Conner and letters are coming in from various parts of the state recommending it but if the convention is held there will be a strong movement by leading opponents of Blaine to nominate a candidate to draw off votes from Gov. Conner.

CADET DROWNED.
Newburg, N. Y., Aug. 13.—Cadet Northrup, of the third class, West Point military academy, was drowned while bathing in the Hudson Saturday. The body has not yet been recovered. The deceased was from the west.

AN EDITOR COWARDED.
Washington, Aug. 13.—Wm. J. Murtagh, proprietor of the National Republican, was cowardly this morning in front of his office by Jas. R. Wheatly, of Harrisburg, Ky., on account of articles which appeared in that paper reflecting upon his private character.

INDIAN NEWS.
San Francisco, Aug. 13.—The following despatch has been received at military headquarters in this city:

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF COLUMBIA IN FIELD, GIBBONS'S BATTLEFIELD, Valley of Big Hole, M. T., August 11.
To Adjutant General Military Department of the Pacific, San Francisco.
Reached Gen. Gibbons at 10 a. m. to-day. He assailed the Indians at day light of the ninth, inflicting great losses upon them. His own casualties were seven officers, fifty men and ten citizens. Gen. Gibbons is wounded but not seriously. Supplies were not cut off, as reported. Gibbons' command is in the best of spirits. The last of the Indians left last night. I shall continue pursuit as soon as my command comes up.

GIBBONS' ACCOUNT.
Chicago Aug. 13.—The following dispatch was received at military headquarters to-day:

BIG HOLE PASS, AUG. 11.
My loss in the battle of the ninth was seven officers and fifty-three men killed and wounded. I am satisfied that the Indians suffered much more, for the surprise was complete and many were killed in their tepees or running out. Forty dead Indians were counted on about one half the battle field. Howard has just arrived and I believe he can catch them again. As soon as he arrives and I can get the services of a doctor I propose to move to Dear Lodge and take most of our wounded to Shaw. They are all doing well, but I fear Lieut. English is mortally hurt.

THE CHATAQUA OLIO.
Fair Point, N. Y. Aug. 13.—A little daily paper with pictures by Frank Beard and produced by the papyrograph process, is distributed gratuitously to children here every morning.

The telephone with two miles of wire is in operation to-day and Prof. Lattimer, of Rochester, has arrived with his museum of microscopics.

Phillip Phillips, who has just returned from a voyage around the world, has arrived and is conducting the singing of the Chataqua assembly in place of Prof. Sherwin, who left this morning and was honored with a send-off at the steamboat landing. At eleven o'clock James Mayhew, of Toronto, inspector of public schools in that city, delivered a very interesting and able lecture on the "True object of teaching."

A conference of the Ohio Sunday school workers was held at one o'clock this p. m. and was largely attended.

FIRES.

FIRE AT KEOKUK.
Keokuk, Aug. 13.—The soap factory of Wm. Bliss was destroyed by fire early yesterday morning. Loss \$10,000; insurance \$3,200.

FIRE AT QUINCY.
Quincy, Ill., Aug. 13.—The Farmers Mills, owned by Crockett & Mason, together with a large stock of grain was destroyed by fire Saturday night. The mill and machinery was valued at \$20,000 and almost a total loss. Insurance \$8,500. The stock in the mill is valued at \$5,000; insurance \$3,000.

A CORRECTION.
New York, Aug. 13.—The London Daily News correspondent at Sitova, under date of Saturday, corrects his recent summary of the situation. He now states that General Dragomiroff is in Tirnova, not before Lovatze. Prince Minsky is entrenched before Selvi, and after the abandonment of Kazoulik, it seems doubtful whether the Balkan passes will continue to be held by the Russians.

REPORTED OUTRAGE.
Paris, Aug. 13.—A despatch from Gabrova says: According to reports received here the Turks have burned the hospital at Eski Baglertzi, which contained 800 sick.

BRITISH INTERFERENCE.
Constantinople, Aug. 13.—It is stated on good authority that Musurus Pasha, Turkish ambassador at London, recently wrote to the portie that he had reason to believe the British government would shortly ask for authorization for a fleet to enter the Bosphorus on certain contingencies in order to protect christians. It is said the portie replied that the fleet could only come as the avowed ally of Turkey. It is also asserted, though, in doubtful authority, that this reply was withdrawn on the energetic remonstrances of Layard, British representative at Constantinople.

LATEST BY MAIL.

In New York, on Thursday, Rev. Father McCarthy, twenty years pastor of the Holy Cross church, was buried, and Friday his nephew, messenger at the cotton exchange, fell from the gallery to the floor of the exchange, and was killed.

Rev. W. E. H. Clark, rector of St. Paul's Episcopal church, at Augusta, Ga., died Friday morning at the bedside of a parishioner who had just died.

Miss Mollie Woods, of Council Bluffs, while in attendance upon the teachers' institute in the high school building Friday, lost her balance and fell from a second story window to the ground, a distance of over twenty feet. Her injuries are quite serious, but hopes of her ultimate recovery are entertained.

The cabinet, on Friday, determined that a commission of three be appointed to act with a similar commission on the part of Canada and arrange for the return of Sitting Bull and his followers to the United States. One member will be an army officer, another represent the Indian department, and a third will be selected after a conference with the president.

Last Friday the cabinet discussed the question of the pending danger to the inhabitants in the vicinity of Puget Sound on account of threatened Indian outbreaks, and decided to send a man-of-war to that place from San Francisco.

Gov. McCormick, who was secretary of the national republican committee during the campaign in 1876, being interviewed on the subject, states that Secretary Schurz neither asked nor received from the committee a single dollar for services in that campaign. He told Schurz that the committee would pay his expenses, but Schurz said he preferred to bear his own expenses.

United States Attorney Evans, at Austin, Texas, telegraphs that Thomas P. Furnell, United States marshal of our district, was fired upon twice by T. Britton. He is badly wounded but will recover. No blame attaches to Furnell.

The czarowitch's army, which is available for holding the line from the Danube to the Balkans, numbers about 60,000 and is necessarily attenuated over the long front so as to leave no gap for the Turks to creep through.

The river Lom still virtually constitutes the line of the Rostchuk army, but the headquarters of the Russian corps has been moved beyond it to Kadikoi.

Gen. Zimmerman is guarding Dobrudzha, which is not threatened, and he cannot push forward with his 30,000 men lest his enemies from Varna and Sautia should converge upon him.

The Rumanians are beginning to suffer in health, in some corps from hard marching, heat and irregular rations. The principal cause, however, is the neglect of sanitary precautions, resulting in the general outbreak of the air. At Buda the air is thick and heavy with miasmata from fish and other odors.
