FOREIGN.

MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.
London, July 23.—An interruption of the telegraph wires between Paris and Vienna delays the receipt of news from eastern Europe.

London, July 23.—The freedom of the city will be conferred on Lords Beaconsfield and Salisbury on the third of August, immediately before the ministerial banquet at the Mansion house.

Rome, July 23.—Telegrams from Genoa, Palermo, Brescia, Pavia, Reggio, Demilia, Turin, Pistoia and Terrana, describe the meeting in those cities yesterday, in favor of Itala Landrotta, as large and enthusiastic.

Rome, July 23.—The demonstration of yesterday is attributed by the moderate liberals to ultra-montane influences. Its ultra features are generally deplorable and the conduct of the populace commended as patriotic and respectable. The ministry is not likely to submit to intimidation or threats.

London, July 23.—In the return match between Capt. A. H. Bogardus and Cholmondeley Pease, of the Hurlingham park and gun clubs, to-day, they shot at 100 birds for \$1,000 a side, and Bogardus won by two birds.

London, July 23.—In the house of commons this afternoon, the chancellor of the exchequer announced the betrothal of the Duke of Cannaught, Queen Victoria's third son, with Princess Marie Louise of Prussia daughter of Prince Frederick Charles.

POLITICAL.
OHIO GREENBACKERS.
Columbus, July 23.—The state convention of the national greenback labor party meets at the city hall at 2 o'clock this afternoon. There were 150 delegates in the city this morning, and when all arrive it is expected that over 400 will be present. There was an informal caucus of the delegates already in the city this morning to canvass the state for candidates for its officers. The committees will not act until all the delegates arrive this afternoon.

Galveston, July 23.—A News special from Austria says a committee composed of nine members of each wing in the conference this morning, withdrew the names of both candidates, and put up men not yet before the convention.

Syracuse, July 23.—The nationalists met in state convention, and soon took recess.

Washington, July 23.—The treasury has issued a call for the redemption of 5,000,000 5.20 bonds, of 1875, two and a half millions registered and two and a half millions coupons.

Saratoga, July 23.—The attendance at the races to-day was good. The Alabama stakes fillies foaled in 1875, one mile and one-eighth, was won by Belle; Balance All, 2d; Inver, mare, 3d. Time, 1:59.

Cincinnati, July 23.—The latest reliable estimate of the loss by the Cattlesburg, Ky. fire, is \$150,000, upon which there is about \$30,000 insurance in the Ethna, Hartford, Royal, British, American and Kenton.

New York, July 23.—The suspension of Wm. H. Gladwin, an old member of the stock exchange, is announced. Gladwin was short of the market, and several hundred shares of stock were bought in under the r's for his account.

New York, July 23.—The Belting and Packing company, John H. Cheever, chief partner, has suspended, and issued a call to the creditors to meet and consider the situation. The suspension is caused by the suspension of a Boston house, of which John G. Tappan was the treasurer.

San Francisco, July 23.—The schooner Parallel reports that on the 7th inst., off the coast, about 100 miles north of this port, she fell in with a Japanese junk. Not a living person was on board. A number of corpses were found; some shackled together. They must have been dead at least a month. No food on board. Some of the bodies were dressed in costly material.

Boston, July 23.—It is estimated that about \$300,000 is the amount of the Boston Belting company's individual promises held by banks, mainly. John G. Tappan, treasurer, has turned over considerable property of the Belting company was president of the McKellop & Sprague commercial agency of New York, and is said to be largely interested in the Merriam Packing company, of Texas. He is also a partner in the

firm of J. E. Tappan & Co., successors to Kelvert & Tappan which has met with heavy loss from small concerns. They are the Boston agents for the packing company, and the two concerns had absorbed a large proportion of misappropriated funds, together with the money that Tappan raised on his individual responsibility. The ex-treasurer is also said to be heavily involved in real estate transactions, that have almost invariably resulted in a loss.

THE HAYDEN SURVEY.

Another Expedition to the Yellowstone Park. Philadelphia Press.

Mr. Hayden, in charge of the geological survey of the territories, having determined upon his field of work within the provisions of the statutes, will take the field at once. The area to be surveyed includes the Yellowstone National park and the country lying to the south and southeast, about the head of the Green Snake and Mud rivers. This will be an extension of the work of last year. The entire region is one of volcanic activity. The eruptive force is still at work not far below the surface, as is evidenced by the great number of geysers and hot springs, where are found everywhere. Great areas of the surface are covered with beds of basalt looking as fresh as if they had been deposited but yesterday. Within this area is what is regarded as the true apex of the continent, the sources of the extreme branches of the three greatest rivers of the North American continent, the Missouri, the Columbia and the Colorado, rising in a peak in the north of the area marked out for survey.

Some of the areas marked out for survey during the present season was in part explored by Dr. Hayden some years ago. The object of the present season's work is to make a finished and final survey of this wonderful region. The surveying parties will rendezvous at Cheyenne, Wyoming, and thence proceed to their respective fields of work. Two divisions of the party will have charge of the geological and topographical work, while a third will carry on the primary triangulation for the control of the geographical work, and special geological and paleontological studies will be made in certain localities. The physical workings of the section are already generally known. It is intended, during the present season, to develop all information possible regarding these interesting regions.

It is proposed at the next session of congress to make a radical change in the system of government geological and geographical surveys of the territories. For several years the surveys under the direction of Hayden, Powell and Wheeler have come in frequent collision and much duplication of work, through jealousies, has been the result. In order to have the suggestions of the scientific men of the country to aid in the determination of a proper place for the continuance of this work, a provision in the bill appropriates the funds for the present season, and asks the academy of natural science to consider a plan as above indicated, and submit it to congress for such action as may see fit to take. The national academy will meet in New York in October to give this subject special and full consideration. The general work of the surveys will be discussed, and a special committee will be proposed to examine the results of the surveys now in the field, as well as the surveys under the general land office.
