

WILBUR WRIGHT, WHO IS TO FLY AT BIG NEW YORK CELEBRATION



Aside from the big naval parade, probably the most interesting single attraction at the Hudson-Pulton festival in New York city will be Wilbur Wright and his aeroplane. The modest inventor has no liking for public demonstrations and only consented to appear at the celebration when convinced that his absence would keep many thousands of persons away. As soon as he arrived in New York from his home in Dayton he set about getting his machine tuned up at Governor's Island for the flights he is to make over the bay and up down the Hudson river. He will confine his flights to the open river and bay and will not attempt to fly over the skyscrapers of the city. In this way millions of people will be able to get a good view of the aeroplane in flight.

EARLY HAD LEPROSY WIFE PLEADS FOR HUSBAND

Discoverer of the Bacillus in Norway Says Skin Examination Disclosed Germ. Washington, Sept. 25.—Dr. G. Armauer Hansen, discoverer of the leprosy bacillus, has announced that he has found the bacillus in the skin of John Early, the North Carolina soldier, whose detention here for many months attracted wide attention. The Treasury Department has received through the State Department a letter from American Consul Johnson at Bergen, Norway, reporting that at the second international leprosy convention, held at Bergen in August, Dr. Hansen stated that he had found the bacillus in a piece of skin taken from Early, who is alleged to have contracted leprosy in the Philippines Islands. The letter adds: "Mr. Early's wife sent a piece of the soldier's skin to Dr. Hansen for examination. Much doubt has existed regarding this famous case. This doubt has been dispelled by examination of the highest authorities. The above decision will confirm what has already been established in Washington. The clinic and laboratory diagnoses which were made by Prof. Eilers of Copenhagen are now fully reaffirmed."

DOGGS OF GENTLE BLOOD WILL GRACE SHOW OF CANINES

There will be more than 200 dogs exhibited at the annual dog show of the Bridgeport Kennel Club which will open, Thursday, at the Park City rink. Two hundred entry slips are filed. In many instances the dogs have never entered on the same blank. The spacious rink in State street, between Norman street and the American Club, the local show occupies the last three days of the week. The Danbury show takes place during the following week, so that the exhibitors will have ample time to ship to the fair. In all classes prizes will be forwarded as follows: First, blue ribbon; second, red ribbon; third, yellow ribbon; winners, rosettes; reserve winners, white ribbon; team, tri-color ribbon; brace, maroon ribbon; special, green ribbon.

Dr. Frederick Van Eeden, a Dutch Scientific and Literary Man, Has Outlined Plans for an Agricultural Colony in North Carolina. (By William J. Hogson) (Exclusive Service The Survey Press Bureau.) Dr. Frederick Van Eeden, the most prominent scientific and literary man in Holland, whose experiments in social problems have been much discussed in papers and magazines during the last few years, has launched another venture in co-operation. In two recent visits to this country Dr. Van Eeden lectured and wrote about co-operation in agriculture and the co-operative agricultural colony in North Carolina, the first department of an organization to be known as the Co-operative Colonies of America.

TO CLEAN DISCOLORED IVORY KNIVES
