NEW ARRANGEMENT OF POLICE POSTS

City Has Been Redistricted and Maps Made for Department.

The police department has received the new maps recently ordered and they are now hanging upon the walls of the board room. The maps are two in number, one for the day posts and one for the night posts. They are six feet long by five feet wide. The entire city has been redistricted by Supt. Birmingham with the idea of providing a chart which will not have to be changed for 50 years.

The posts in the center of the city are small. On the outskirts they are larger. Supt. Birmingham has been at work on the original districting for weeks. The maps were made by City Surveyor Morris McKenna and the posts were filled in with different colors by Kershaw & McElroy. The system as now laid out will allow the assignment of several posts on the beat of a single officer. As the city grows the number of posts may be decreased until only one post is assigned to one patrolman. The day posts number 331 and those on the night map 414.

INTEREST AROUSED.
