Philadelphia, Oct. 10.—The permanent exhibition company has appointed a committee to treat with the creditors who are said to be willing to accept 50 per cent. The debt of the company amounts to \$264,000; \$180,000 due to the centennial board of finance.

EPISCOPAL CONVENTION.

Boston, Oct. 10.—In the Episcopal convention, Bishop Harkle, of Virginia, presented the report of the committee on new dioceses, on the memorial of the bishop of Illinois, for the formation of two new dioceses. The committee recommended the sitting of two new dioceses, as follows: First, to be composed of the territory west of the Illinois river and LaSalle county, and south of Whiteside and Lee counties; second, to comprise that part of the state lying south and east of the Illinois river. The report was made the order of the day for Thursday.

THE INDIA FAMINE.

London, October, 10.—If the northwest monsoon proves good, the Indian famine will end in four months. Prospects in the northwest have so much improved that the scheme of railways and other works for relief have been abandoned. The subscription at the Mansion House, for the sufferers amounted to \$1,700,000.

THE OUTFLOW OF GOLD.

London, October, 10.—The Times says everything points to dearer money. It seems likely that even five per cent bank note discount will not be sufficient to arrest the out-flow of gold. One hundred thousand pounds worth of American eagles are said to be ordered for to-day, Wednesday.

WASHINGTON.

NO REBUKE TO THE ADMINISTRATION.

Washington, Oct. 10.—The most intimate friends of the president say he is not surprised at the result in Ohio. In fact it was anticipated, on the ground mainly that the state for several years had been gradually becoming more and more friendly to the doctrine of inflation. Hand times also had influence, and the workingmen's ticket injured to benefit the democrats, and this being an "off year," there was much indifference on a part of the republicans. The election could not be called a rebuke to the administration, because the democrats themselves claim to be in favor of civil service reform and southern policy.

The following appears in Saturday's Deadwood Times: "Curley and Mack, two well known miners of this vicinity, returned from the Big Horn country last night. They report passing a large party of prospectors, probably Wasams, who went out from the hills under the guidance of a man whose name cannot be ascertained, but who was known as Charley. He claimed to have diggings on Rotten Grass that would yield thirty cents to the pan. Arriving at the place, he confessed to the falsity of the statement, whereupon the irate miners hung him to a tree. It is presumed that he was in the employ of the post trader at Fort Reno, and took the party out for the benefit of that individual. Our informant reports the party alive with Nez Perce Indians.

The Result of Yesterday's Elections.

Ohio Goes Back on Republicanism by 2,000 Majority.

And the Democrats Gain the Legislature and the Next Senator.

Iowa Sends in its Customary 50,000 Majority for the Republican Ticket.

POLITICAL.

OHIO STATE ELECTION.

Cincinnati, Oct. 10.—The returns from 145 of the 147 precincts of this city, and 34 of the 40 county precincts, give Bishop 19,333, West 16,372, Bond 8,823. Lord, democrat, for senator over A. T. Goshorn, republican, 2,065; Capellen, republican for county auditor over Hoffman, democrat, 680; Huneke, republican for county treasurer over Fratz, democrat, 243. The democrats seem to have elected the entire ticket, with the exception of Hoffman and Fratz, who were scratched for reasons other than political. The Gazette concedes both branches of the legislature to the democrats and says that Bishop's majority in the state will be not less than 2,000. The Enquirer claims a majority on the joint ballot of 25, thus securing the election of a democratic senator. In this city the German republicans largely voted the workingmen's ticket. The workingmen claim that their ticket will foot up 17,000 votes, though it is not probable it will greatly exceed the estimate in the dispatches of yesterday—8,000.

Toledo, Oct. 1.—It is now conceded on all sides that the nationals have elected their entire ticket in Lucas county, by majorities ranging from three hundred to eight hundred. In the city their majority is upwards of 1,000. Sturgeon and Kellogg, the newly elected representatives have hitherto acted with the republicans. The result of the senatorial ticket is still in some doubt, but the indications point to the election of both democratic candidates. The county will give Johnston, national, for governor, eight hundred to 1,000 majority. The result is a surprise to all parties, and to none more than to the nationals themselves.

Brighton, Oct. 10.—This township gives Gear 121, Stubbs 89, Irish 46. Walnut county, Gear 128, a republican majority of 16. The republican representatives have a majority of 8.

Keosauqua, Oct. 10.—In this county the state ticket will have a majority of 275. The republican candidates for representatives are doubtful.

The news from Ohio occasions much comment here, there being apparently more interest in that than in our own state. The democrats are very jubilant over the news and are talking of a jubilee for to-night.

