UNIFY CHARITIES STATE-WIDE WORK

New Haven, July 31.—A movement has been set under way in Connecticut among a number of prominent persons who feel a particular interest in the subject for the establishment of a State conference of charities and correction, such as has already been successfully organized and carried on in twenty-one States of the nation.

Such a conference could consider among many objects, topics like the following: Lawbreakers, including prisons, jails, reformatories, probation work, etc. Dying and insane, the feeble-minded, epileptics, etc. Health and disease, including hospitals, anti-tuberculosis work, visiting nurses, etc. Children, delinquent, dependent, truant, juvenile courts, etc. Families and neighborhoods, including charity organization societies, the old settlements, improved housing, public playgrounds, etc. Public relief, including almshouses, outdoor relief, State paupers, etc.

STATE BREAKS UP BLACK HAND GANG

New Haven, July 31.—With a jury verdict finding Vincenzo Sabatasso, who last week pleaded guilty to a conspiracy to steal and theft, guilty of conspiracy to murder, and of an assault with the intent to murder, the state has scored a complete victory in the fight the purpose of which was to prove that number of thefts, extortions, and assaults which have occurred recently in this district were the work of a gang of men employing what are popularly known as Black Hand methods.

The verdict of guilty reached after an hour's deliberation by the jury, is believed to be a high device in the strong, clear and forceful argument by the prosecuting attorney, Mr. Alling, reconstructing the evidence in the case in a way which left no weak link in the state's story.

Another Insane Man Follows Thaw's Plan

White Plains, N. Y., July 31.—Another inmate of the Matteawan Asylum for Insane Criminals is seeking to obtain his liberty in the same manner as Harry Thaw. Supreme Court Justice Miller granted John Detiere a writ of habeas corpus, returnable before Justice Morschauser at Poughkeepsie in the second week in August.

NAVY WON'T ALTER SUTTON RULINGS

Washington, July 31.—The rulings of the court of inquiry investigating the death of Lieut. James N. Sutton at Annapolis, Md., will not be interfered with by the Navy Department. In a letter addressed to Henry E. Davis, counsel for Mrs. Sutton, mother of the dead officer, Beekman Winthrop, Assistant Secretary of the Navy, stated that the department would not be persuaded to vacate the ruling of the court by which Mrs. Sutton was declared to be regarded as a complainant and accused while all persons present at the time of the death of Lieut. Sutton were regarded as "defendants."
