## GENERAL NEWS.

## CONGRESSIONAL.

### SENATE.

Washington, Feb. 16.—Mr. Eaton withdrew his motion to reconsider the vote by which the bill passed authorizing the transportation of General Sykes' body from Fort Brown to West Point. The bill now goes to the house.

Messrs. Windom, Blaine and Withers were appointed a conference committee on the disagreement of the house to the senate amendments to the military academy appropriation bill.

Pending debate on the bill giving a pension to Netherfield, a scout, the morning hour expired, and consideration was resumed of the five per cent. military land warrant bill.

### HOUSE.

Washington, Feb. 16.—The morning hour having expired while bills were being introduced, Mr. Weaver demanded the regular order of business and the speaker immediately recognized Mr. Coffort, as chairman of the committee on invalid pensions, as moving to suspend the rules and adopt resolutions for the session Wednesday night, for the consideration of the pension bill.

Pending the vote on Coffort's proposition, Mr. Buckner moved to adjourn. Yeas and nays were called on that motion. The call was not completed until 2 o'clock when the district committee took the floor.

## CRIMES AND CASUALTIES.

### Explosion.

Susforth, Ont., Feb. 16.—The boiler on the J. Kidd's salt derrick, near this place exploded, killing Engineer Jno. Gilligan, and demolishing the building.

### Suicide.

Chicago, Feb. 16.—Two suicides were committed in the city yesterday. Corporal R. T. Hill, of company B, by revolver, and A. V. Hovsgland, by laudanum. Both out of employment and despondent.

### A Terrible Tragedy.

Bainbridge, Penn., Feb. 16.—Charles Lane, aged 24, who recently removed here from Maryland, killed his wife, then gave poison to his three children and took a quantity himself. Only one child lives and it is badly frozen; it is thought it must die.

### The Missing Agent.

New York, Feb. 16.—David Downs said that last evening he had heard that John Allen, agent of the firm at Baltimore, who had been missing since Thursday is in New Orleans. He added that he had received no particulars, and was not absolutely certain that the information was correct, but he believed it to be true.

### A Cold Blooded Murder.

Chicago, Feb. 16.—A cold blooded murder was committed at Sandwich, Ill., yesterday morning. Two burglars having entered the house of Hiram Paller, a respected citizen, were surprised by his getting up in bed, and while addressing them, one of them immediately opened fire on him, hitting him four times. Three of the shots would have proved fatal if no others had been fired. He died instantly. His wife had taken refuge in a closet, and heard some conversation between the burglars which, with another clue which they left behind, may lead to their arrest. They secured only a trifling amount of plunder.

## FOREIGN TELEGRAMS.

### Farmers' Losses.

London, Feb. 16.—Experts estimate the losses of the farmers of the united kingdom during 1879, at from 10 to 15 million pounds.

### Relief Stores.

London, Feb. 16.—The Duke of Edinburgh has ordered a coast guard, west of Ireland, to take charge of the relief stores and provisions deposited with them, and to convey the relieving officers to an island off the coast.

### Revolt in Abyssinia.

Cairo, Feb. 16.—The governor general of Toka, Abyssinia, telegraphs that the khedive and several chiefs have revolted against King John of Abyssinia, and that the king of Shoa, among others, has refused to visit King John, whose power is seriously threatened.

### Irish Distress.

London, Feb. 16.—There is considerable suffering among small Irish farmers in Ulster, who are too proud to complain. Fever has appeared in some districts south of Tipperary and west of Cork. In consequence destitution relief has not been given, but it has come too late, and is not the kind suited to the sufferers.

### "All Come Right in the End."

London, Feb. 16.—Spurgeon in his sermon of yesterday said that England's rulers were making bloody wars and oppressing nations; that they encouraged and consoled themselves with this reflection: "We are a great people, and by jingo do what we like, it will all come right in the end." But they should remember that pride went before a fall.

### A Train Stopped by Bandits.

Madrid, Feb. 16.—A railway train from Andalusia for Madrid, carrying the government treasure chest under charge of 5 gendarmes, was stopped Sunday by 16 brigands, between Alcazar and Argumasailla. Marshal Zorano happening to be a passenger on

the train took command of the gendarmes, and fired on the bandits who fled. One gendarme was wounded.

## THE DOMINION.

### Re-Elected.

Montreal, Feb. 16.—Mayor Rivard was re-elected to-day. He flatteringly refused Saturday to take any part in the reception of Farnell, and the friends of the latter endeavored to run an opposition candidate, but the effort failed.

### Arrivals.

New York, Feb. 16.—Arrived: Steamship City of Brussels from Liverpool and Russia, from Cardiff.

### The Weather.

Washington, Feb. 14.—The weather indications for the upper Mississippi and lower Missouri valleys are: Increasing cloudiness and areas of rain or snow; warmer southeast to southwest winds, and falling barometer during the rest of Monday, followed by colder north to west winds, and rising barometer.

## IOWA LEGISLATURE.

Des Moines, Feb. 16.—In the senate the following bills were introduced and referred: By Larabee, providing that husband and wife sign chattel mortgage to make the same valid; by Mitchell, relating to taxing property in cities of the second class, for road purposes; by Gaylard, providing for the construction of fish ways and dams; by Meyer, protecting holders of warehouse receipts; by Woolson, making an appropriation for Mount Pleasant insane hospital.

