## GET DEPOSITION FROM GOMPERS

Document Contains 1,000 Typewritten Pages to be Used in Hatters' Boycott Suit.

Hartford, Oct. 20.—The deposition procured by Attorney Daniel Davenport for the plaintiffs from President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor to be used during the course of the trial of D. E. Lowe et al., against 240 members of the Hatters' union of this state, contains 1,000 typewritten pages and approximately 200,000 words. It is bound for handy use and makes a volume as large as a ledger book. This deposition has not yet been presented, but has been scrutinized by the attorneys for the defense. It contains the history of the American Federation of Labor since 1881—its by-laws, constitution and a detailed explanation of the organization system of operation. The deposition also is understood to contain reference to the various labor troubles to which the Federation has been a party since its organization.

It was ascertained yesterday that the attorneys for the defense have procured depositions from trade organizations of Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Washington, San Francisco, Seattle, Los Angeles and Portland, Oregon. These, it is believed, will have particular reference to the alleged boycott against the plaintiff which is the basis of the present suit and by reason of which it is sought to recover damages to the amount of \$250,000.

Secretary Shalvey of the Danbury Hatters' union was the witness stand all day yesterday, being examined by the attorneys for the plaintiffs regarding the membership of the organization. Before the close of court he was subjected to a brief cross-examination. He said that the membership of the union is between 1,200 and 1,500 and the average attendance at meetings 150. Members who do not attend are fined 25 cents unless they can give a reasonable excuse for being absent. An average of 400 pay fines instead of attending the meeting. Secretary Shalvey was excused temporarily.

## SOUTH NORWALK POLICE MOSTLY IN BRIDGEPORT

Great Possibilities for Lawbreakers in Haunting Town.

Yesterday was a good time for a crook to turn off a trick in South Norwalk had they only been tipped off that almost the entire force was in town yesterday testing the waters of the Connecticut River. The police of South Norwalk, both of whom have appealed to the Superior court from the decision of the County Commission, are refusing to grant either a liquor license. The licenses were refused by the commissioners on the ground that in and around the Washington street bridge the place was unsafe and was not sufficiently policed. It was for this latter reason that almost the entire patroling force was sent to the Washington street bridge. The question of saloons at the Washington street bridge is one that has baffled the commissioners a number of times. A few years back there were a number of thirst quenching establishments around the place in question, but now they have dwindled down to two, the two applicants, Years ago one Herman Maimo was refused a license at this point, and took his case to the Superior court, which sustained the commissioners. The case was then appealed to the Supreme court, which also sustained the appeal. The applicants are represented by Attorneys E. B. Klein and John J. Walsh of Norwalk, and the defense by Corporation Counsel William Tammany and Attorney J. B. Hurlbut, both of South Norwalk. The court reserved its decision.

## COL. ROOSEVELT BACK IN NAIVISHA

Naiivisha, Oct. 20.—Colonel Roosevelt and his "comrades in arms" assembled here today after having been divided almost continually since the invasion into the Kenia. The Colonel and Guide Cunningham arrived from Nairobi at 11:30. Major Heller and Dr. Mearns having preceded them a few hours, coming from Kenia province. Mr. Roosevelt was the most robust member of the party, as all the others showed the effects of slight fevers that were contracted in the Kenia province. The Colonel said that he had not felt the least indisposition during the strenuous day in the mountainous country.

## Robbers Loot Bull Cottage at Lenox

Lenox, Mass., Oct. 20.—While Mr. and Mrs. Frederic Bull were at dinner last night at the Deedeen, the Kinross estate, which they have occupied for the season, a thief entered the cilla by climbing to the roof of a porch, and ransacked Mrs. Bull's room. He looted her dresser of silver articles, a diamond-studded watch, a pearl brooch, and other things, in all valued at \$600.

Hartford, Oct. 20.—Capt. George Comer of East Haddam, skipper of the whaling bark "A. T. Gifford" of New London, has just returned to his home after a twenty-eight months voyage to the Arctic. Regarding the Cook-Peary controversy he says he believes both men got to the pole. He is personally acquainted with Dr. Cook and considers him anything but a "bluffer." He speaks highly of the accomplishments of Commander Peary. Capt. Comer says the Eskimos are not to be depended upon as map makers.

