HOTEL MEN OPPOSE FOREIGN AUTO FEE

Are Afraid It Would Keep Autoists from Other States Out of Connecticut. Strong Representations are Being Made to Committee on Roads, River and Bridges—Proposed Charge is \$1 Per Day.

(Special from United Press.) Hartford, April 9.—So strong has been the protest of the Connecticut hotel keepers against the feature of the amendments to the automobile law which the committee on roads, bridges and rivers has about ready to report, requiring non-residents to pay a tax of a dollar for the time they are driving machines within and through this state, that it has been decided to omit this feature from the bill. The hotel men have a strong lobby at work and propose to practically dictate the auto law amendments if possible. The proposition was to charge a fee of one dollar a day and issue registration on his motor car for one, three or ten days which would be on sale not only by town authorities but also in hotels and garages in Connecticut, New York, Boston and elsewhere, so that there would be no inconvenience to the autoist in the collection of the fee. The most noteworthy change in the present law, now to be reported by the committee, is the doubling of the registration fee for machines owned in this state. The present scale of fees was turned over to the highway commissioner for use on the roads and it is figured that by increasing the fee for machines under twenty horse power to \$6 and grading them from that figure to \$30, would raise at least \$150,000 to help pay for the damage the autoists do to the roads. The hotel men are opposed to this and are supported by the automobile manufacturers but it is probable that the legislature will look on it with favor as a reasonable means of increasing revenue.
