

BANK CASHIER SUICIDES: WIFE'S MOTHER DROPS DEAD WHEN INFORMED Frank Hanscom Ended Life Over Grave of Father.

WORRIED OVER \$200,000 SHORTAGE

(Special from United Press.) Mineral Point, Wis., Oct. 18.—Though not held responsible for the \$200,000 shortage which caused the closing of the Mineral Point First National Bank, Cashier Frank Hanscom shot himself to death early today on the grave of his father in Graceland cemetery.

When the news of the suicide was broken to the family, John Gray, his mother-in-law, uttered a cry and fell dead, a victim of heart failure. Hanscom was despondent because of the loss of most of his fortune. The wrecked bank and he feared that he would be suspected of having a hand in the shortage. He was 55 years old and had been in the bank since its establishment in 1884.

GIRL MURDERER BEATEN IN COURT

Self-Confessed Slayer of Little Theresa Procopio Begs for Mercy

MOTHER ATTACKED HIM

Y., Oct. 18.—Theodore Rizzo, the self-confessed murderer of Theresa Procopio, aged 7, and Ferdinando Infusino, aged 2 1/2, begged for mercy in court today when Mrs. Procopio, mother of the murdered girl, attacked him and tried to beat him down with a series of blows on the face. A sister-in-law of Mrs. Procopio came to her assistance and the two were scratching at Rizzo's eyes and deluging him with blows when court officers dragged them away.