## WANT PEOPLE TO TILL SOIL

Bolton Hall Tells How Money Should be Spent in Greatest Movement of the Day.

(Special from United Press.)  
Buffalo, Oct. 20.—"We are not short of land in this country or in the world," observed Bolton Hall of New York City before the National Conference of Vacant Lot and School Gardening in session here to-day. "All this talk about the food giving out is nonsense. It cannot give out. If you should put all the inhabitants in the world in the state of Texas there would not be more than ten persons to the acre within those limits. Does that look as though there is any danger to the food supply?"  
"The greatest movement of the day is to get people back to the soil. It will help to drive poverty out of society. The more you give to keep people out of the poorhouse the more you will have to give. The solution of the situation is to give your money to get people to till the soil that they may become self-supporting."  
In speaking of the productivity of the land and how beneficial the vacant lots about our cities could be made by a little work, Hall noted that one acre is sufficient to support 50 people.

## ORDERS FOR CARS AND LOCOMOTIVES

(Special from United Press.)  
Pittsburg, Oct. 20.—That the revival of business and general confidence has taken a new grip on shippers and manufacturers is indicated here today by orders that have been placed for cars and locomotives by various companies.

Railroad men say that the great volume of business that has been booked for manufacturers will necessitate an enormous outlay by the railroads for the new equipment. Orders for cars and locomotives aggregating \$8,650,000 have been placed within the last week.

The New York Central and Norfolk & Western Railways have arranged for a total of 310 new locomotives at an approximate value of \$4,650,000.

Orders for 100,000 steel cars and 1,100 locomotives have been placed, previous to the latest orders. The largest order for locomotives ever placed at one time by a railroad was made by the Baltimore & Ohio will place orders for 250 engines of various types among different locomotive works over the country.

Railroad men expect the heaviest freight traffic in cars, starting the first of the year, and are placing orders for additional cars.

## WEALTHY WOMAN MIXED IN FRAUDS

Forgeries of Town Treasurer Lombard May Reach Quarter of a Million.

FORGED NOTES SOLD IN WEST

(Special from United Press.)  
Framingham, Mass., Oct. 20.—"God only knows how many forgeries have been committed on notes against this town since Treasurer Lombard first 'obliged a friend' We know now \$225,000. The amount may reach three quarters of a million. When this public affair is unraveled I predict that its extent will startle the whole country."

This prophecy, with the additional information that many of the forged notes against Framingham for which Former Town Treasurer John B. Lombard, C. S. Cummings and E. A. Mead of the American Banking Company are under arrest, have been sent through out the west was made here to-day by one of the town's highest officials. That in the frauds already uncovered, as well as those still to develop, John B. Lombard, the treasurer of Framingham, was but a tool, is the general opinion among the officials here and everything here to-day seems to indicate that the bank looting was the work of a gang of unscrupulous men who simply used Lombard as a means to an end. Trails leading to these men are already being explored and it is likely that further arrests will be made, possibly before the close of the year.

One of to-day's most remarkable developments in the swindle is the evidence coming to light that a supposedly wealthy woman is mixed in the frauds or had a share of the profits. The woman is said to have been given jewelry, automobiles and such luxuries for several years by one of the men who are believed to be connected with the forgery and the district attorney is considering the wisdom of investigating this phase of the case.

"This woman, who has been a figure on the boulevard near here in high powered cars, once went into seclusion in her home here as soon as Lombard's alleged forgeries became public property and all attempts to locate her have been futile. Years ago at her home have been told she is ill and cannot be seen. In his hour of trouble the wife of Lombard is standing loyally by his side. When the treasurer was placed under \$2,000 bonds after arraignment at his bedside, the wife at once went for the papers.

"Mr. Lombard has been only a tool in the hands of bad men," she said. "He was kind and his goodness has been abused. I shall stand by him until my last hour and with my last penny."
