### AT THE TOMB.

NATICK, Mass., Dec. 1.—There was a large attendance at the closing ceremonies in honor of Vice President Wilson, notwithstanding the bad weather. The funeral occurred at the residence of his mother-in-law. The exercises began at twelve o'clock.

### Demands a Hearing.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—Gen. Babcock this morning received a telegram from District Attorney Dyer, at St. Louis, in answer to one sent by him yesterday, demanding a hearing before the court, stating that the Avery case had been closed, and the next case involving the question of conspiracy was set for the fifteen of December.

### Sinking of a Hudson River Steamer—Eleven Persons Drowned.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., Dec. 1.—The steamer Sunnyside from Albany was sunk by ice at West Point early this morning. The clerk who is here thinks four or five persons were drowned.

### LATER.

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Dec. 1.—Capt. Woolcott of the steamer Sunnyside from Albany, reports his vessel cut into by the ice at 2 o'clock this morning. He ran her ashore but she broke into and slipped into deep water and sunk. He reports eleven persons drowned, six of whom were waiters and chambermaids on the boat; remainder passengers. The steamer is sunk to her hurricane deck, and ice is cutting her upper deck away rapidly. For two hours fifty or sixty persons were hanging to rods and masts of the promenade deck before they could be got off.

### CHICAGO ITEMS.

CHICAGO, Dec. 1.—D. W. Munn, formerly supervisor of the southern district of Illinois, has been arrested, and his trial, on charge of implication in whisky frauds, will commence this afternoon.

### SENATOR LOGAN.

Senator Logan is rather better this morning, but his friends still consider his condition critical.

### PRESIDENT MAKING.

The national committee of Independence, composed of representatives of granges throughout the north-western states, met here this afternoon and effected an organization. Their business is the consideration of questions of the next president, and to take steps toward the nomination of a man whom the grangers can support.

### Woodbined.

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—B. & H. Lawrence, heavy stationers in Maiden Lane, have failed.

### The Way of the Transgressor.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—For the murder of Harriet Lane, at White Chapel Road, in 1874, Henry Wainwright was sentenced to death and his brother Henry to seven years penal servitude as accessory.

### Engineer Killed.

CINCINNATI, Dec. 1.—John Mack, engineer on the O. & M. R. R. was run over and instantly killed while at work under his engine yesterday at Moores station.

### Denounced.

BALTIMORE, Dec. 1.—The meeting to express condemnation of the manner in which the election in this city of Nov. 2d was conducted was held last night and was numerously attended. Resolutions were passed which denounced the conduct of the police commissioners and opposing ex-commissioners to contest several elections.

### FOREIGN.

#### OBITUARY.

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—News was received yesterday in Washington of the death in China of Hon. Benj. P. Avery, American minister to that country, appointed two years ago to succeed Minister Lour.

#### SILK MANUFACTURES.

The stated value of silk manufactures landed in this port since Nov. 1st is \$965,380, and since first July \$10,340,489, against \$1,075,170 and \$10,494,153 for the corresponding dates last year. Since July 1st 4099 bales have been received, an increase of 25 per cent. over same months in 1874.

#### Fire.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 1.—A fire broke out about 1 o'clock this morning in the round house of the Indianapolis, Bloomington & Western R. R. on the west side of the river. There were eight engines in the house at the time and all were badly burned before the fire engines arrived. Loss on engines is estimated at \$40,000 to \$50,000, and on building \$15,000 to \$20,000.

#### Canal Closed.

SAULT ST. MARIE, Mich., Dec. 1.—The guard gates of the canal will be closed to-day. Ice is unusually thick for this time of the year.

#### Probable Suicide.

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—A London dispatch states that the wife of Hon. Hugh Childers was found dead in her bed at her husband's residence yesterday morning. A bottle containing chloroform was found beside her.

#### Four Mash Victims.

MILWAUKEE, Dec. 1.—Schlitz & Bergenthal, rectifiers, convicted of shipping goods without entering the same as required by law, were this morning sentenced to pay a fine of one thousand dollars each, and four months imprisonment in the county jail.

#### An Insane Murderer.

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—Judge Barrett to-day sent John Scannell, acquitted of the murder of Thos. Donahue, on the ground of insanity, to the insane asylum at Utica.

#### The Government Printing.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—The report of the superintendent of public printing shows that the total cost of printing, binding, lithographing etc., for the government for the year ending Sept. 30, last, was \$1,560,425; the congressional record cost \$88,959 additional. Nearly all printing ordered by the last congress is completed. There were twelve thousand employees in all the departments with a pay roll of \$95,000 a month. Compositors get sixty cents per one thousand ems or four dollars a day for eight hours.
