WHITE SLAVE MEN CONFESS TO GUILT

Both Admit Working Cadet System in New Haven and Are Sent to State Prison

New Haven, Oct. 14.—Raffael Spera and Oscar Giustitia, charged with having a female for the purpose of prostitution, in the superior court plead guilty and were sentenced by Judge Reed, the former to from one to two and the latter from one to two and a half years in state prison.

Raffael Spera and Josephine Klotz, a girl 18 years old, were arrested about two weeks ago in a house on Water street, when the girl told a story of having been seduced by an Italian whom she had met in Brooklyn, her home, in dancing halls, and having been brought here to New Haven by him under a promise that he would marry her. This story confirmed the theory of the police that this was a case of the cadet system kind, and following the clue given by the girl's story, Detective Ward of this city, a few days later, apprehended Giustitia in New York, as the one who brought her here. He was at the time presumably on an errand of bringing another girl here for immoral purposes.

West Approach Widening Would Cost \$25,000

City Auditor Keating, after making an inquiry, has concluded that Congress street may be widened to 60 feet on the west side of the river from Main street to the bridge at a cost of \$25,000. The McCarthy block at Congress and Main streets is the most substantial structure in the path of the improvement, and a resolution to accomplish the object will be presented at the next meeting of the Common Council. It is said, by Alderman C. B. Wilson.

New Buildings To Cost \$59,050

At the meeting of the building commissioners yesterday permits for buildings valued at \$59,050 were granted as follows: Adolf Sherman, two two-family frame dwellings, east side of Carroll avenue. Robert Parrott, owner of land and C. C. Blackman of building, two family dwelling, west side of French street. Goldman and Shine, a two-family frame dwelling, east side of Central avenue. City of Bridgeport, building to be used as a boiler house, town farm. The Deidrich Bros. Co., brick factory building, north side of Connecticut avenue. Henry Cope, raising building for three stores, east side of Newfield avenue, corner of Revere street. D. Shine, frame addition to dwelling, east side of Seaview avenue. Dr. C. R. Townsend, frame addition to dwelling 44 State street, (fire limits laws waived). John Fendosock, alteration to store, west side of Main street. George W. Jackman, brick and neolithic dwelling, south side of Elm street.

Surveyors at Work. The survey of an electric railroad line between White Plains, N. Y., and Danbury, by way of Ridgefield, is in progress.

Roads Not Sold. On Tuesday, bids were opened for the purchase of the \$70,000 four per cent. coupon water bonds of the city of New York. Only one bid was received and that was from Kountz Brothers, of New York city, who offered to purchase the bonds at 98 per cent, or two per cent. below par value. It was not accepted.

Deer at Glenbrook. A day or two ago, on the Darien side of Glenbrook, two deer were sighted. They were tired as if they had been chased by hounds, and allowed the men who routed them from their resting place to get within seventy-five yards before they leaped away. A few weeks ago in Newfield, Stamford, a young girl was picking wild grapes when she heard a slight rustling. She looked up, and, standing motionless, a few feet from where she crouched, was a beautiful young doe. Some slight movement on her part sent the dainty thing over a six-foot wire fence.

A 10 Mill Tax. The annual business meeting of the town of Huntington was held Monday evening, a tax of ten mills on the dollar was laid. A resolution calling for the appropriation of \$20,000, of such part thereof as would be the pro rata of the state money for good roads available for the coming two years, was passed without opposition.

TEST AGENCY TAX IN SUPREME COURT

Out of Town Firms Object to Being Taxed on Business Done in New Haven.

New Haven, Oct. 14.—An important problem that may be taken to the United States supreme court for final settlement has been placed before the board of relief which is just finishing its sessions for the year for the purpose of hearing kicks against the tax assessments which have been levied by the board of assessors this year. The board has placed assessments on business houses, coal merchants principally being affected, which maintain agencies in this city, for taxation. These firms, among which is that of Mellen & Powell, of which President Mellen's son is a partner, claim that they should not be taxed on their business here, but the board of assessors has decided otherwise and accordingly has placed the assessment. A test case on this matter is to be tried out, the board of relief being consulted with the case for its decision first. If it does not take off the assessment the matter will be taken into the courts. Wright & Wright will act as attorneys in the case and the firm which will bring the test case is that of E. Russell Norton of New York and Boston. This firm does business here through Charles Eriksen, an agent who has no established office. It has been assessed \$10,000 on its business here.
