EXTRA SESSION.

The Senate Passes a Resolution to Abolish Pension Agencies.

A Move for the Remonetization of Silver.

General Sherman Arrives at St. Louis from his Montana Trip.

CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

Washington, Oct. 19.—During the morning hour a number of bills were introduced by Mr. Merrimon, amending the revised statutes, regarding the vacancies in office of president and vice president.

Mr. Morrill submitted a resolution instructing the pensions committee to report a bill, or otherwise, reducing and adjusting the salaries and fees of pension agents. Mr. Ingalls' amendment directing the committee to inquire into the expediency of abolishing all pension agencies and having pensions paid in Washington was agreed to, and the resolution passed.

After the morning hour Mr. Thurman's resolution discharging the elections committee from the consideration of the credentials of Eastis was taken up. He speaks in favor of Eastis' claims.

During a somewhat extended debate Mr. Davis, of Illinois, made a brief speech, in which he said he knew nothing about the claim of Eastis, having been a member of another branch of the public service during the discussion in the senate of the Louisiana case controversy. He was not prepared to vote to day upon the subject and favored an investigation by the committee. Mr. Thurman said it had been intimated that the committee would soon report on the subject and withdrew his motion to discharge the committee from further consideration of the credentials of Eastis.

Adjourned till Monday.

WASHINGTON.

THE STANDARD SILVER DOLLAR.

Washington, Oct. 19.—The following is the text of a bill introduced by Senator Ingalls, authorizing the coinage of the standard silver dollar, and restoring its legal tender character:

Be it enacted, etc., That there shall be from time to time coined at the mints of the United States silver dollar of the weight of 412½ grains standard silver to a dollar, as provided for in the act of January 18th, 1837, and that said dollar shall be legal tender for all debts, public and private, except where payment of gold coin is required by law.

DANGEROUSLY ILL.

EXAMINATION OF CREDENTIALS.

Washington, October, 19.—The senate committee on elections this morning unanimously ordered, on motion of Senator Hoar that Kellogg and Spafford be notified that the committee will formally begin the examination of their credentials Monday next, and inviting them to express their desires as to the scope of the investigation.

NO CHANGE IN TAXATION.

The commissioner of internal revenue in his annual report will not recommend any change in taxation. The service is considered generally very efficient and frauds particularly in the northern states are very limited. The report will recommend the enforcement of the laws against illicit distillation and the manufacture of tobacco in the south.

MISCELLANEOUS.

THE SEVEN JULY RIOTERS.

Reading, Pa., Oct. 19.—The jury has declared six of the seven July rioters not guilty. The seventh, George E. Goodhart, was found guilty of inciting to riot.

THE SHERMAN PARTY

St. Louis, Oct. 19.—Gen. Sherman and party arrived here last night from their western tour in fine health and spirits. They will leave for Washington tomorrow.

A HEAVY FAILURE

Boston, Oct. 19.—The Herald following report is received:

Joseph, H. Lee & Co., heavy print manufacturers, of Philadelphia, suspended. Liabilities \$400,000. The print cloth manufacturers of Fall river lose \$140,000.

IN OSWEGO.

Oswego, Oct. 19.—The Oswego Falls woolen mills was partially burned. Loss \$100,000; fully insured.

50,434 KILLED AND WOUNDED.

London, October, 19.—A Russian journal reports 50,434 Russian troops killed and wounded to Oct. 11th.

SERBIA WILL NOT DESIST.

Belgrade, Oct. 19.—The Serbian premier telegraphs the agent at Constantinople that the demand for Serbia disarmament would produce serious complications in that principality.

NEW YORK.

THE EDWIN ADAMS' BENEFIT.

New York, Oct. 19.—The sum raised for the Edwin Adams' benefit, as it now stands in the bank with all expenses paid, amounts to \$4,553. This sum will be increased to \$9,700. The committee have with the sanction and consent of Mrs. Adams, voted to place the fund in the hands of trustees for the benefit of Mrs. Adams.

FAILURES.

G. N. Fargo, of Buffalo, and J. H. McVickar, of Chicago, Geo. M. Wheeler, of W. Bailey Lang & Co., iron merchant, is under arrest charged with fraudulent bankruptcy brought by Frederick S. Comstock, one of the creditors. Judge Blatchford directed the U. S. marshal to take possession of the assets of the firm left out of the schedule, which are said to amount to several hundred thousand dollars. The creditors claim with this addition that the assets will cover the liabilities, estimated at about \$450,000.

