GERMAN LUTHERAN CONVENTION.
Iowa City, Ia., Sept. 1.—The convention of the western district of the German Lutheran synod, of the United States, is in session at this place. The session opened yesterday with an address by Rev. G. Grossman Maxfield, of Iowa, president of the convention. The attendance is fair, representatives being present from all the states of the district. The business of the convention will occupy five days.

CONFERRING WITH STRIKERS.
Cincinnati, Sept. 1.—The commission of 'eight men of Cincinnati, Hamilton and Dayton railroad, who excepted to compromise with President Shoemaker yesterday, are to-day conferring with the strikers at Dayton, O., who refused to take out trains, last with a view of inducing them to accept the compromise.

OBITUARY.
Canton, Pa., E. L. Davenport, died about noon. He passed a night of extreme agony.

THE SANDWICH GOES UNDER.
Boston, Sept. 1.—The Sandwich savings bank has been declared insolvent. The total amount of deposits in the bank is about one million dollars. The difficulty is due to shrinkage in value of property on which mortgages to the amount of \$40,000 were held. The exact condition of the bank cannot be ascertained for several days, but it is feared it will not be able to continue.

NEW YORK.
A HEAVY FAILURE.
New York, Sept. 1.—Edward B. White, metal broker, failed. Liabilities, \$100,000; assets \$30,000.

New York, Sept. 1.—Revenue increase, \$66,000.

WASHINGTON.
A. J. LAWRENCE.
Washington, September 1.—Genl. A. W. Lawrence of New Port. R. I., accepted the position at the Setting Bull commission, representing the interior department.

FINANCIAL.
The debt statement shows a decrease of \$3,869,538 the past month; currency \$11,828,337 special fund redemption from 68 to 70; of fractional currency \$8,265,412; special deposit of legal tenders for redemption of certificates deposit \$50,430,000; coin \$106,904,936; coin certificates \$385,254,000; outstanding legal tenders, \$357,976,164; amount with held for payment, military establishments not appropriated by congress, is \$4,500,000.

FOREIGN.
TURKISH VICTORY CONFIRMED.
London, Sept. 1.—Later editions of the Daily News and Standard published dispatches from their correspondents who were eye-witnesses of Thursday's battle, which confirm in detail a serious Russian defeat on the Lom. Both correspondents agree that Popkoi has been abandoned and that the Russian positions were completely turned. The Turks are continuing the pursuit.

WAR NOTES.
Baker Pasha under whom the Turkish cavalry charge was made, and who had two horses shot, is with Capt. Briscoe. One of his staff is reported missing.

WASHBURN'S SUCCESSOR.
Paris, Sept. 1.—Hon. Edward F. Noyes, recently appointed United States minister to France, accompanied by his predecessor, Hon. Elihu B. Washburne, had an interview yesterday with the Duke De Cazza, minister of foreign affairs, to whom the former presented a copy of his credentials, and Washburne's copy of his letter of recall. Duke De Cazza received both gentlemen with great cordiality. He expressed regret at Washburne's departure, and warmly welcomed Noyes, who made a suitable reply, in which he congratulated himself

upon entering into relations with a minister who had shown great sympathy for the Americans, and with a country bound by so many ties to us.

TEN THOUSAND STRIKERS.
London, Sept. 1.—A strike of 10,000 cotton operatives commenced at Bolton yesterday.

FAILURE.
Elias Gaskell, cotton spinner, has failed. Liabilities \$309,000.

THE GOLD MARKET.
The Standard says, with respect to the efflux of gold for New York, which was thought probable, we learn there are no orders in the market for that quarter, and it is believed exchange between New York and this country will be balanced by the export of bonds, without the necessity of sending gold.

LATEST BY MAIL.
The democrats of Iowa have nominated John P. Irish for governor.

The Black Hills paid \$9,600,000 internal revenue tax for the three months ending July 31st. Query—Which is most profitable to the government, civilization or barbarism?

There does not seem to be any good ground for the apprehension that the president intends to revoke the proclamation heretofore issued calling congress in special session on the 15th of October.

Gen. Terry having brought information that Sitting Bull, with thirteen hundred warriors, is in camp this side of the British line, all further proceedings in regard to selecting a commission to arrange for his return to the United States have been suspended for the present. Gen. Terry will consult with the secretary of war what plan shall be adopted in regard to the Sioux chief.

The government is informed by a telegram from Gen. Miles of the crossing of Milkriver by Sitting Bull and his encampment between Milk and Missouri rivers in the neighborhood of the Little Rocky mountains, and about fifty miles to the east of Fort Belknap. Sitting Bull's presence again in the United States with a large force will cause additional activity at the war department in dealing with the Indian problem.

Columbia, S. C., August 30.—The grand jury to-day returned true bills for breach of trust against ex-Lieutenant-Governor Gleaver, ex-president of the senate Montgomery, ex-Governor Moses, ex-Clerk of the house Jones and ex-Treasurer Parker. Also against clerk of the senate Woodruff for forgery to the amount of \$4,000, against one A. L. Jacobs for forgery for over \$3,000, against Scott Parker and United States senator Patterson for conspiracy in the same forgery, and against Patterson for bribing members of the legislature.

Senator Conkling made an address at Oswego, N. Y., the other day in which, speaking of practical reform in matters vital to the country's interests, he said: The way to insure these things is for every man, whatever may be his occupation or position, to give some thought and action to public affairs, as this is the only mode, under our system of government, in which that system can be made effectual and just. This is good sense and sound doctrine. All people should be well informed on public affairs.