Resolutions requesting congress to provide agricultural colleges with standard weights and measures was referred to the judiciary committee.

The bill reducing penalty on delinquent tax to 1 per cent for three months, and two per cent thereafter, till sold, and reducing penalty at tax sale from 20 per cent to 12 and a half, was considered, and after discussion passed.

The bill relating to representative districts leaving ratio as at present came up and on third reading was passed. Members from the west portion of the state opposed the bill as unjust to that section.

The bill was also passed conferring on street commissioners the same power as road supervisors in regard to the enforcement of the collection of whole tax.

Reports were made for the visiting committee of the state hatching house and Anamosa penitentiary.

The senate adjourned.

In the house the retrenchment committee made a report on the bill cutting down the pay of state officers, cutting all down from 100 to 200 dollars.

The school committee favorably reported on the bill ordering not less than three school districts containing more than 15,000.

Col. Markey, of Keokuk, introduced a bill ordering the submission of a constitutional convention to vote at the fall election this year, and a making provision therefor.

Bills were introduced as follows: Making railroad companies having land grants a Iowa record a copy of their title in all counties where lands are held by them; also making appropriations for the insane hospital at Mount Pleasant. Various other unimportant bills were introduced.

The whole number of bills introduced in the house number 399.

The house concurred in the senate amendment to house file No. 118, exempting the insurance in mutual insurance companies from execution, which now becomes a passed bill.

The house ordered to a third reading the following bills: No. 171, in relation to highway taxes, making it the duty of the county treasurer, in payment of funds over to town clerks, to furnish a statement as to which of the district roads the funds belong;

House file No. 188, in relation to sidewalks in cities of first and second class, giving cities a greater power in ordering the repair of sidewalks; making a trial to the court, obligatory in all cases for violation of city ordinances, which abolishes jury trials in these cases; also giving the mayor exclusive jurisdiction in cases of violations of ordinances.

The short hand reporter bills were made a special order for February 19th.

### LATEST BY MAIL.

Louisville, Feb. 13.—It has transpired that Dave McClure, clerk on the steambot Gen. Lytle is a defaulter to a large amount, just how much is not known.

Frankfort, Feb. 13.—The river is rising at the rate of a foot an hour. The lower end of the city is flooded, and before morning the water will be in the state house yard.

Newark, N. J., Feb. 13.—Margaret Meirhofer and Frank Lammons were found guilty by the jury to day of the murder of the former's husband in West Orange, October 9.

Philadelphia, Feb. 13.—Two imposters under the name of Handy and Wyman confounded New York dry goods men out of nearly \$50,000 by pretending to be a commission firm and getting credit on the goods they bought and selling the goods and leaving the city.

St. Joseph, Mo., Feb. 13.—The St. Joseph and Albany narrow-gauge road has been bought by the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy and will be made a standard gauge and extended to Mount Ayr, Iowa. The property of fifty miles of the road will be transferred to-morrow.

## A WYOMING FIGHT.

### The Governor and Secretary of the Territory Engaged in a Factional Contest.

Cheyenne, Feb. 12.—The fight against Gov. Hoyt continues, and the charges made have been reiterated—to the belief of some, the chagrin of others, and the disgust of the large majority of citizens. It is virtually a war between two factions of the republican party, with Gov. Hoyt the leader of one and Secretary A. Worth Spates of the other. It is claimed that the latter began the fight by avowing that he had enough political influence to oust Hoyt and get the governorship for himself. J. P. C. Coulton, a member of the republican central committee, has made an affidavit stating that Spates approached him with the proposition that if he (Spates) succeeded in getting the governorship Coulton should be made secretary of the territory. Spates afterward made a similar promise to a fellow member of the lottery ring, being interested in the great western lottery scheme. A legislative ticket was placed in nomination by the Spates wing of the republican party, and also by the Hoyt faction, the former being successful in the campaign, but failing to carry measures through the legislature for the protection of lottery interests. Following the startling statements against the reputation of Gov. Hoyt, Secretary Spates is charged with disgraceful debaucheries and lustful practices. It is stated that he has nightly shown intimacy with actresses and publicly shown intimacy with prostitutes of the lowest class. He is also charged with making occasional disgraceful exhibitions of himself, while in a beastly state of intoxication, by lying on bar room lunch tables in a state of unconsciousness. It is expected that the Leader will make an attack upon the reputation of H. E. Warren, territorial treasurer, to-morrow, in which event the strife will become more embittered, and already threats have been made that personal violence will follow such an attack. Hoyt has but little to say in reference to the charges made against him, but is confident that public sentiment is decidedly in his favor.

New York, Feb. 13.—The Herald names as a committee to distribute its Irish relief fund Col. King Harmen, member of the parliament; Mr. Shaw, member of parliament; Prof. Baldwin, Cardinal McClosky and Mr. Parnell. The cardinal at first declined to serve, but has since reconsidered his declination and now consents to render the requested service.

Whereas, the Home Insurance Company, located in the city of New York, and state of New York, has filed in this office a sworn statement of its condition on the 31st day of December, A. D. 1879, in accordance with the provisions of an act of the legislative assembly of the territory of Dakota, relating to insurance companies, approved February 16th, 1877; and whereas, on examination of the sworn statement of said company filed in this office, I find that the said insurance company is possessed of the necessary amount of capital invested as required by law.
