Georgia's coal production last year of 264,522 short tons was the lowest since 1896. Experiments with filling balloons with superheated steam are to be tried in Germany. The coffee tree begins to bear at three years and reaches its fullest bearing at ten years. The health record of the German army is better than that of any other nation's fighting force. After every eruption of Vesuvius the crater is covered with a gleaming white layer of volcanic ash. Weather forecasts by wireless telegraph are furnished vessels in the Atlantic by the British bureau. White pine sawdust has been known to last 20 years, while some built of cypress have lasted 25 years. A combined metal cover and handle which locks securely upon its bottles has been invented by a Massachusetts man. A New Jersey resident has patented a pie and cake box which is ventilated, to prevent the contents from becoming soggy. Several German shipyards are equipped with electro-magnets powerful enough to lift dead weights of 50,000 pounds. Of the public lands still owned by the Federal Government it is estimated that 80,000,000 acres are under-laid with coal. Lead pipes may be cleaned by scrubbing them with pulverized pumice on a wet rag until bright, then drying them and applying a coat of white varnish. The examination of over 400 flies at the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station showed that they carried an average of 1,250,000 bacteria apiece. A horse census of England, conducted by the Government, revealed that, while the number of horses has increased there was an alarming lack of animals of suitable types. Prizes will be offered at the coming German aeronautical congress for a metal lighter than aluminum, but retaining its solidity, and for balloon hulls of various types. The two new types authorized by the last Congress, which will be laid down next fall, will carry heavier batteries than any other warships afloat or ordered by any navy. To measure the amount of air admitted through cracks in buildings a novel instrument has been devised, which, like a funnel, carries a small anemometer in its nozzle. While the forests of the United States are increasing at the rate of 7,000,000,000 cubic feet a year, the country is using 23,000,000,000 cubic feet of wood each twelve months. Unable to buy an airship from Germany during the recent crisis, the Austrian Government has encouraged the organization of a company at home to build them and will be its first customer. A new burglar alarm, the invention of a Dresden engineer, consists of a curtain containing numerous wires. Any movement of the curtain causes any rings a bell or switches on lights. The Federal Forest service has developed a process for making paper from scrub pine, which is a native of the areas in the southern Atlantic seaboard and is little used except for fuel. A London scientific journal that analyzed samples of snow taken from the roof of its building found that week-day snows contained about five times the impurities of those gathered on Sundays. It has been satisfactorily demonstrated that the blue rays from mercury vapor are effective in killing and sterilizing water in which the lamps are placed without appreciably increasing its temperature. A German astronomer has estimated that the mysterious star Algol is more than twice as hot as the sun, and that, if it were as near the earth as the sun, it would give 30 times as much light. The military authorities of several European nations are testing the feasibility of a sort of enlarged roller skate, operated by pedals, by which it is claimed a man can get over ground as rapidly as though mounted on a bicycle. Highly successful is said to be a new

steamship propeller, invented by the Grand Duke of Oldenburg, in which the blades are placed on an advancing screw line instead of lying in a plane at right angles to the shaft, as usual. The construction of a railroad connecting the Marner and Madeira rivers, passing around the falls which have made a direct commercial route from Bolivia to the Atlantic Ocean impracticable, is being pushed with all the rapidity possible.
