CITY BRIEFS

For the first six months of the current year 3,490 deaths among all kinds were filed in the office of the town clerk. This was an increase of 531 over the number filed during the similar period in 1908.

The new city directory, just out, indicates a smaller population for Bridgeport than it had in 1907. Then the number of names was 45,992, or 469 more than are contained in the 1908 book.

The Superior court for Fairfield county has granted 157 divorces since October, 1908. Eighty of these were for desertion, 32 were for adultery and the others distributed to cruelty and intemperance, excepting one granted by reason of the fact that an infamous crime had been committed for which the husband was imprisoned and three cases in which the marriage was annulled.

The Bridgeport Acie of Eagles will soon remodel its hall on Madison avenue. The changes will be substantial and will greatly improve the quarters of the organization.

VATICAN ORGAN DECRIES FASHIONS

Present Style of Women's Dress Called the Shipwreck of Virtue.

Paris, July 9.—The issue of the Osservatore Romano, the organ of the Vatican, which reached Paris last evening, contains a scathing denunciation of the tendencies of the feminine fashions of to-day.

"We hope the competent authorities will apply the law against these new Augean stables. At the same time we cannot but deplore another danger to good morals which comes to us from other countries, and that is the wearing of the Catholic faith and morals should not be indulgent toward women who walk about the streets wearing immodest garments. All the present-day fashions are designed to excite the passions. It is the shipwreck of virtue. These fashions are prejudicial to beauty, which is the reflection of the bounty of God, and therefore fruitful in material and moral well-being.

Priest Meets Death While in Bathing

Norfolk, Va., July 9.—Father Thomas Dowling, the young associate rector of Sacred Heart parish, this city, met death at Cape Henry yesterday afternoon.

He went to the cape with a party of friends for a swim. He was seen by his companions five minutes ahead of his companions and that was the last seen of him alive.

His body was found in shallow water half a mile below the bath houses half an hour later. There was no water in his lungs, but he is supposed to have died from natural causes.

Wife Divorced from Senator Aldrich's Son

Providence, R. I., July 9.—Mrs. Mary Larned Dorrance Aldrich got a divorce yesterday from Edward Dorrance Aldrich, oldest son of Senator Nelson W. Aldrich, and brother-in-law of John D. Rockefeller, Jr. Mrs. Aldrich began proceedings five years ago, alleging neglect from her husband, who died in turn, but his suit was unsuccessful.

The divorce gives to Mrs. Aldrich the custody of her little daughter, Susan. It also provides her with \$10 a week alimony. The Aldriches are married on Thanksgiving Day. Mrs. Aldrich was formerly Miss Mary Larned Dorrance, daughter of the late Charles T. Dorrance, of an old Rhode Island family.

Miss Abbie G. Aldrich, sister of the bridegroom, and later the bride of John D. Rockefeller, Jr., was bridesmaid for Miss Dorrance at her wedding.

GUNS AND BAYONETS TO FORCE STRIKE CRISIS

(Special from United Press.)
Glouce Bay, July 9.—Machine guns and fixed bayonets in the hands of 500 troops from Halifax are expected to force a crisis to-day in the strike of the miners of the Dominion Coal Company. To-day all of the mining districts of Cape Breton are under martial law. The troops arrive here late last night and to-day are on guard at all approaches to the colliers.

At colliers Nos. 7 and 8 the disturbances have thus far been the most severe. On the side of the company it is hoped the presence of the troops will prevent the United Mine Workers from attempting to restrain those miners from returning to work who wish to do so.

Should the bayonets and guns of the troops be sufficient to maintain good order to-day it is believed the beginning of the end of the strike will have arrived.
