A large grey timber wolf was seen this morning on the Bon Homme road, just outside the city limits.

McNamara's suit against Chartrand claiming \$100, attorney's fees in obtaining the pardon of the latter, was ended to-day, Judge Eldridge dismissing the suit.

The pirates who stole the yawl from the steamer C. K. Peck a few nights ago, were overhauled last evening a few miles below Yankton on the Nebraska shore. On discovering their pursuers, and seeing no loophole of escape by water, the rascals abandoned the yawl, jumped ashore and disappeared in the brush. The yawl was returned to Yankton.
E. G. Smith, Esq., of the law firm of Moody & Smith, returned last evening from Hopkinton, Delaware county, Iowa, where he was joined in the bonds of matrimony, with one of Iowa's best girls. We wish Smith the most unclouded happiness in the future, but trust he will not forget, in the fullness of his conjugal joy, to occasionally think of his bachelor friends of other days.
Two steers belonging to Brennan & Jordan were stolen from their corral a day or two ago, by some persons unknown and sold to Felton & King, who, in turn, sold them to E. T. Melvin, who was going to ship them east, and would have done so, had not Brennan discovered the cattle, which he recovered. Deputy Sheriff Edmunds went down on this morning's train to look for the thief.
What would the average native born son of a North American think of dancing from Sunday morning until Monday night with the usual intervals for refreshments. And yet our Bohemian neighbors out at Tabor will enter upon a dancing frolic at 7 a. m. to-morrow which will be continued until the evening of the following day. Quite a number of the young men of this city have concluded not to go.

Mr. Wm. McFarland, of Forrestburg, Bramble county, about 80 miles up the Jim, is in the city to-day. He brought down with him a number of fine specimens of garden vegetables which grow in luxurious abundance in the soil of the upper Jim valley. Had the farmers of that section exhibited their products in the late territorial fair, they would in all probability been awarded many of the best premiums.
The commissioners of Lawrence county, in the Black Hills, have offered a reward of \$200 for the capture of any one of the gang of road agents and stage robbers, who infest the thoroughfares leading into that section. The Times of Deadwood now calls upon Laramie county, Wyoming, where all the robberies are committed, to offer a like reward, and with a similar inducement held out by the stage companies, it believes the robbers can be captured and the depredations effectually ended.
We have been requested not to mention the names of the parties who were injured by a gun shot, yesterday, while out hunting. The accident took place near Wright's farm eight miles north of Yankton and occurred while one of the parties was in the act of shooting at a flock of geese from his seat in the buggy. A gun standing between the two was accidentally discharged causing serious wounds to both. Dr. A. Macgregor and Miller are attending the wounded men, and we understand do not anticipate any serious consequences.
Mrs. Mary E. J. Watkins, yesterday made complaint before Justice Roberts, charging Luther W. Flye, with seduction under promise of marriage. The justice issued a warrant for the arrest of Flye and placed it in the hands of Sheriff Baker. Baker was unable to find the defendant in Yankton, but upon learning that he was in Elk Point, telegraphed the sheriff there to arrest and hold him, which he did. This morning Deputy Edmunds went down to Elk Point and will doubtless return with the Flye who has flown away. The penalty for seduction under promise of marriage may be five years in the penitentiary.

AN IMPORTANT DECISION.

Judge Bennett Decides for an Election of County Officers in Lawrence County.
There has been a great amount of speculation as to what course would be pursued in regard to an election of county officers for the various counties in the Black Hills. It was supposed at the time of the appointment of those officers that they would hold until the general election in 1878, but a perusal of the appended paragraph informs us that Judge Bennett takes a different view of the matter. We clip from the Deadwood Times of the 13th:
At the opening of court this morning, Judge Bennett delivered an opinion, and granted a writ of peremptory mandamus compelling the county clerk to call a general election this fall. Statutes were freely cited and compared to show the legality of a call. The court held that these were by analogy similar vacancies to those specified by law, and should be filled in a like manner. The appointment of officers by the governor or county commissioners to hold office until 1878 makes no difference. The law says that such and such officers shall be elected and shall hold office until the next general election, and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified. There can be no question about the legality of a general election this year to fill the vacancies for the short or unexpired term, or until next year, and the clerk should issue a call as the statutes require. He cannot come into court and plead ignorance of the law. He should know what vacancies occur, and his oath should compel him to issue the call.
In regard to the location of a county seat, Judge Bennett merely cited the statutes providing for an election therefor, and granted the writ, without ruling upon that point.
