THRESHER CO. WINS
 Connecticut Stockholders Liable Under Minnesota Law.

Decision of Connecticut Supreme Court Reversed by U. S. Supreme Court—Assessments Must Now be Paid.

Hartford, Jan. 29.—The U. S. Supreme court on Monday handed down a decision reversing with costs the judgment of the supreme court of Connecticut in the cases of Theodore R. Converse, receiver of the Minnesota Thresher Manufacturing Company, against the Aetna National Bank of this city and the First National Bank of Suffolk in this favor of Mr. Converse, the receiver.

These cases affected a large number of individuals who had been stockholders in the company, whose home was in Stillwater, Minn. This company having become insolvent, Mr. Converse was appointed receiver with authority under the laws of Minnesota to collect an assessment on the stockholders of the bankrupt concern. Under Minnesota law these stockholders were liable for the debts of the corporation to an amount equal to the value of their holdings of its shares. Claim was made by the banks that the Minnesota statute was unconstitutional and that, therefore, the assessment was not binding on the stockholders in Connecticut. This claim, after being decided against the banks by Judge Thayer and Judge Reed in the Superior court, was sustained by the decision of a majority of the Supreme court, from which decision, however, Judges Hamersley and Case dissented. Mr. Converse, the receiver, took the case to the U. S. Supreme court on writs of error. By the decision of that court, rendered on Monday, the right of the receiver to recover for the assessments is fully sustained and it is expected that a number of cases pending in the courts of this state in which the receiver is seeking to recover from other stockholders the amount of the assessment levied against them, will now be brought on for trial.

As a result of this decision about forty other suits will be brought against many stockholders who live in different parts of the state. The suits involve in the aggregate about \$100,000.

ANARCHISTS BUSY WITH BOMBS AT BAKU

ONE KILLED AND 11 HURT BY EXPLOSION IN SHOP—MILLIONAIRE KIDNAPPED.

(Special from United Press.)

Baku, Russia, Jan. 29.—One man was killed and eleven seriously injured today in a bomb explosion which wrecked the shop of Asrieff, one of Baku's richest merchants of whom a group of Anarchists had demanded \$500,000 roubles. The merchant is among those hurt.

Just as the place had been opened an unknown man entered and laid the bomb on the counter, shouting a warning to the employees. The man escaped but those inside the place had not chance to get out before the bomb let go. None escaped injured.

Assassinations are occurring here daily. A millionaire was recently kidnapped and held for ransom which has not been paid. It is feared he has been killed. The king of the city, several tangle clues and are hopeful of running down what is believed to be one of the biggest Revolutionary organizations in this part of Russia.

DOG GOES ALONE 600 MILES

TRAVELS FROM KENTUCKY TO ARKANSAS AND SWIMS TWO RIVERS.

Lexington, Ky., Jan. 29.—In a letter received by the National Fox Hunters Association Judge A. Floyd Huff of Hot Springs, Ark., reports the return of his famous foxhound Hemlock, which was lost during the division field trial at the annual meeting of the association at Crab Orchard Springs, Ky., last November.

Judge Huff reports that the hound reached his home near Hot Springs bleeding from all four feet and almost starved to death from the long trip. In making the trip from Kentucky to Arkansas the hound was forced to swim the Mississippi and Arkansas rivers and to cover a distance of over 600 miles.

Gen. R. B. Williams, a noted fox hunter, said that this was undoubtedly the record trip for a hound, although he had known frequent cases where they returned to their homes from a distance of 200 miles.
