### Fire and Moody and Sankey.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—A fire in the five story building, 13 and 15 Murray street, last evening caused the loss of \$35,000, of which Schoemaker & Elteler, lithographers, lost \$25,000. Insured.

Moody and Sankey conducted a meeting in Rev. Dr. Tyng's church, Episcopal, yesterday. The object was to impress upon christians of this city the importance of inquiry meetings and secure a band of men and women ready for work in such meetings when revivalists begin their labors here.

Moody and Sankey want one thousand peculiar people. Three classes come to the meetings—those who criticize; those who enjoy themselves, and those who work. It would revolutionize the world if we could find a thousand christian workers entirely consecrated to Christ. They wanted meetings organized immediately for training christian workers willing to lay aside everything else for the next two months, and under their pastors study the best manner of using the Bible in inquiry meetings. One man or woman working earnestly for souls is worth thousands who do not—who go to prayer meeting to-night and are off to the opera to-morrow night. It is a fact, it takes about one thousand modern christians to make one good one. They wanted one thousand trained workers to gird up their loins, and go out into this city and save men. The people who could not get into Dr. Tyng's church made an overflow meeting in Dr. Hepworth's church.

#### TREASURER NEW WILL NOT RESIGN.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—At a meeting of the first mortgage land grant bond holders of the Des Moines Valley R. R. Co., yesterday, to consider the condition of its finances, it was resolved that the earnings of the road should go to place it in good repair, and that instead of interest they would receive preferred stock until 1876. In the event of these bonds not being sufficient, the managers of the road are to be allowed to use the interest money of 1877 for improving the road.
