ZEPPELIN FLIES FOR TWELVE HOURS


Count Apprehensive As He Nears Place Where He Lost His Other Airship ENCOUNTERS A HAILSTORM (Special from United Press.) Frankfurt, Germany, July 31.—Count Zeppelin landed here at 3:30 this afternoon in his new airship, the Zeppelin II after a splendid flight against adverse winds from Friedrichshafen 223 miles to the southward. The trip was made in 12 hours. The airship landed in the aerial exhibition grounds and in the crowd of veterans and aviators a hearty welcome. The big airship manoeuvred over the city in a series of intricate movements for nearly an hour before alighting. Every footstep in the city was crowded. Guns were fired and bells rung. At times the big vessel encountered winds that blew from fifty to sixty miles an hour.



WHOLESALE EXECUTIONS IN WILD WEST PLAY BOY'S TOE IS BLOWN OFF

Two Hundred Spanish Rioters Summarily Tried, Convicted and Shot SCENES OF FRENCH COMMUNE REPEATED Socialist and Labor Leaders Have Ordered Strike in Biscaya Province Brandes Claims Military Strength to Preserve Order Cannot Aid Morocco

Madrid, July 31.—A slightly reassuring tone in today's dispatches from Barcelona and other riot spots in Catalonia as well as from Melilla, has given the King and cabinet the first measure of relief they have enjoyed since the Barcelonian outbreak. Commander Brandes, at Barcelona, sent word today that order was being re-established and that the leaders of the revolution were being taken prisoners and executed. He says he has sufficient military strength to preserve order, but deprecated the suggestion of removing a part of his force to Morocco. From this it is believed there is still grave danger of another outbreak and that the revolutionary spirit has been temporarily suppressed but not entirely quashed.

MAN KILLED CAR GOES ON

Policeman Fires Four Shots as Speeders Defy Command to Stop FIVE MEN COMPRISED PARTY IN BIG CAR Victim's Body Found on Road Amidst Glass From Broken Headlights Inquiry is Being Made By Authorities to Ascertain Identity of Joy Riders

Stamford, July 31.—After tearing through Greenwich at a speed of over thirty miles an hour, failing to heed a policeman's warning or to stop when Officer Tully had fired four pistol shots, an unknown automobile hit and killed Garfield Held, 23 years of age at Put's Hill at about 11:30 last night and sped on toward Stamford, leaving the young man lying upon the road. Held was found unconscious by Conductor Johnson of a west-bound trolley car and taken to Greenwich. He was only ten minutes after being picked up, and that was a short time after he received his injuries. The police of Stamford and several other towns were notified by Chief Ritch of Greenwich to be on the lookout for the car which could be identified by a broken headlight. Pieces of glass, presumably from the headlight, were found near the dying victim. Held was employed by the Stamford Rubber company in this city. He was a son of George Held of Great View. He visited Cos Cob last night. It is supposed he was walking up Put's Hill on his way home last night when the automobile which had no lights that is one reason why the officer tried to stop it—came along at terrific speed and sped on toward Stamford. His bicycle was not damaged. The presumption is that he was walking slowly up the steep hill when the motor car approached him.
