MOODY AND SANKEY.

They Are Laboring Where they Can Do the Most Good.

And are Making it Red Hot for the Devil in Brooklyn.

Moody and Sankey.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The revival meeting at the Brooklyn Tabernacle was largely attended this morning. An unusually earnest religious sentiment was manifested. There was about 200 requests for prayers. Mr. Moody then read the one hundred and seventh Psalm, and then delivered a short discourse. Deacon Hantry said yesterday in his Sunday school that the closing exercises would be omitted and five hundred scholars remained for prayers. At a meeting of these about 20 arose and asked for prayers and seven professed religion. An inquiry meeting held subsequently a number of wonderful conversions were instanced as proof that the spirit was working in the community. Rev. Fred. Bell announced that thirty souls had been brought to Jesus in his church. Mr. Moody reported that the young men's meeting had resulted in numerous conversions. Mr. Talmadge stated that they had an excellent day yesterday, and 360 new cases for religious inquiry had been presented. Rev. Mr. Steel found that all over the city lukewarm members were becoming earnest workers.

A Steamship Seized.
NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The steamship *Dakota*, of the Williams & Guion line, was seized Saturday, on the complaint of passengers on the steamer *Montana*, recently disabled on a voyage from Liverpool. The owners gave bond for \$21,000, and the steamer was released.

A THIEF IN OFFICE.

A Troy dispatch says that the people of Saratoga county are excited over the defalcation of Henry A. Mann treasurer of the county for the last 15 years. It is known that the sum of his stealings will reach \$140,000, and may largely exceed that amount. Last Wednesday his notes went to protest, and some of his creditors made an investigation, and ascertained that he had kept his credit good for the past two years by illegally issuing \$140,000 worth of county bonds. This disclosure was followed by the failure of Medbury & Mann, paper collar manufacturers of Ballston.

The junior partner in the concern is a son of the delinquent official, and one report is that for some months the firm has been kept out of bankruptcy with money from the county treasury.

Fire.

PROVIDENCE, Nov. 8.—The Clyde mill at Omega village, East Providence, which was to have resumed work to-day, was fired by an incendiary this morning. Owned by Gen. F. Wilson. Insurance, \$26,000, which nearly covers loss.

WHITEHALL, N. Y., Nov. 8.—The fire which broke out here last night was under control at four this morn-

ing and burned the Tule House, the Lake House, G. Bailon's brick block, and other places. Loss will probably exceed \$50,000; insurance \$25,000. Chief engineer Baker, and several firemen were badly injured by a falling wall.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—A telegram from Berlin states that a central government for Alsace and Lorraine will be established at Berlin probably. A special ministry will be created for these provinces.

A telegram from Bombay says the Viceroy Admiral of the fleet, the governor of Bombay, and many distinguished natives have gone on board the steamer *Serapis*, at anchor in the harbor, to meet the Prince of Wales, who will disembark at 4:30 this p.m. Preparations for his reception are immense. There will be a holiday festival all this week.