Des Moines, October, 10.—A special to the Register says that Gear has 110 majority in Marion county, and that ex-Governor Stone, republican candidate for representative in the same county is elected by a majority of 150.

Sioux City Ia. 10.—The official returns from the twelve townships, Woodbury county, including Sioux City, gives Gear 948, Irish 634, Stubbs 172, Lawrence, republicans for senator in the fifth district, 954, Farrar, greenbacker 166, J. H. Balton, republican 906, Davis, democrat 742, Forrest, greenbacker 200. Unofficial reports from the six remaining townships increase the republican majority to about 250 in the county a republican gain of 300.

LATEST BY MAIL.

The supreme court of the United States met on Monday at noon. Present, Justices Waite, Clifford, Swayne, Miller, Field, Strong and Bradley.

Nine new cases of yellow fever were reported at Fernandina Saturday and three deaths occurred Sunday. Monday five new cases were reported and one death occurred.

A special from Frankfort says: According to trustworthy intelligence received here, the fortresses Franco-Italian frontier are being hurriedly put in a state of defense.

The emperor of Russia has conferred upon Mr. Archibald Forbes, the war correspondent of the Daily News, the order of St. George, the highest military distinction in that country.

Specie resumption is practically accomplished in Memphis. The Memphis banks declined a day or two ago to pay a premium for gold in small pieces sent from the interior to the city. Greenbacks, dollar of dollar for the gold, were offered and accepted.

Colonel John C. Myers, ex-consul to Shanghai, who was relieved upon complaint of Minister Seward, has sued the Omaha Bee for \$20,000 damages for libel. The Bee insinuated that he was a drunkard and monomaniac, and says it doesn't propose to take back a word.

An Omaha telegram of the 6th says: Laughing Sam and the Kid, two notorious Black Hills characters, who robbed Henry Homan and party on their way from Deadwood to Omaha, four weeks ago, have been lodged in jail here, and will probably be sent to Yankton, Dakota, for trial. The offense was committed in that territory.

The board of inquiry appointed by Secretary Schurz to investigate the cause of the fire in the interior department building the 24th ult., submitted a report in which they state that there is no foundation whatever for the supposition that the fire was built of pine boards and a plow placed over the grate in the ladies' copying room in the Ninth street basement on the morning of the day on which the fire occurred, and the roaring of the fire attracted the attention of persons in the room, and was the subject of comment by them at the time.

NEIGHBORHOOD NEWS.

Niobrara Pioneer, Oct. 3th. The sand bar in front of town still continues a snare and delusion to the steamboat.

Immigration continues to come in quite well, many going up the valley and others settling in the vicinity of town.

The new saw mill, the other side of the Verdigris, up the Niobrara, is now in working order, and it is said the lumber is of the first quality.

The number of money orders paid by the Niobrara postoffice during the quarter were 9, amounting to \$237.31; the number issued by this office 57, amounting to \$990.31.

Treasurer Miller has been very busy with the delinquent tax-list during the past week. He will start for Lincoln to day having made the annual settlement with the commissioners.

Mr. Smiley, of Omaha, but more recently from the Black Hills, has been in town for the past few days. He is the first contractor who ever brought government beef for poor Le by way of Niobrara.

Sioux Falls Independent, Oct. 6th.

One hundred and six scholars attended the Sioux Falls school Tuesday.

Mr. K. Arneson brings in a specimen best, about three feet in length and of proportionate diameter.

A speculator has been making a good thing lately in a small way, by buying claims against the county at a big discount, and then getting his claims cashed at the county treasury. County warrants are a relic of the past, and any claim against Minnehaha county is worth just one hundred cents on the dollar.

The county finances are in a condition highly gratifying to tax-payers, there being over \$2,000 in the sinking fund and more than enough in the general fund to meet all outstanding orders, with the tax levy of this year just beginning to come in. Every order presented at the treasurer's office is promptly cashed, a condition of things as unusual as it is delightful; no more warrants to be sold at a heavy discount.

Vermillion Standard, Oct. 6th. Last Wednesday evening, the heaviest frost of the season visited this section of country. During the day the atmosphere was quite cold.

The Clay county district court convenes Nov. 13th. We learn there is quite a large docket already, and a few more cases will yet come up, no doubt.

A. E. Lee, of the firm of Lee & Prentiss, last Saturday bought one of the largest and heaviest beef cattle ever brought to Vermillion. The animal weighed 2,050 pounds.

At last we are to have a bridge at the mouth of the Vermillion river. It has long been needed as it cuts the distance shorter several miles, for parties visiting Vermillion from Nebraska.
