## THE NEWS.

### Servia Has Not Yet Decided Upon War Measures.

### Grevy's Candidature Strongly Urged.

### A \$150,000 Defaulter Turns up in Massachusetts.

### Wall Street Agitated by a Dealer in Raised Scrip.

## FOREIGN.

### SERVIAN'S PEACEFUL.

Belgrade, October 2.—It is most positively denied in official circles that Servia has already resolved upon a war like action. However, it is thought probable that the final resolution of the Servian government will mainly depend upon communication of the newly appointed Russian agent, who has just arrived.

### WAR ITEMS.

Vienna, Oct. 2.—Only 800 rifles were seized in Transylvania. The projected raid into Rumania was the scheme of a few enthusiasts and adventurers. It had no connection with the Hungarian popular sympathy for Turkey.

### FRENCH POLITICS.

Paris, Oct. 2.—The Mot D'Ordre, thrice sentenced for publishing Rochefort's articles, has died, and will be succeeded by the new radical organ—Le Revil.

A letter is published from the republicans for promoting Grevy's candidature for the chamber of deputies in the ninth arrondissement. It formally nominates Grevy to the place occupied by Thiers, the head of the French democratic party, and the leader of "The 363." Victor Hugo is honorary, and Gambetta acting president of the republican committee.

## MISCELLANEOUS.

### FAILURE.

Chicago, October 2.—George K. Clark, a well known real estate man, has filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy. Preferred debts, \$3,000; secured liabilities, \$155,000, with securities valued at \$109,000; unsecured debts, \$113,000 with 17,000 un-discounted bills, and \$33,000 on accommodation paper. His assets are of a character whose value is not easily determinable.

### A DEAFULTER.

Lawrence, Mass., Oct. 2.—Geo. R. Waterman, clerk in the Pacific mills, and connected with the corporation twenty years, is alleged to be a defaulter for one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

### SUICIDE.

St. Louis, Oct. 2.—John S. Hausman, a young man of some local political prominence, and well known in business circles, shot himself through the heart at his residence last night. No cause known for the act.

### SOLD OUT.

Chicago, Oct. 2.—The stock of the National life insurance company of the United States of America, was sold to day by the receiver of the Republic life. The purchasers are parties connected with the present management.

### A TERRIBLE EXPLOSION.

St. Louis, Oct. 2.—One of the stills in the Bollman & Obavas distillery, Poplar street, exploded last night and building and contents burned to the ground. The building was valued at about \$15,000, and the stock \$20,000; insurance \$25,000. Fred W. Bollman, one of the proprietors of the distillery was badly, if not fatally, burned. Huston Shay, driver of one of the hose reels of the fire department was mortally hurt while going to the fire, by the upsetting of the reel.

## NEW YORK.

### RACES.

New York, Oct. 2.—At Jerome Park to-day, the opening of the race, mile dash, was won by Viceroy; Diamond second; Vermont third. Time, 1:47.

### WALL STREET MARKET.

Wall street is agitated because Wm. C. Gillman, dealer in insurance scrip, has borrowed large sums of money in such scrip which was fraudulently raised. At one bank he borrowed seventy-five thousand dollars. Additional discoveries are being made. Gillman was in town this morning, but cannot now be found.

The Evening Post says it was scrip of the Atlantic Mutual insurance company, which had been raised. The amount of raised certificates so far found is \$127,000. The company will lose nothing. Gillman, it seems, obtained two one hundred dollar scrip certificates on the Atlantic Mutual Marine insurance company, which were raised to ten thousand dollars each and hypothecated with Henry Talnadge & Co. by a loan of \$18,000. The American Exchange bank say they had several of the certificates to the amount, originally, for \$1,200, but had been raised to \$7,200. An additional number is said to be out.

### SALE OF REAL ESTATE.

Peter B. Swaney and Hugh Smith, of the Brooklyn Tammany ring, sold to-day real estate which brought \$651,000.

## WASHINGTON.

### MEXICAN AFFAIRS.

Washington, Oct. 2.—The cabinet session to-day was short. There was a general conversation over the Mex can affairs, but no information has been received from Rio Grande, other than newspaper accounts.

### AT THE EXECUTIVE MANSION.

There was a large crowd at the executive mansion to-day, including several congressmen who called to pay their respects. Gen. Crook had an interview.

### GEN. SHERMAN.

Telegrams from Portland, Oregon, his arrival there from Puget Sound. He will start overland for San Francisco to-morrow.

## LATEST BY MAIL.

Marshal MacMahon's candidates are 181 legitimists, 83 orleanists and 298 bonapartists. The remaining 30 arrondissementis in and around Paris are without official candidates.

A portion of the Turkish troops in Bosnia have been ordered in the direction of Mostar, Herzegovina, and the remainder to the Servian frontier.

The design of the Turkish sympathizers in Transylvania was the formation of a Hungarian legion of 5,000 men who, acting in conjunction with Turkish corps, were to destroy the Roumanian railways. It is rumored that the Hungarian General Klepka was one of the leaders.

The snows have ceased in the Balkans, but heavy rains have flooded the plains of Sophia and Orhanie.

The Servian minister of war has concluded a contract with large Servian firms for victualing four army corps which Servia intends to form.

