The trial of Edward Brown, charged with stealing a span of horses from the Wyoming stage company near Fort Sully, terminated last night in a verdict of not guilty. The jury was out about three hours.

The Reilly case, brought under a charge of robbing the mails, was called in the United States court this morning, but Mr. Sperry, the chief witness was not present and the action was postponed. A bench warrant was issued for Mr. Sperry. Joe Cowgill, of Rosebud landing has also been sent here for.

Our local railroad officers say that there is more freight coming than can be handled here before spring. The Yankton received so many goods they are receiving this spring, and it naturally follows that they are selling more. Yankton's star is in the ascendant.

A commercial traveler who has recently made a trip in Nebraska, says the drought in that state is very severe. In some localities the wind has carried away the soil to the depth it was plowed, and piled it in large drifts against fences and other obstructions.

The outlook for a crop was very unfavorable, but to-day's rain has the appearance of being general, and may help out our unfortunate neighbors.

Heaven sent upon us to-day its choicest blessing—rain. There has been a steady pour from early morning and the drought dried earth has received a generous soaking. This moisture comes just in time.
