A Fragment of Political News From New Orleans.

Captain Tobin, of Springfield, Has Something to Say About Brigham's Massacre.

Trouble in Montreal Between Catholics and Orangemen.

Three of the Latter Killed in a Conflict To-Day.

The Military Ordered Out and Intense Excitement Prevailing.

The New York Orangemen Conclude Not to Parade.

THE DOMINION.

ALL IS QUIET.

Montreal, July 12.—Everything is quiet here this morning, with the exception of a crowd at Dalhousi and Wellington streets, taking orange flowers from the breasts of many men. Nothing of any importance happened. No violence offered. The police are under arms and effectively distributed.

Montreal, July 12.—A stranger wearing the orange lily has been shot dead on Victoria square.

Immense crowds are gathering, but all peaceable so far. Anxiety and dread is visible on every countenance.

ONE O'CLOCK P. M.

The Orangemen express indignation at the manner in which the ribbon men line the streets, as if to intimidate them. The Orangemen affirm their intention to keep their bargain, but if interfered with in coming out of church, there will be blood shed. Some shots have been fired, but no collision. Prominent politicians are trying to quiet the Irish Catholics, but the latter it is said, intend to have a demonstration to-night. This will cause trouble.

ONE-THIRTY P. M.

Trouble is just beginning. Two men have been killed and about fifteen shots have been fired. Two women got into a fight, because one snatched from the bosom of the other an orange lily. This occasioned a general row, and a man with a cloak suit, who had been especially prominent, was pursued into a store, shot three times in the head and instantly killed. The police are now interfering. The troops have been ordered to be in readiness in various places of the dominion.

F. C. Hackett, is the name of the man killed. He is supposed to be from Toronto, and is a Protestant. Three persons are wounded; the great lacrosse player, Giroux, and a painter named Boone, dangerously; the third, a woman, is wounded in the leg. This riot occurred in an attack by a mob on two ladies, wearing orange colors, while coming from church. Three men, of whom the deceased was one, attempted to rescue them, and they were attacked and pursued. They took refuge in the store of Mr. Dunn, where it is said Hackett fired a shot at the crowd, when revolvers were turned upon him and some fifty shots fired. The excitement is increasing and the streets are crowded, but has just begun raining and the storm may disperse the crowds.

2:30 P. M.

The rain is over and crowds are out again.

EXTRA—3 O'CLOCK P. M.

Montreal, July 12.—The whole of the volunteer force, including field batteries, were ordered out. The excitement is increasing. It is rumored the Catholic Union men being all supplied with arms and ball cartridges.

NEW YORK.

THE ORANGEMEN CELEBRATION.

New York, July 12.—The Orangemen of this city have abandoned public parades as a part of their celebration of July 12th, and will content themselves to-day by an excursion. Dancing will be the order of the day and evening. An opening grand march is being dedicated to President Hayes. It is expected that nearly all the grand lodge officers will be present and deliver short addresses, and that the festivities will be participated in by fully two thousand Orangemen and their friends.

FAILURE.

New York, July 12.—John H. Krier, ring plumber, has failed. His sworn statement shows the assets to be nothing. Liabilities nearly \$300,000.

ANOTHER.

Battle & Lee, in straw goods trade suspended. Liabilities not known.

THE U. S. LOAN.

New York, July 12.—The members of the syndicate have advised of a United States, 4 per cent. loan opened in London at 102½, half per cent. higher than here.

JOHN SHERMAN.

New York, July 12.—A special from New Orleans says Madison Wells has received a letter from John Sherman, which he states is bitter against the people for violating what he says was the terms of agreement. He further says the letter scouts all danger to himself as accessory, but that the matter will only serve to show the people in a true light.

RACES.

Long Branch, July 2.—At Mouthmouth park the first race of a mile was between Yorkshire Las Faithless Chambers and Cyril and in this order they passed under the string-time 1.47½. Frederick the Great, won the second race in two straight heats. Reform and Bungoo, second, time 1.47.

MISCELLANEOUS.

THE TRAIN WRECKERS.

St. Louis, July 12.—Later advices from Waynesville say that late yesterday afternoon the counsel for the train wreckers moved for a continuance which the judge granted. He said there were ten men engaged in the diabolical deed and that it will be proved at the trial that they intended to murder every person on the train; that they had clubs in readiness to brain those who were too badly hurt to run, and to shoot all who attempted to escape. Bodies were to be piled in the wreck, the torch applied and all evidences of crime were expected to be destroyed by flames.

THE MOUNTAIN MEADOW MASSACRE.

Springfield Ills., July 12.—Capt. John Tobin, formerly resident of California, later of St. Louis, and still later of Springfield, will be one of District Attorney Howard's principal witnesses, to prove Brigham Young's personal connection with the massacre of the Gentiles. His name is mentioned in Lee's confession. He tells a long story which is in substance that having gained the confidence of Brigham by aiding the Mormon immigrants, he was appointed instructor of the territory militia, which position he resigned because squads of cavalry were used as avengers. Subsequently he undertook to guide a party of three strong, outspoken anti-Mormons to California but the party was overtaken by a band of mounted Mormons, led by Brigham Young, Jr., and compelled to stop under pretense that they were going to California to misrepresent Mormonism. They finally proceeded, but were continually dogged by the Mormons, who at length fired on them as they were encamping at night. The party were left for dead and the Mormons taking their horses rode away. Sixty hours afterwards an United States mail wagon and party en route for San Bernardino, took them up, but two died soon after. He claims to have important documentary evidence of plotting against the government and the Gentiles, on part of Brigham Young.

FOREIGN.

General Grant Arrives at Frankfurt-on-the-Main.

The Bombardment of Rustchuk Resumed.

Various Military Movements in Various Places.

GENERAL GRANT.

Frankfort-on-the-Main, July 12.—Ex President Grant and party arrived this morning from Weissen, they were received at the station by the American consul general and a reception committee. The American residents hoisted flags in honor of the occasion.

THE U. S. LOAN.

London, July 12.—The American four per cents are at par.

EARL BEACONSFIELD.

London, July 12.—The resignation of Earl Beaconsfield was never contemplated.

WAR ITEMS.

Rustchuk, July 12.—Several Bulgarians were arrested, charged with assisting the Russians and fermenting insurrection, and also with distributing petroleum to fire the town.

Up to June 28th, there were in Rustchuk 200 persons killed and wounded by the bombardment.

Adrianople, July 12.—The Russian cavalry is at Chipka Pass.

London, July 12.—A dispatch from Alexandria says that forces with 24 cannons and fourteen thousand Remington rifles leaving Sadowa for the frontier to encounter the revolted tributary.

King Merlek, king of Abyssinia, expressed his willingness to resign in favor of Alamo, son of late King Theodore.

London, July 12.—The bombardment of Rustchuk recommenced Tuesday, during which the Russians attempted to take the town by assault, but were repulsed after two hours' fighting.

War Supplies For France.

Chicago, July 10.—The *Inter Ocean* publishes as a portentous fact that during the past fortnight secret agents from the French government have arrived in this city, whose presents here are unknown to but few in France and fewer here. They have recently contracted with a few large firms of Chicago packers for an immense quantity of army supplies. The contracts specify not only the quantity and quality of the supplies, but the manner of their preservation and the amount of rations in each package. A condensed soup capable of preservation for a long period and of speedy preparation has been contracted for. Similar agents have in a few other larger cities of this country and in Canada. Enough food has been ordered to sustain a large army during a long campaign. The *Inter Ocean* considers these operations significant in view of the condition of western Europe.
