SENATOR GROVER INVESTIGATION.

Portland, June 14.—The testimony to-day was entirely for the purpose of proving the good character of witness Stiles, which was apparently proved. Some of the recusant witnesses have arrived. There is great interest in their testimony. Grover's friends claim they will positively swear they got no proposition for money.

JOSEPH'S BAND.

News is received that Joseph's band surprised 31 Chinamen who were paddling down Clear water, in a canoe, for pastime, inhumanly killed the whole party but one who escaped. A letter says that Joseph is smart enough to take advantage of the Howard slow movements, and flank him continually. The impression seems to be that the Flat Heads are not going to join in this war.

FAILURE.

St. Louis, July 14.—D. W. Chambers, president of the Butchers and Drovers bank announces the suspension of that bank. He says only fifty per cent. of the capital stock has been paid, giving \$130,000 to be derived from that source, if found necessary to secure the depositors. He also says he has wife and sisters which stand ready to give deeds of trust on several thousand dollars worth of property, to secure any balance due the depositors, provided such time as may be necessary to realize on the assets of the bank, is given him. The suspension of the bank grows out of a run on the bank a year or two ago, which took from it nearly one million dollars. Although the bank had partially recovered from that recent failure it created such distrust that its suspension was found necessary.

AN EXPLOSION.

Allentown, Pa., July 14.—Four men were killed and 8 injured by the explosion of a boiler in Kelder's ore mills, at Millerstown, Lehigh Co. The name of the killed are Aaron Miller, engineer, and 3 workmen, Lamb, Rupp, and Andrews. Among the fatally injured one Henry Heunback, and 2 of Aaron Miller's sons. Several horses and mules were killed. The engine house and boilers are a total wreck.

DECIDED IN FAVOR OF THE GOVERNMENT. Chicago, July 14.—In the United States district court this morning, Judge Blodgett decided that the case of the government claim against F. D. Hessing should be reopened.

AN ABORTIVE PLOT.

The warden of the Penitentiary, at Joliet having discovered a plot of the prisoners in that institution to escape to-day, seized nineteen of the ring leaders yesterday afternoon, and put them in solitary confinement.

A COMPLIMENTARY ADIEU.

Boston, July 14.—James Russel Lowell, minister to Spain, sailed to-day for Liverpool. A party of distinguished persons went down to the harbor with him and a salute of fifteen guns was fired from the navy yard.

NEW YORK.

TO COMPETE WITH THE SCOTCH. New York, July 14.—Five prize American oxen were shipped to-day for Europe, to compete with the Scotch oxen at the Falkirk tyrist.

THE UNITED STATES LOAN.

Subscriptions to the new United States four per cent bonds amounted at the opening of business to-day to \$31,000,000. It would now cause no surprise that before the closing of the books at three o'clock Monday the subscriptions should run from

\$45,000,000 to \$50,000,000.

It is well understood that many large subscriptions are held back for the last day.

BANK STATEMENT.

New York, July 14.—Bank statement reserve decrease \$7,474,225.

FOR EUROPE.

New York, July 14.—Five steamships leave this port to-day for Europe. Among the passengers are Major General Sir H. W. Norman, of the army; Prof. Vincent, representative of the London syndicate of mining; General J. H. Van Allen, General G. W. McCook, Isquarles, United States consul, at Malaga; Geo. Sarter, Lanner, United States consul, at Belgium, and the venerable Arch Deacon Elsworth, of Canada. One steamship takes out more than ten thousand packages of butter, the largest shipment ever made from the United States.

AN AGREEMENT.

New York, July 14.—The creditors of George H. Wolf & Co., wholesale dry-goods dealers, Worth St. and Cincinnati, are accepting a settlement of 55 cents on a dollar, eleven cents payable in cash, and the remainder in endorsed notes at 3, 6, 9 and 12 months. The firm owes \$500,000.

THE DOMINION.

CORONER'S INQUEST.

Montreal, July 13.—The coroner commenced this morning taking evidence on the body of Hackett. Dr. Pewig after the post mortem examination testified he found a bullet wound in the brain and another in the shoulder. The first sufficient to cause death. The inquest then adjourned till Monday. Some important information has been received by detective officers, and indications are that several persons concerned in the shooting will be arrested to-day. The arrangements for the funeral of Hackett, on Monday, have been completed. The remains will be conveyed to the Orange hall this evening, and forty Orangemen will keep guard each night, till Monday. The hearse will be drawn by four horses. The members of the local lodges will be reinforced by large numbers from other cities.

FOREIGN.

Paris Elections to Occur in September.

Complaints From Germany About the Treatment of Its Subjects by Both Contending Armies.

THE NEW ELECTION.

Paris, July 14.—According to the best informed sources, the elections will be held on the 16th of September, and the second ballot on the 30th day of the same month. The chamber will meet on the 8th day of October. A list of the official candidates was settled after much difficulty. It seems to comprise 239 bonapartists, 176 legitimists and 117 orleanists.

WAR ITEMS.

Berlin, July 14.—The German settlers in Debrudsicha are seriously suffering from the war. The German government has complained to Russia and Turkey of their ill treatment by soldiers of both countries.

Giurgevo, July 14.—From a close inspection of various batteries at Siobosia, and from the observation of the Turkish positions facing them, it is perfectly explicable that the damage done both to Rustchuk and Siobosia may have been caused in the course of the engagements without either the Turks or Russians having designedly attempted to destroy dwellings, or consulates.
