at Fort Rice and two at Fort Totten. The headquarters of the regiment will probably be at Totten.

Wednesday last a workman from Minneapolis named A. Beuschlein broke through a scaffolding falling ten feet. His back was badly injured. Thursday another, named Sharrack, fell a distance of eighteen feet breaking his shoulder and nose. Both are getting along well.

Tax carpenters at the cavalry barracks near Fort A. Lincoln have determined to issue a little weekly paper, devoted to their mutual interests and improvement; C. H. Townsend, editor. The paper will be out Saturday next, and then the Tribune can no longer boast of being published the farthest west, for the "Mechanics Far West" will beat it four miles.

Son of the Stars was at home at Lincoln, and claims to have been born on the site of the Fort. NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—Gen. Rosser's report of the survey of the North Pacific Railroad from the Missouri River to the Yellowstone has been adopted by the board of directors and proposals for grading are invited with a view to the immediate extension West from Bismarck to the coal fields. The directors call for proposals to grade and bridge two hundred and five miles, the distance between the Missouri and the Yellowstone.

Moved by John P. Dunn, that J. S. Warn, Chas. A. Galloway and Thomas Davis, be appointed judges of election for Bismarck precinct. Carried.

Moved by John P. Dunn, that Jos. H. Taylor, Wm. Howard and Chas. Grey, be appointed Judges of election for Painted Woods precinct. Carried.

Moved by John P. Dunn, H. M. Holway, J. F. Ayers and M. O. Hutchinson, be appointed judges of election for Apple Creek precinct. Carried.

Moved, seconded and carried, that the Board adjourn until Sept. 1st, at 2 o'clock p. m.

TERRITORY OF DAKOTA,
County of Burleigh.

Pursuant to the petition of a majority of the legal voters of Township No. 188, in said county: We, the County Commissioners of said county, did, on the 16th day of August, A. D. 1873, at Bismarck, in said county, proceed to fix and determine the boundaries of said town, and to name the same, and did, then and there lay out said town, and designate the boundaries thereof as follows, to-wit: On the West by range 81 and Missouri River, running North to Township 189, thence East on dividing line between townships 188 and 189 to range 80, thence South to Township 187, thence West on dividing line of townships 188 and 187 to place of starting, and did name such town Bismarck, in accordance with the expressed wish of a majority of the legal voters residents therein.

In testimony whereof we have hereunto set our hands and caused the seal of said Board to be affixed this 16th day of August, 1873.
