## THE LATE STRIKE.

**Absolute Quiet Reigns In St. Louis.**

**In Chicago Everything is Peaceable.**

**Pittsburg Sends Intelligence of Quiet and Good Order.**

**Peace Prevails Throughout the Length and Breadth of the Land.**

### RESUMING WORK.

Buffalo, July 30.—At a meeting of the employees of the Buffalo division of the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern railroad it was resolved that all engineers, firemen and brakemen return to-day and that the company announce the resumption of freight trains.

### AT WORK AGAIN.

Columbus, July 30.—The P. C. and I. C. are receiving freight as usual. The Panhandle will start this afternoon. The strikers held the trains on the C. C. and I. C.

### ABSOLUTE QUIET REIGNS.

St. Louis, July 30.—Absolute quiet reigns throughout St. Louis this morning and business is generally resumed. The Merchants and Cotton exchange reopened and everything is rapidly returning to its normal condition. Some manufacturing establishments are still closed for want of coal, but that article will be abundant again in a day or two when there will be a complete resumption of business in all its departments. At the Four Courts all is quiet and military headquarters are nearly deserted.

### ALL IS LOVELY IN CHICAGO.

Chicago, July 30.—But little trouble is experienced this morning in resuming the order of things prevailing before the labor troubles. The expected engineers' strike has not yet occurred and all roads except the Lake Shore and the Chicago Burlington & Quincy have resumed both freight and passenger traffic. The latter has been annoyed by the recalcitrants at Burlington, who refuse to allow business to go on.

A considerable number of lumber shovers on the south branch of the Chicago river struck this morning, but have made no demonstration.

The first regiment returned from Braidwood this morning and will go to Galesburg to-day to insure safety to the C. B. & Q. trains at that point.

No serious trouble is reported in this city or in the northwest.

### THE SITUATION AT PITTSBURG.

Pittsburg, July 30.—Everything is quiet to-day and the strike among the railroad employees is to all appearances ended. On the Pittsburg division of the B. & O. road freights east and west are now arriving and departing on schedule time, and all freight offices are open for the receipt and delivery of freight. All passenger trains are also arriving and departing on time. Several extra trains from the east are placed on the road, including fast fruit trains for the accommodation of shippers on the Pennsylvania road. Stock trains are being moved as rapidly as possible and trains which have been delayed along the line are arriving.

The first three trains were sent with military, but no trouble occurring that method was abandoned. The Pittsburg & Ft. Wayne shopmen all resumed work this morning along the whole road and engineers and firemen have been notified that they can have their old engines by reporting immediately for duty. Passenger trains arrive and depart on time. Freight is not yet moving much but it is expected they will start to-day. Arrests are frequent.

### RESOLVED TO CONTINUE.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., July 30.—Two thousand five hundred miners have just resolved to continue the strike and stop pumps until the 25 per cent advance is conceded.

### NEIGHBORHOOD NEWS.

One hundred and fifty harvesters and reapers have been sold in Sioux Falls this season.

The recent sore throat epidemic which prevailed among the children in Bon Homme county so malignantly has entirely disappeared, and all those who were suffering therefrom are now convalescent.

Springfield Times, 26th: Grain harvest is in full blast in this county, and fully one-half of the wheat and oat crop will be cut this week. Never before in the history of this county has the crop of cereals promised such a large average yield, and farmers are all in high glee over their abundant harvest.

Elk Point is to organize a juvenile temperance society.

There are two thousand healthy shade trees in Elk point and they add greatly to the beauty of the place.

Niobrara Pioneer: Mr. Jos. H. Steer, whom we mentioned recently as having been discharged from the Santee Agency,

has been reinstated. Petitions have been circulated among the Indians by both parties, but the one paying for his retention considerably outnumbers the other.

Parties who are good authority on the subject, say that the Bon ans in the Niobrara valley have the finest wheat they ever saw any place, and they have traveled extensively in a number of states in the union.

Sioux Falls Pantagraph: Some unworthy perpetrator of veracity has telegraphed to a Wisconsin newspaper that Dakota's wheat crop has been injured one tenth part by the grasshoppers. A more wholesale fabrication could not possibly have been invented. On the contrary the hoppers have, as a general thing, left wheat entirely alone, and the whole amount of their depredations thus far, giving the largest margin possible, will not amount to one two hundredth part of the entire crop growing.

Boston, July 30.—Herbert Blanchard, of Savory, Mass, was ordered to discontinue his visits to the daughter of E. Trask. He met that gentleman in church yesterday and shot him dead and fatally wounded a brother, and missed a third shot at a woman.

### FOUND WITHOUT ERROR.

Washington, July 30.—The committee examining the affairs of the office of the United States treasurer upon the transfer of the office from Wyman to Gillfillan, have completed their investigation. During Wyman's term of office there was received into the treasury and paid out over seven hundred and forty million dollars without error, excepting one of less than five dollars. The surplus in the treasury is in very nearly the same condition as a year ago.
