NEW YORK.

SYMPATHIZING WITH CUBA.

New York, July 13.—A strong delegation of colored men were waiting yesterday upon the executive committee of the Cuban league, and gave a formal expression of sympathy to the colored residents of this city with struggling Cuba. Petitions will be sent to President Hayes and congress, urging upon the government to take such immediate action as will tend the most speedily to wipe out forever the foul blot of slavery.

AT AUCTION SALE.

New York, July 13.—It is semi-officially announced that the Pennsylvania coal company will sell one hundred thousand tons of Pittston coal, by auction, on the 26th inst., and that the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railway company will follow suit with 150,000 tons of Scranton coal on the 27th.

THE SMUGGLING RING.

New York, July 13.—Through confessions made by several members of the silk and lace smuggling ring, three trunks have been secured containing a mass of invoices, bills of lading, cancelled checks and private letters. These papers will be used to secure the arrest of implicated parties, and as evidence against them on the prosecution.

FINANCIAL.

New York, July 13.—Treasurer of the Chicago Rock Island and Pacific Railroad Company, says over four million of the seven per. cents have been exchanged for the forty year sixes.

WASHINGTON.

CALLING FOR VOLUNTEERS.

Washington, July 13.—A dispatch from Lewiston, states that Gen Mc Dowell, has been authorized to call for two or five hundred volunteers in Arizona or Washington territory according to necessity; also stated officially that Joseph's band has considerable reinforcements. From other telegrams it seems there has been great trouble in forwarding troops. The cabinet considered these facts as soon as received here, and ordered a call of two hundred volunteers to be made as it was recommended by Gen. McDowell, and that he should have authority to increase it to five hundred.

THE CIVIL SERVICE RULES.

Washington, July 13.—J. P. Hamelton secretary of the Kansas republican association called on the president to ascertain whether the civil service rules applied to persons holding an office in various states for assessments. The president said if assessments were of a social character there was no objection to their continuance, but politics must be eschewed. The president distinctly stated that no political services can be rendered by government employee at any time, while he holds such a position, even though it does not interfere with his duties as it is, the president's intention to forever divorce politics and civil service, so far as in him lies the power.

THE DOMINION.

LITTLE BLOODSHED.

Montreal, July 13.—Arrests were fewer than expected during the night, which passed comparatively quietly. The coroner's inquiry on the Hackitt case was postponed till to-morrow. The Orangemen and presidents of national societies held a conference this morning, for the

purpose of calling an indignation meeting to condemn the mayor's inefficiency in protecting life yesterday. Boone reported dead will probably recover.

MISCELLANEOUS.

ACCIDENT.

St. Louis, July 13.—The south bound passenger train on the St. Louis & Cairo narrow gauge railroad jumped the track on an eighteen foot trestle yesterday, six miles from Murphysboro, and the whole train, excepting the locomotive was precipitated into Rattlesnake creek. Almost every passenger on the train was injured. Charles Pink, ex-messenger was internally—will probably die.

ANOTHER.

Two convict miners, working at J. & B. Price's mines at Talmade station, near Sedalia, Mo., were crushed to death yesterday, by the caving in of the roof of the mine in which they were working.

CAME TO AN UNDERSTANDING.

Brownsville, July 13.—Generals Cavales and Dewin have come to an agreement regarding the suppression of raids, and think they can render the passage of troops unnecessary. Cavales thinks the orders to Gen'l Ord were disrespectful to the Diaz government, but waives that and will aid our authorities to insure peace. It is generally believed that Gen'l Escobedo will attempt to prepare an expedition to invade Mexico.

PAID THE PENALTY.

Charleston, July 13.—David Pearce and Geo. Stevens, negroes, who brutally murdered a young man named Edings, near here, may 11th, were executed this morning. They were baptized by a Catholic priest, with whom they left a confession.

FOREIGN.

Heavy Battle in Cuba.

The Russians Suffer Severe Loss and Defeat Before Bayazid.

Severe Fighting in the Vicinity of Kars.

A BATTLE.

Havana, July 8.—It is reported that Generals Maximo Gomez and Vincetegaricia, leading a very large and well appointed force, have forced Trocha and invaded Cinco Villas territory. A battle was fought at the crossing, in which over 600 Spaniards are said to have been killed, among them, a brigadier general, supposed to be Mendinna. Since then another heavy encounter has taken place and considerable trepidation prevailed at the headquarters here. Gen'l. Martinez Campos is reduced to a masterly inactivity from decimated condition. His troops, discontent is rampant among almost all class of people. financial stringency is becoming serious.

THE CABLEGRAM.

London, July 13.—The direct United States, cable company, to-day ratified without division the adoption of resolutions, approving a joint purse with an Anglo-American company, for liquidation of the company.

WAR ITEMS.

London, July 13.—A dispatch from Erzeroum states an attempt of the Russians, under Gen'l. Tergukassoff, to relieve the besieged garrison at Bayazid, has failed notwithstanding Russians after suffering a severe loss the garrison made a determined sortie. The retreated to mount Ararat, where they were again defeated. The Turks took many prisoners and six guns. A new Turkish army is to be raised for the defence of the Balkans.

London, July 13.—A dispatch from Kars, July 8, says yesterday Mukhtar, Pasha with 18 field and 6 mountain guns, 500 regular and 3,500 irregular of cavalry, and thirty battalions of infantry, advanced from Kirkbunan to Wahian Kale, 8 miles south of Kars, and this morning Mukhtar Pasha rode in leaving his forces entrenched at Wahian Kale. Sir Arnold Kinnball, British military attache, also come in and went over to the batteries on the Karidagh redoubt, position where the bombardment has been the heaviest. Yesterday there was very a heavy firing on both sides. The

Russian headquarters are at Zeaim, 8 miles northeast, but their batteries are advanced to within 4,000 yards east.

The Turkish loss during the siege has been trifling; that of the Russians is unknown. Their fire was not accurate, and for some days has been overwhelming. Over 2,000 shells, from fifteen and eighteen centimetre guns were thrown into the place in one day. Mukhtar Pasha proposes to entrench himself and revictual Kars for the winter. At present is well supplied with stores and ammunition and prices are cheaper than in Erzeroum. The appearance of the troops is excellent and their health good. They are most enthusiastic. The officers seem well educated. The place is almost impregnable.
