FOREIGN.

THE CHURCH IN AMERICA.

Rome, July 21.—It is stated that the pope, wishing to place the American church on an equality with the church in Europe, has expressed a desire that the church in America should be directly subject to the pontiff, instead of being governed through the intermediary of the cardinal prefect of propaganda. Cardinal Simeoni is understood to have taken steps in this sense and concordats are stated to have been concluded and a papal nuncio appointed.

A PRESS ATTACK.

Paris, July 21.—The Gaulois attacks the French government for not fulfilling its engagements towards Bonapartists. It says the party is not willing to be absorbed. The government must reckon with it. If not, the Bonapartists will remain neutral till they see an opportunity to intervene in the sense of an appeal to the people.

WAR ITEMS.

London, July 21.—The third pontoon bridge over the Danube has been constructed at Kahoza.

Only 2,000 Turks were captured at Nicopolis. The remainder were killed, wounded or escaped.

A telegram from the consul at Galatz states that four vessels, containing about 200 cubic yards of stone, have been sunk by the Russians in the Salina branch of the Danube, a mile and a half below the upper entrance. About 500 cubic yards of additional stones were thrown on the top of these vessels, and the depth of water in the channel is reduced to four feet.

A dispatch from Widdin says that yesterday a large force of Russians attacked the Turks under Osman Pasha, covering Plevna. Osman Pasha made a successful defense. After a conflict of ten hours the Russians were defeated and retreated, abandoning their dead and wounded. The Ottoman loss is comparatively small.

WASHINGTON.

VOLUNTEERS WORSE THAN USELESS.

Washington, July 21.—Gen. McDowell transmits a telegram from his aid, Lt. Keeler, in which he says volunteers of character and status of those operating with Gen. Howard would be worse than useless. If you had been here during their operations, I am sure you would discourage the use of volunteers in any possible emergency.

Montreal, July 21.—The coroners jury in the case of Hackett, orangin killed here on the 12th of July, gave a verdict of murder by person or persons unknown.

Rio Grand City, July 21.—Great excitement prevails. Gen. Escobedo and his staff were arrested before daylight this morning by Colonel Price, of the United States army, commanding Ringgold Barracks. Escobedo intended to cross the river to-day or to-morrow, after receiving arms by this morning's boat.
