## MISCELLANEOUS.

### INDIAN NEWS.

The following telegrams have been received at General Sheridan's headquarters: Fort Ellis, Montana, September 14th.

To Adjutant General, St. Paul, Minn.: A courier just in from Howard, left the command at Clark's Fork, near Head Mountain on the 10th. Sturgis had communicated with Howard. Merritt had been heard from, and his whereabouts was known. The hostiles are between Sturgis and Howard. Merritt is covering the trails tending south. Howard is expected to strike them on the tenth, and there must have been a fight on that day or next, unless they scattered and abandoned every thing. The Crows are loyal. All reports to the contrary are sensational.

### THE PRESIDENTIAL PARTY.

Louisville, Sept. 18.—The presidential reception was continued this morning. The public schools for white and the colored children were visited, and the address made by President Hayes, Secretary Thompson, Evans, McCrary and General Key. Welcome remarks by the pupils, floral offerings and presentations to Mrs. Hayes formed the interesting part of the days programme.

APPOINTED RECEIVER.

Chicago, Sept. 18.—Mr. Strong having been unable to secure the two million dollar bond requisite to enable him to take charge of the State Savings bank as receiver, Judge Williams this morning appointed Judge Olin receiver, an appointment which meets with universal approval.

### SOLDIERS REUNION.

Several soldiers reunions occur here to-day, including the 8th Illinois cavalry and the 105th volunteer infantry. The proceedings consist in speeches, hand shaking and dinner.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF THE COLUMBIA IN FIELD, CLARK'S FORK, MONTANA, Sept. 12th.

To Gen. Terry, St. Paul, Minn.—While Col. Sturgis was scouting towards Stinking Water, Indians and my force in close pursuit passed his right, turning to Clark's Fork, after a short detour, and making a double march, avoiding him completely. I have sent Sturgis with Sanford, and Otis with batt ry, in pursuit; myself following as rapidly as possible with the remainder. The Indians are reported now going straight to Musselshell, to secure junction with a band of hostile Sioux, but one of the five messengers sent from me to Col. Sturgis reached him. We buried yesterday four unknown citizens, probably scouts killed just in advance of us.

### THE FOLLOWING IS JUST RECEIVED, DATED NEAR YELLOWSTONE, SEPT. 13th: "We have just had a hard fight with the Nez Percés, lasting nearly all day. We killed and wounded a good many and captured several hundred head of stock. Reports are not in yet, we can not say what our loss is, but it is considerably—several killed and a good many wounded. Nothing to eat for two days. Marched sixty miles to strike the Indians. Horses were worn out. Indians stuck well to rocks, but we drove them out for several miles. [Signed] STURGIS. In addition Gen. Frost reports that the Crows brought into the agency on the 13th one hundred head of ponies of the Nez Percés, and that several Crows started out at once to assist Sturgis. [Signed] BENHAM, Commanding.

### THE CONTEST.

Creedmoor, September 18.—Spirit of Times prize money, brought a large number of foreign and home long range rifles before Butts, at eight hundred yards range. Frank Hyde and E. H. Sanford lead, each making 72 points.

A RAIN STORM.

St. Louis, September 18.—Advices from Houston, Tex., to a late hour last night say the wind veered to the north about sundown, and the water at Galveston began to recede. At eight o'clock the rain ceased, the scud lifted and Galveston was visible from across the bay. The shipping seemed to be safe and no evidences of damage were observable. The storm extended all along

the Texas coast. Lynchburg; on San Jacinto bay, was partly submerged by the back water. Trains were expected to enter Galveston this morning.

## FOREIGN.

### WAR ITEMS.

London, Sept. 18.—Fort St. Nicholas captured by the Turks is said to be the key of the Russian positions in the Shipka Pass and to command other Russian works. General Raditsky, Russian commander, is supposed to have about 25,000 men, and Suleiman Pasha 40,000.

### NAVAL MOVEMENTS.

Peremptory orders have been received at Portsmouth for the iron armor plated steamship Triumph and Hercules to be got ready for sea by the 30th of October. It is expected the Triumph will relieve the Shah in the Pacific.

### BISMARCK AND ANDRASY.

A dispatch from Salzburg, says Bismarck and Andrasy have taken apartments at the same hotel and meet to day.