The rates from Baltimore are 18 cents less on first or second classes, and 15 cents less on third and fourth classes than the rates from New York. From Philadelphia they are 6 cents less on first and second classes, and 2 cents on third and fourth classes. The tariff on wheat by rail from Buffalo has been advanced to 12 cents a bushel, an increase of one cent.

A DILAPIDATED STEAMER.

New York Oct. 19.—The steamer Massachusetts ashore in the Sound since the 4th, has arrived. It is estimated it will cost \$340,000 to repair her; Insurance \$75,000.

EX-SECRETARY FISH.

New York, Oct. 19.—A special to the Post from Boston, says that ex Secretary Fish, who is a delegate to the Episcopal convention, denies the charges that Sumner was ever offered the British mission, as stated by Wendell Phillips. Sumner only misapprehended his friendly advice in cautiously urging him to take up his residence in England on account of his domestic and political troubles. The ex secretary said that the interview desired by Phillips, between the president and Sumner never took place, but Phillips refers to one at his (Fish's) residence, that Sumner was then favorable to the Alabama treaty, and only turned about when J. M. Ashley, of Ohio, failed to be designated commissioner under it. Ex Secretary Fish spoke very freely about the matter.

LATEST BY MAIL.

The snow in Shipka pass is one meter deep, and operations therefore are impossible.

Governor Garber, of Nebraska has removed Capt. Wyman, warden of the state penitentiary. The gravest of crimes is charged against him.

The Spanish government intends to remonstrate with the United States against the duty of fifty cents per ton on Spanish shipping entering the United States.

The iron workers in the Clyde, England, ship building yards have demanded an increase of wages. The masters have resolved on a lock-out, which will involve 2,000 men.

A telegram from Constantinople says Sulciman Pasha on Tuesday made a reconnaissance in person as far as Sistenik. A battle with the czowitch was momentarily expected.

California and Utah even were represented in the annual session of brotherhood of locomotive engineers of the United States at Boston on Wednesday. The meeting was private.

A telegram from Simla denies the reports from Calcutta that a war is believed to be imminent between the British and Amur of Afghanistan and the Khan of Kelat. It states the British relations with Kelat were never better, and there is no danger of a frontier war.

A Louisville dispatch says: Gen. Harlan's nomination as one of the judges of the supreme court causes satisfaction at his home here among the democrats and republicans. His ability is conceded and his popularity is such that there is gratification at his recognition.

The bombardment of Plevna has commenced along the whole line, and a decisive action is imminent. Russian advisers report large numbers of Turks deserting from Plevna. It is stated that Osman Pasha's communication with Sophia has been cut. Sulciman Pasha is concentrating all his forces at Kadikos.

BLACK HILLS NOTES.

Leadwood Times, October 11th.

Coal from the Belle Fourche mines is delivered in this city for \$15.75.

It has been found possible to place another soldier on the Cheyenne route, and the country is safe.

Col. Lawrence, county treasurer, to-day notified our territorial treasurer that he had no funds to remit.

Pratt & Ferris' train, with 85,000 pounds of general merchandise, and Coffman and Thompson's stamp mill, arrived from Sidney to-day.

Efforts are being made for the removal of the county seat from Sheridan to Camp Crook, which is represented as a much more central and convenient point.

Application was yesterday made to Judge Bennett for the privilege of opening a cigar stand in the new court room. Applications to open a full fledged bar are now in order.

The labor movement is assuming vast proportions. Last evening the colored waiters at Welch's struck on account of some unpublished grievance. A prominent attorney has been retained in their behalf.

The regular weekly treasure coach left this city for Cheyenne, yesterday, with D. B. May as messenger. A telegram was received from Hat creek to-day, stating that it had passed that point in safety, hence we infer that Blackburn and his pal thought better of their threat to capture the treasure and kill the plucky messenger.

The scheme to flume water from Little Spearfish to the dry diggings upon Potato and Nigger hills has been found impracticable. The project now is, by a series of dikes to utilize the water of the Beavers, which, by the expenditure of a few thousand dollars can be brought to within a short distance of what will then prove very rich ground.

Ten days ago fire broke out in the woods along Rapid Creek, quickly spreading through the inflammable grass and underbrush, and before the recent heavy rains came and providentially quenched the flames, had destroyed hundreds of acres of the best timber in the Hills, together with several cabins, and the large saw mill belonging to the Rapid Creek mining and manufacturing company. The general loss is very heavy, as are also many individual ones.
