THE NEWS.

Silver Dollars are Being Exchanged for Greenbacks.

Final Adjournment of the New York Postal Convention.

A Disastrous Fire in Progress at Catesburg, Kentucky.

An Explanation of the Attack on an English Boat by Russian Soldiers.

FIRES.

CATTESBURG DESTROYED.

Ashland, Kentucky, July 22.—A boat brings the news that the town of Catesburg is all burned up. All the hotels and business houses in the squares are burning now. Think it will burn about six squares before stopping. Several squares are burned to the ground now.

Toledo, July 22.—The loss by the fire at Defiance, O., last night will reach \$35,000 insurance, \$28,000, mostly in small amounts in New York and New England companies.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFINGS.

Denver, July 22.—Tom L. O'Connor, a well known actor, died suddenly of heart disease, at Georgetown, Col., Saturday.

St. John N. B., July 22.—The final deposit of \$5,000 a side in the Hanlon Ross boat race has been made with Mayor Earl, who is the final stake holder.

New York, July 22.—The postal convention adjourned *sine die*, after recommending to the post master general the adoption of a registering punch system, and extending it.

Cincinnati, July 22.—The Sherman house, at Catesburg, Ky., is now on fire. The telegraphic office and other buildings in that vicinity, will undoubtedly go with it as they are all frame. No particulars.

Boston, July 22.—The U. S. steamer Tall, ahausa with secretary Thompson and party on board, arrived at the navy yard to-day. A three days' stay will be made here, when the secretary will go to Portsmouth.

Washington, July 22.—The treasury has received from the national banks since the notification of last Thursday that silver dollars could be obtained for greenbacks, free of transportation, orders for \$310,000 silver dollars.

Columbus, O., July 22.—Advices from Newark state that there is an immense attendance at the soldier's and sailor's reunion. Extra trains filled with people have been coming all morning. President Hayes and party arrived at Newark safely, from Columbus, and Generals Sherman, Sheridan and Governor Bishop are also present.

Chicago, July 22.—The jury of Joseph Sparks, who has been on trial here the past week for the murder of Dewitt, agreed to a verdict yesterday, and being called this morning announced that they found him guilty of manslaughter, and fixed his punishment to 3 years in the penitentiary. The counsel of Sparks made a motion for a new trial.

Chicago, July 22.—Shortly after midnight a fire broke out in the planing mill owned by W. E. Frost & Co. on 16th and Clark streets, which was totally destroyed. An elevator owned by Howe & McMullen, of Boston, was also burned, but as it was empty the loss upon it will not exceed \$8,000. Loss on the mill, \$15,000; insurance \$8,000. Some freight cars and telegraph poles were also burned, and a few surrounding buildings scorched.

Philadelphia, July 22.—A meeting of the creditors of Jay Cooke estate was held at the People's bank this morning. Edwin Lewis, trustee, submitted a proposition for dividing the estate. He suggested that the whole assets, leaving out Ozontz and Lake Champlain properties, be carefully valued by experts, catalogued a nda scrip dividend of the amount or percentage declared and given in scrip to the creditors; everybody to be invited to bid and if not sold at the expiration of 30 days, the creditors to come in and buy at invoice prices. This proposition was referred to a committee of creditors.

FOREIGN.

MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.

Athens, July 22.—The Greek chambers will meet on the 8th of August.

Madrid, July 22.—Cuba is to be represented in the cortes by forty deputies and ten senators.

Much dissatisfaction with Russia is expressed by the Servians. They accuse Russia of abandoning her allies.

Constantinople, July 22.—The International commission to enquire in the Rhodope insurrection started for that district yesterday, via Adrianople.

Paris, July 22.—The international chess tournament with Wukaver, of Russia, leads with 15½ games; Zollertont, of Berlin and London, with 14½ games.

Belgrade, July 22.—An Ukase has been

published, abolishing state of siege and revoking the extraordinary powers vested on the military authorities during the war.

London, July 22.—The Times says: Active preparations are apparent for a favorable change in commercial affairs. Reports from various centres of iron industry are decidedly more encouraging.

London, July 22.—Layard, British ambassador at Constantinople, has received information that when the Russian-Circassians fired on the English man-of-war boat, near the gulf of Syras, on the 17th instant, there was no officer near them, and also that the English sailors, who had been arrested before an officer.

London, July 22.—The Times sharply criticizes Gladstone for assuring the right to arrange the liberal campaign by driving them into a contest for which they are unprepared. It intimates that in view of Hartington's resolution, the government might be tempted to dissolve the parliament and secure a stronger majority which it could not have by election.

AUSTRIA AND TURKEY.

London, July 22.—A Special from Vienna reports that General Philippovich had a conference with Mehemet Ali, which came to no result. Count Zich, Austri ambassador at Constantinople, through direct communications elicited from the porte, says that even if the present negotiation should fall through, the Austrians will not be actively opposed in Bosnia.

BEAR PAW MOUNTAINS.

Confirmation of Reports of Rich Gold Diggings—Indians Rumors, etc.

St. Paul Pioneer Press.

The steam boat Bighorn of the Conson line, arrived late Tuesday night from Fort Benton. The office of the boat report that news received at Benton just before their departure from Bear Paw mountains, confirm all previous reports in regard to the richness of the newly discovered placer mine in that locality. That bed-rock had been reached in some of the claims and paid at the rate of thirty cents to the pan, proving the digging to be worth fifty dollars per day to the man. Miners are arriving by every coach from the Black Hills, and depart for the Bear Paw by every steamboat. The steamboat Benton left yesterday, carrying several miners. It is reported that they and Sioux are hunting buffalo near the Bear Paw, and that six companies of soldiers have been ordered, and are en route for that point to locate the new military post.