### A TURKISH NAVAL VICTORY.

London, Sept. 18.—It is reported that two Russian gunboats in Kilis, mouth of the Danube, were attacked by a Turkish iron clad, and one gunboat was so badly injured that it had to be destroyed.

### NEIGHBORHOOD NEWS.

#### Bon Homme Citizen, Sept. 13th

Bon Homme is to have a new harness shop. This is an enterprise that has long been needed and we feel confident that it will be a paying one.

We were informed last week that C. H. Mattoon of Jim river and who was an old time resident of this precinct, was killed, while on a "bender," in the Black Hills, last month.

Now that the west side of the "Jim" river is protected by the settlers, a number of them being acquainted with the exact location of the Mennonite's melon patch led the way. When near the "forbidden fruit" they protrated themselves and began to tread their way through the tall grass and sunflowers. It wasn't long before one of the boys heard some one exclaim: "oo-oh-as-ug!" in looking over the situation the boy found his knee on the chest of a sleeping Mennonite—who had been sent to guard the melon patch. Notwithstanding all this, the boys got the melons.

#### Springfield Times, Sept. 13th.

Mrs. L. N. Judd is visiting friends in Yankton.

Will Finley has received the appointment as boss carpenter at old Ponca reservation.

Mrs. Enos Culver, we understand, has engaged to teach school in Yankton the coming winter, and will remove to that city soon.

And now comes Tommy McCrea with a turnip that measures thirty inches in circumference, raised on his farm a few miles northeast of Springfield. Next!

Our district school building is being moved this week to lots directly north of the Times office, and the public school will open one week from next Monday. Miss Addie Perkins has been secured as teacher.

The surveyors of the Covington, Columbus and Black Hills railroad line reached Santee agency Tuesday last. They are surveying a line directly up the river, and will also run a line some distance back from the agency, striking the river at the mouth of Bazille creek.

#### Dakota County (Neb. Mail).

The grade is being pushed rapidly on the Black Hills branch of the railroad, regardless of the many obstacles now being placed in the way, by those who are opposed to the development of north Nebraska.

There was created quite a little excitement over a lost child, in a neighborhood ten or twelve miles northwest of this city, on Tuesday. A little boy two years of age, the son of widow Mrs. Crosby, wandered away unnoticed early in the morning, and after searching faithfully until four o'clock in the evening, the baby lad was at last discovered about a mile and a half from home.

We publish the following from the proceedings of the commissioners of Wayne county at their meeting held at Laporte, Aug. 25, 1877: In the matter of the Covington, Columbus and Black Hills railroad company and the proposition to issue bonds to aid in the construction of the same. Now at this time comes the said company by its agent, Eli Robinson, and it appearing to the satisfaction of the board, as well from the evidence offered as from a personal examination of the work done on the road, that the grading of the road has been completed in a good and substantial manner amply sufficient to make a good roadbed so as to be continuous from the junction of the same between Dakota City and Jackson in Dakota county, with the road now completed, to the town of Laporte, in Wayne county. And, that the same had been done in accordance with the proposition on which said bonds were voted, and said grade thus being completed, said company is entitled to \$44,000 of the bonds voted in this behalf upon the filing of a bond to this county by John H. Charles, trustee, satisfactory to said board, for the faithful performance of his duties as said trustee and from said company for the completion of said road according to the proposition submitted by said company to said county.

#### Niobrara Pioneer, Sept. 14th.

We learn that Judge Valentine has decided the case of Hinman vs. Bos in favor of the defendant, and finds the property on the Santee Agency taxable.

We learn that the surveyors on the railroad are at work in our county. One of the gang was in town yesterday for provisions and said that they were at work seven miles below this place.

Haying is still in progress, although our farmers have early provided themselves with good stacks. More hay has been put up this summer throughout the country than any previous season.

The Bohemian settlers in this county have harvested extraordinary crops of wheat this year. A number of them have over a thousand bushels each, and quite a large number of them have about five hundred bushels each. It is estimated that the Bohemians in this county will have thirty thousand bushels of wheat, and the remainder of our farmers, it is thought, will have enough to make up a hundred thousand bushels.
