Cardinal Gibbons Gives Advice to Girl Graduates

Baltimore, June 18.—In the course of his address before the graduates of St. Joseph's College and Academy at Emmitsburg, Md., yesterday Cardinal Gibbons gave his opinion with regard to woman's suffrage and advised the girl graduates to put aside any ambition to vote.

"I am sorry to say," declared the Cardinal, "that I am entirely opposed to woman's suffrage, not that I hate women, but because I love them and want them to fulfill the mission God intended for them. Nowhere are women so honored as in the United States and this is due to the chivalry of the men. You want to be sure to retain your dignity, and if you are protected by the male sex what more do you want? If you play in the arena of politics you will be covered with political dust. If you grasp after too much you will lose everything. I want to remind you that you have a great mission to perform. Every one of you has a personal and exclusive mission from God. Cultivate a deep sense of your dignity and responsibility. Your mission lies largely in the domestic walks of life. If you embrace the religious life that is your mission from God. As sisters you must not expect to preach except to those you come in contact with in the daily walks of life. In the church women must be silent. That is not our fault, but the fault of an old man by the name of Paul (Luther). There are places where you need not be silent. We be to society if it had to depend on the male sex alone; the world would go to the devil."

Buying Coal Lands For Future Use

Pittsburg, Penn., June 18.—In anticipation of years of heavy steel making the Jones & Laughlin Steel Company today closed a deal for coal lands involving the expenditure of \$1,000,000 in cash, though the coal lands thus purchased will be developed for years.

The fact that the Jones & Laughlin firm considers it good business to tie up \$1,000,000 admittedly for some years is considered by business Pittsburg as indication that there is faith in future business. The Span-Cham plant mills of Pittsburg report the booking of pipe orders in June up to date of 100,000 tons, which is a greater record than that of any whole month in the history of the plant.

Mayor Gets \$83,576 Check To Cover Recount Expenses