Greece has sent a fresh dispatch to her representative at London pointing out that neither intimidation nor a coup de main against Greece can suppress Hellenism. An unjust attack against Greece by the port would infallibly cause an insurrection of the entire Hellenic people.

Col. David H. Armstrong, an old citizen of St. Louis, and a wheel horse of the democracy of that state for the past twenty-five or thirty years, was appointed United States senator Saturday evening by Gov. Phelps to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Lewis V. Boggy. Col. Armstrong is at present vice-president of the board of police commissioners of St. Louis.

Justice Miller, of St. Louis delivered his decision in the McKee case Friday morning. It overrules the demurrer of the government to the answer of defendant, and the suit therefore falls. The case car, however, be appealed to the United States supreme court, but District Attorney Bliss has not yet decided whether he will take such action.

The Nebraska state fair closed Friday. In the free-for-all trotting race, for a purse of \$500, there were two entries. Randall, an Omaha horse, won in three straight heats. Mat Patrick, also an Omaha horse, took second money. The best time was 2:30.

## THE RIVER.

The C. K. Peck passed Yankton agency on her way down this forenoon.

The steamer Dugan left Bismarck ahead of the Peninah, but was blown ashore and was not afterwards seen by those on the Peninah.

The steamer Peninah met the Nellie Peck at Hot Spring island Sunday, where she was lightening up to make the passage over a shallow spot.

The steamer Black Hills, T. B. Burleigh master, and J. Q. A. Perry, clerk, arrived at half past one o'clock this afternoon from Pierre, bringing twenty-five passengers and 225 sacks of wheat for Mr. Cowgill, of Santee agency. The Black Hills was two days making the trip from Pierre and found very thin water. She met the Silver Lake and passed the C. K. Peck near the Carroll wreck yesterday, both aground.

Bismarck Tribune, Sept. 26th: The steamer R. W. Dugan left Monday morning for Standing Rock with 160 tons of government stores. The steamer Gen. Meade, from Buford should arrive sometime during the day, as she is now due. The Silver City from Cow Island has not yet been heard from. The new and elegant steamer Rose Bud will leave for Fort Buford on Saturday the 26th. Capt. Busen commands, which will insure a speedy trip. The steamer Peninah pushed out at 8 a. m. Monday morning with a good passenger list, including the Fannie Beane combination company, destined for Yankton. The Peninah will return from Yankton. The Big Horn departed at daylight this morning with 110 tons Cow Island freight, 100 tons for way points and a good number of passengers. The Big Horn cleaned up all Diamond R. and all Montana freight at this point as she will be the last boat for Cow Island this season.

## SITTING BULL.

Pembina, D. T., Sept. 28.—Several reliable half-breed Indian traders and their families have returned here from the plains via the International Boundary Line road direct from Sitting Bull's camp. They report him as late as the 15th inst. encamped on Wood mountain, on the Canada side, with 1,500 warriors. Several outrages on trading parties by Sitting Bull's warriors have been reported, but Sitting Bull repudiates the charge of having authorized them. Traders are greatly alarmed, and the majority, fearing trouble, have left for the various agencies and posts. The news of the pending conference has greatly allayed the apprehension, and at last advice it was reported that Sitting Bull was waiting in great pomp the arrival of the commissioners at the western slope of Wood mountain on the Canadian territory.

## MEHEMET ALI'S NARROW ESCAPE.

A French correspondent in the Turkish camp relates that, shortly before the recent battle in the neighborhood of Karahassan, the commander-in-chief of the Turkish army and his staff very narrowly escaped being taken prisoners. Starting from Rasgrad, Mehemet Ali advanced in the direction of Karahassan, a small village on the right bank of the river Lom, and at that time occupied by the Russians. On turning a sharp bend in the road, the lances of a strong patrol of Cossacks were suddenly seen, almost close in front of the general and his staff. The leader of the hostile party was apparently aware of the presence of the Turkish commander-in-chief with the group advancing, for he at once launched his men against it, calling out to them not to kill any one, and on no account to fire. Flight alone could save the small band of Turkish officers. A headlong chase ensued. Mehemet Ali himself and the majority of his staff, being better mounted than their pursuers, succeeded in escaping; but a colonel, two captains, and a lieutenant accompanying the commander-in-chief were overtaken and captured.—*Pall Mall Gazette.*

## CONKLING AND CURTIS.

Conkling seems to have gone to Rochester with an intention to pursue a more moderate course. But the arrival of Mr. Curtis and his proclaimed purpose to offer a resolution indorsing the president threw Mr. Conkling off his balance. His passionate hatred of that gentleman hurried him into what all cool observers must regard as a great mistake. But he is so vigorously supported by the convention as to prove that it was also a mistake of the president to undervalue the great strength of Mr. Conkling in his own state. The senator has acted the part of a blind and infuriate Samson who crushed himself beneath the edifice against whose pillars he leaned his mighty shoulders. Mr. Curtis' resolution indorsing the president was defeated by a vote of nearly three to one, and the republican party of this state lies in ruins which cannot be reconstructed for this election.

Section 1. That it is, and is hereby declared to be necessary, that a sidewalk shall be constructed on the east side of Cedar street, in the city of Yankton, as follows: Commencing on Third street, on the northeast corner of Cedar street and Third street; thence along the east side of Cedar street to the south side of Fourth street, the same being in front of lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 & 9, in block 25, Central Yankton.
