THE NEWS.

Arrest of a Brace of Counterfeiters in Baltimore.

MacMahon's Manifesto Brings Out a Reply from Numerous Parisians.

The Chicago Authorities are Exercised About extensive Mail Robberies.

MISCELLANEOUS.

COUNTERFEITERS.

Baltimore, Sept. 21.—S. W. Burfoot and William Sidle, claiming to be residents of North Carolina, were arrested here to-day, and on Burfoot were found \$50 counterfeit bills of the First National bank of Buffalo.

Chicago, Sept. 21.—Large sums of Canadian money sent through the mails have been stolen at various points in this country, and detectives have, for some time past, been working up such cases. Recently, \$5,000 of Canadian money was presented to a broker here by a woman, who received in return therefor American bills. She has not been seen since. Shortly afterward it was reported from Canada that this five thousand dollars had been lost in American mail. The officers are now working on this clue, although their movements have been kept secret, and little beyond these facts is known.

ASKING FOR RELIEF.

Fernandina, Fla., September 21.—The mayor of this city asks contributions of money and supplies for the relief of sufferers from the yellow fever.

A REWARD OFFERED.

San Francisco, Sept. 21.—The governor has offered a reward for the arrest and conviction of Chinese engaged in the recent Rocklin tragedy. Warrants have been issued for the arrest of 28 white men engaged in driving the Chinese away from that vicinity. The governor characterized Colonel Bee's dispatch, asking his interference to put down disorder in Placer county, as injudicious, tending to exaggerate in the minds of nonspectators the amount of disorder prevailing there. He expresses regret at the illegal action of the whites, as tending to prejudice the eastern people against the state, in the solution of the question of Chinese immigration.

ACCIDENTS.

SCALDED TO DEATH.

Rochester, Sept. 21.—Wm. H. Dawson, engineer on the Central railroad, was scalded to death yesterday, his engine having come in collision with the belated St. Lou is express.

HIS HEAD CUT-OFF.

St. Louis, September 21.—Edward Overton, Esq., at Legate and Balter tobacco factory, 214 and 216 Washington avenue, accidentally came in contact with the fly wheel of the engine, at half past one o'clock this afternoon, and his head was taken off as cleanly as though cut with a knife or guillotine.

NEW YORK.

FAILURE.

New York, Sept. 21.—Ponvert & Co., an old and large sugar importing house of this city, has made an assignment. Ponvert being in sympathy with the Spanish government were specially obnoxious to Cuban revolutionists, and several of their most valuable plantations were burned, or otherwise destroyed. The losses in this way must have reached from one to two million dollars. The debts of the firm are largely what are known to sugar manufacturers as factors, claims and probably are not less than \$300,000 due mainly to Cuban firms.

WAR ITEMS.

London, September 21.—A correspondent at Garry Studen, estimates that the Russians with reinforcements received since the battle before Plevna must number nearly 50,000.

A REPLY TO MACMAHON'S MANIFESTO.

Paris, Sept. 21.—An address to the nation, signed by a number of Parisians, and pronounced candidates for the chamber of deputies, representing all shades of republicanism, is published to-day. It replies point by point to President MacMahon's manifesto.

THE DOMINION.

STRANDED.

Montreal, Sept. 21.—The steamship Rowland, here for Queenstown, with sixty thousand bushels of wheat, stranded on Holy Rood beach, New Foundland. The vessel and cargo were insured.

The eighth annual convention of the Fire Underwriters' association of the Northwest met at Chicago Wednesday morning, delegates being present from all the northwestern states.

LATEST BY MAIL.

Trains commenced crossing the Union Pacific bridge Wednesday.

The Wilksharre, Pa., miners have rejected the offer of 10 per cent. advance.

The prohibitionists of New Jersey have nominated Rudolphus Bingham for governor.

The plaster mill of C. L. Woodruff & Son, Broadway, Albany, N. Y., burned Tuesday night. Loss, \$90,000; insurance, \$10,000.

It is believed that Edward Haight, of New York, will soon be appointed commissioner of Indian affairs, and that we will accept.

Quebec dispatches have ascertained that Bank President Spencer, of Chicago, a short time ago purchased \$5,000 worth of Bank of England notes in that city.

Intelligence from Wilmington, Del., indicates that ex-Senator James A. Bayard is rapidly failing in physical vigor, although his mind continues clear as ever.

Six deaths from yellow fever occurred at Fernandina, Fla., Wednesday, and several new cases were reported. Contributions in money, medicines and provisions are needed.

Levi Coffin, well known in the ante bellum day as president of the underground railroad, and always a prominent anti-slavery man, died at his residence at Avondale, Ohio, last Sunday, aged 75.

E. S. Beacon, an inspector of customs at Eagle Pass, Texas, is reported as having gone over the Rio Grande, shot two Mexicans, and returned to his duty. His case is now being considered by the department.

The governor, auditor and attorney-general, the advisory board of Illinois under the law, Wednesday evening approved the majority report of the southern penitentiary commissioners proposing to locate that prison at Chester, Randolph county.

The depression of business throughout the country last year is shown by the falling off in the amount of business done by the postal-order branch of the postoffice service, the decrease in the number of orders from the previous year being about 6 per cent.

The president has decided to postpone the sending of his formal message to congress until the commencement of the regular session on Dec. 1, but on the 15th of October will send merely an informal message to announce the reasons why the extra session was called, including the reports and statement of estimates from the secretary of war.

Secretary Sherman says he shall go home to vote, considering it his duty and privilege, and shall not deny the privilege to any of his subordinates. Any man in the treasury department who desired to go home to vote could do so, provided his work was such that he could be left without detriment to the service, but the usual ten days' election leave would not be allowed.

Parish of St. John the Baptist, La., advises that Tuesday afternoon several houses were destroyed in the lower part of that parish, barns carried off, the court house unroofed, fences torn down, trees uprooted and other damage done by a fierce wind storm. Heavy rains continued yesterday without cessation. The rice crop is probably one third destroyed. The whole damage cannot be estimated.

Spencer, the defaulting Chicago bank president, has not been arrested. The police did not receive instructions to watch for him on the Circassian until after her arrival at Liverpool. The steamer touched at Mobile Monday night and reached Liverpool Tuesday morning. London and Liverpool detectives were watching the Circassian for another purpose, but they took such notice of all passengers as enabled them to say some hours after, when the order for Spencer's arrest was received, that he did not land at Liverpool. If he landed at Mobile he had twelve hours start.

NEIGHBORHOOD NEWS.

Vermillion Standard Sept. 15th.

The residence occupied by Mrs. Maxion which was partly consumed by fire last Saturday evening was again fired Monday evening, but the flames were quickly extinguished.

It was reported Wednesday morning that a person attempted to fire the Dakota House Tuesday night. He was fired at with a revolver by the landlord. Nothing further has been heard from the affair.

CITY COUNCIL'S RESOLUTION.

Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Yankton:

Section 1. That it is, and is hereby declared to be necessary, that a sidewalk should be constructed on the east side of Cedar street, in the city of Yankton, as follows: Commencing on Third street, on the northeast corner of Cedar street and Third street; thence along the east side of Cedar street to the south side of Fourth street, the same being in front of lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 & 9, in block 25, Central Yankton.

Sec. 2. That said sidewalk shall be constructed of wood, of the width provided by ordinance, and be made of the material and in the manner provided by the ordinance of said city, except that the outer edge of said sidewalk shall be laid two feet from the curb line of said Cedar street.

Sec. 3. This resolution shall be published for four consecutive weeks in the Press and Dakotian newspaper, the official paper of said city of Yankton.
