LIFE PROLONGING PLANT RESTORE LONGEVITY. Professor Metchnikoff at Work in Paris on Greatest of All His Discoveries. (By Phil Sims, Staff Corres. of the United Press.) "Paris, Oct. 7.—I have just come from the "Life Prolonging Plant" president over the Metchnikoff whose mission seems to be to restore the longevity common in Methuselah's days to the struggling humanity of the present day. The "Life Prolonging Plant" is the pasteur institute where Professor Metchnikoff is now at work on his greatest of all discoveries—that of an antidote to counteract the influence of putrefaction in the large intestine, to which the professor attributes the vast majority of ills the human family now suffers from. It was announced several days ago that Professor Metchnikoff had perfected this new discovery and that he would soon state the medical and scientific world with an exhibition of its wonderful curative effects. This is overstating the facts. Dr. Metchnikoff, in his own laboratory, has not yet reached his "station" yet. He has strong hopes of finding the sought for antidote or germicide but will be some time yet before it is finally ready to be put to the test. It is now in the hands of a few thousand cotton-stuffed test tubes, microscopes and other scientific paraphernalia, looking almost as much like a cabinet of curiosities as the Count's own picture. Professor Metchnikoff received me. It took but a moment's conversation to become convinced that Professor Metchnikoff is first of all a scientist.
