### HOME NEWS.

**Virginia Conservatives Attempt to Organize a State Convention.**

**And are Met with Shouts, Hisses, Groans and Other Unpleasant Noises.**

**The Chatanqua National Assembly Still at Work.**

### MISCELLANEOUS.

**THE NATIONAL ASSEMBLY.**  
Fairpoint, N. Y., Aug. 8.—The regular normal and drill exercises of the Chatanqua National Assembly commenced this morning. Frank Beard instructed the children at 8 o'clock. At 11 o'clock Rev. W. E. Crafts, of New York, lectured on the struggle of the child, in the place of Rev. J. C. Cook, who speaks this afternoon on "Conscience." The daily attendance is already very large.

**CONSERVATISM IS UNPOPULAR.**  
Richmond, Aug. 8.—The Virginia conservative state convention met at noon in the theatre here, but owing to an indiscriminate issue of admission tickets, or otherwise, that part of the building set apart for delegates was so overcrowded by outsiders that when an effort was made to call the convention to order with a view of temporary organization it proved a signal failure. The utmost confusion and disorder prevailed, shouts, hisses and all manner of noises drowned the voices of all those who endeavored to bring order out of chaos. After half an hour had elapsed and no progress had been made towards an organization, a motion to adjourn till 2 p. m. was adopted. The state committee is now perfecting a plan for the proper seating of delegates.

**FATALITY IN A WELL.**  
Iowa City, Iowa, Aug. 8.—Carl Zimmer, a young man nineteen years old, died from foul air while working in a well near Morse station yesterday morning.

### THE LATEST BY MAIL.

There was an election in Kentucky on Monday, at which members of the legislature were chosen.

St. Boniface hospital at St. Louis, burned Monday morning. No lives were lost. Total loss, \$40,000; insurance, \$17,000.

Jay Gould and forty-seven others were each fined \$250 on Monday for failing to answer when called as petit jurors.

Ex-Chief Justice Upton, of Oregon, will succeed C. C. Carpenter, who retires October 1 from the office of the second comptroller of the treasury.

The main building of the Wesleyan female college at Murfreesboro, N. C. burned Monday night. Loss, \$75,000; insurance, \$30,000.

The workmen of Louisville elected five out of seven candidates in the legislature over the regular democratic nominees of the city of Louisville on Monday.

A fire is raging in the cedar brush near Bertie station, Canada, about nine miles from Buffalo, on the new trunk railroad. Six miles have been burned over.

Capt. H. C. Corbin, of the Twenty-fourth infantry, recently on duty at the executive mansion, has been ordered to Columbus barracks, Ohio, to report to the superintendent general of the recruiting service.

The executive committee of the Vermont centennial commission announces a programme for the celebration of the 15th and 17th. It includes a welcome and reception by President Hayes, processions, orations, reviews, banquets, concerts, etc.

The Morton house stables, Indian Harbor, Conn., were destroyed by an incendiary fire early Monday morning. Thirty-six horses and a large number of carriages, belonging for the most part to New Yorkers, were burned. The loss is over \$40,000. The coachmen escaped by leaping from the windows.

A terrific wind and rain storm, somewhat the nature of a tornado, passed over Council Bluffs at an early hour Monday morning. So far as can be learned no particular damage was done except at the deaf and dumb institution, three miles southeast of town. A new wing in process of completion 102 by 52 feet in size and three stories high was leveled to the first story and a portion of the material carried a distance of a mile.

### FIRES.

**AT ONTARIO.**  
Aylmer, Ont., Aug. 8.—A fire this morning in the business portion of the town destroyed seven buildings, including the Commercial Hotel, A Murray's store, Hambridge's bakery and confectionery store, Gundry Bros. drug store, White's gens' furnishing store, Wright's bakery and Farething's dry goods store.

Paris, Aug. 8.—The Journal Des Debats announces that the czar has just recrossed the Danube.

### APPOINTMENT.

London, Aug. 8.—In the house of commons this afternoon the appointment of War H. Smith as one of the joint secretaries to the treasury, as successor of Right Hon. Geo. Ward Hunt, first lord of the admiralty, deceased, was announced officially.

### THE FAMINE.

Calcutta, Aug. 8.—The famine is increasing in Madras presidency.

### CUBAN ITEMS.

New York, Aug. 8.—A Havana letter records a number of disastrous business failures with increasing commercial and financial trouble. Gen. Jovellan has been relieved from the command and Gen. Blanco appointed. He will arrive in a few weeks. Sick and wounded soldiers are constantly arriving and the hospital room is taxed to its utmost.

### EGYPT THREATENED.

London, Aug. 8.—A Daily News special from Alexandria says it is rumored that the Abyssinians are massing troops on the Egyptian frontier and threaten a descent on Egyptian territory unless the traitor Walda Mikail is delivered up immediately. Gen. Gordon is expected on the frontier shortly to prevent further complications.

### A DANGEROUS EXPERIMENT.

The Standard understands that Dr. Butt will resign his seat for Limerick and offer himself for re-election in order to decisively test the opinion of the people of Ireland as to the relative authority of himself and Mr. Parnell.

### BAD FOR THE BOYS.

Kingston, Jamaica, Aug. 1.—Some horrible disclosures have been made as to the treatment of boys in the government reformatory, who were so ill fed that they were only getting bread on Sunday, and one salt herring to eight youths. According to the testimony of Dr. Campbell, the medical officer, whenever they got at liberty they rushed to pigs' troughs and ravenously ate putrid offal and food that had been thrown there for the swine.

### REBELLION IN HAYTI.

New York, Aug. 8.—Advices from Hayti state that the revolution has again broken out in that republic. The insurgents are in force about ten miles from Port au Prince which is declared in a state of siege. A large portion of the city was fired and the conflagration continued for two days and had not been extinguished when the mail steamer left. Priest Casalas is unpopular with the native element. From his known feeling of cordiality with foreign merchants and foreigners in general, he is suspected accordingly on that account. He is a good soldier, however, and however strong the foreign element may be, it cannot protect him from the designs of those who seek to gain the object of their ambition by assassination. General Salomon, a black man, formerly minister to England under the imperial rule of Solongue, is the present aspirant to the office and says when he gets into power the colored man and white man may both look out, as a black republic will make the streets of Port au Prince run rivers with the blood of both. The southern side of the island is equally disaffected and at Jacmel the newspapers are openly at variance with the existing administration. Numerous arrests have been made by the government, chiefly among persons suspected of being secretly engaged in revolutionary plots.

A long and important dispatch from Bassett, U. S. minister, has been sent to the state department on the subject of American interests in the present crisis.
