COSIER LOST HIS GALLON OF RUM

Danbury Policeman Tells Funny Story When Haled Before a Newtown Justice for Fishing Out of Season.

Harry B. Cosier, a special policeman of Danbury, figures in an amusing trial which took place in Newtown a week ago. Cosier was arrested on a grand juror's warrant, by Deputy Sheriff D. S. Johnson and taken before Justice McCarthy on a charge of fishing for trout before the law allowed it. John R. Peck testified that he saw Cosier fishing and that he also saw a trout in Cosier's basket. Cosier denied strenuously that he had been fishing or that he had caught any trout. He explained his presence on the brook in Newtown in this way: "You see, your honor, I went over to Newtown to dig some worms the day before the law went off. There are so many sidewalks in the big city of Danbury that we don't have any worms there. So I got up at 6 o'clock on the last day of March and took the train for Newtown. We got the worms all right. Somebody said that he would bet a gallon of rum that no one could go on to J. R. Peck's land without being driven off. So I borrowed a pole and put a line on it, but no hook and went down the brook. Well, you see, Peck saw me and drove me off and I lost the gallon of rum which cost me \$2." Mr. Peck testified that he saw Cosier fishing with a hook and bait on the end of his line and that he had one fish in his basket. Cosier says Peck lied. The justice gave a verdict of not guilty and all that the Danbury policeman is out is the gallon of rum and his expenses.
