President Grant's Seventh Annual Message Completed and Approved by the Cabinet.

Extensive Fires at Cincinnati and Lewiston, Maine.

Another School Girl Murdered while Walking through the Woods.

Identification of the Woman found Packed in a Barrel in Chicago.

WASHINGTON.

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The president's message was approved by the cabinet yesterday, to whom it was carefully read. To-day manifold copies are being made for the press.—The exact length has not been ascertained, though it will be considerably longer than previous messages. It cannot be yet ascertained whether it will be sent to congress on Monday or Tuesday; this will depend on the time consumed in the organization of the house, or of the reception of the notification by the president of the fact.

SECRETARY OF THE TREASURY.

The report of the secretary of the treasury on finances is in press. It will be about the same length as such previous reports. His estimates will not, it is said, exceed those of last year. They have not yet been printed, but copies will be laid on the desks of members of congress Monday.

CALLING.

Judge Richardson called on Sec'y Bristow to-day. Many members of congress visited the executive mansion to see the president.

Fire.

CINCINNATI, Dec. 3.—Early this morning a building in the rear of the Methodist book concern, owned by Mr. Fletcher, was totally destroyed by fire. Loss, \$40,000; partially insured.

LATER.

By the fire this morning Fletcher's loss on building is \$25,000, insured \$14,000; in Valley of Cincinnati, \$2,500; Bertin of Covington, \$2,500. Imaldson & Co., lithographers, estimate their loss at \$18,000, insured for \$15,000, companies not known. Black & Co. lose \$25,000 by water, fully insured. Frank, Thomas & Co. lose \$30,000, insured in local companies. F. W. Brown was unable to estimate his loss. He holds a policy for \$10,000 in the Etina, and \$20,000 in the Amazon, which will cover all damage. The Laundry company lose \$2,000 with little or no insurance.

Another girl murdered in the Woods. WATERTOWN, N. Y., Dec. 3.—Sarah Conkling, age 14, was murdered Tuesday, while returning from school through a piece of woods in Rutland. A boy named Rutar, age 16, has been arrested.

The Barreled Dead.

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—The body of the woman taken from Graceland cemetery and sent in a barrel to the U. S. Express Company's office here, has been identified as that of Mrs. Emma H. Adams, wife of a prominent hardware merchant. She was buried on the 20th of November last. Adams is at present in New York. Dr. Wilder, who directed the robbery of the grave, has not yet been found, though officers are on his track.

Suspended. NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—The suspension of the varnish house of Adolphus G. Mardel, 25 Pearl st. is announced.

\$100,000 Gone to Blazes.

LOUISION, Me., Dec. 3.—Dyehouse Bates' mill burned last night. Estimated loss one hundred thousand dollars.

Fatal Explosion.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—An explosion in Chas. Nelson's pyrotechnic factory in east New York this morning killed one man and slightly injured several and demolished one side of the building.

The Weather.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Probabilities for the upper Mississippi, and lower Missouri valleys: Warmer and cloudy or hazy weather with southeast wind, followed by rising barometer and cold north wind.

Obituary.

BALTIMORE, Dec. 3.—Charles S. Abell, aged 27, a son of A. S. Abell, proprietor of the Baltimore Sun, died this morning of typhoid fever. He was a graduate of Georgetown College, and a favorite contributor to the columns of the Sun.

International Rowing Match.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—A Springfield, Mass., dispatch states that the rowing association of American colleges voted to challenge Oxford and Cambridge of England, and Trinity of Dublin, to row them a six oared race without coxswains at the American college regatta in 1876. The time is the 3d Wednesday of July, and place Saratoga, New London or Springfield, whose bids will be acted upon at an adjourned meeting in New York, Jan. 4th. Philadelphia which had been proposed is out of the question. New England colleges are anti-Saratoga, and divided between Springfield and New London. All the other colleges are for Saratoga. Thos. Hughes, of England, was elected referee; Mr. Chitty, of London rowing club, alternate.
